

Police crack-down on property crime in South Burnett yields 15 arrests as

Op Viper strikes

Police are hoping the sting of Operation Viper is felt around the South Burnett region well into the future.

Darling Downs District Superintendent

Danny Shaw announced the police operation cracking down on property crime recently wrapped up with a total of 15 people arrested on almost 75 charges within a fortnight.

"Our message to those doing the wrong thing is: we will catch up with you and when

we do, you will face the consequences of your actions," Supt Shaw said.

Police reported that, over the past fortnight, officers from the South Burnett Patrol Group joined forces with the Darling Downs District Tactical Crime Squad and Toowoomba High-

way Patrol to undertake a proactive and coordinated operation spanning from Kingaroy to Kilkivan, including Wondai, Murgon, Cherbourg and Goomeri.

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

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Community, police unite

A First Nations community in the South Burnett has enjoyed some of the sharpest downturn in crime in five years, according to a fact sheet presented to Cherbourg Aboriginal Shire Council by Queensland Police Service representatives last Thursday.

Acting Inspector Scott Stahlhut and Acting Superintendent Danny Shaw met with Cherbourg councillors, the mayor, and the chief executive officer at the town's council chambers on Thursday 17 February, to discuss trends of crime and strategies for crime prevention within the community.

Council staff heard that serious offences such as assault, robbery and domestic violence are now far less prevalent in Cherbourg than they were in the 2017 to 2018 reporting period.

Insp Stahlhut explained that recent police endeavours, such as the successful Operation Viper (see page 4), have in large parts contributed to this downturn in crime, as has a more vigilant and upstanding community.

"The operation last week was pretty significant in terms of what we did," he said.

"It was Cherbourg and Murgon-centric. We had the Highway Patrol there - they intercepted quite a few cars in and around Cherbourg and performed several positive drug tests, taking drug drivers off the road.

"It's really come about because we've got more resources with the Darling Downs district, which is a broad district, (...) and they're all funneling in here," Insp Stahlhut explained.

"Since December, we've had a presence from the Technical Crime Squad, which has been Cherbourg-centric the whole time.

"These guys have been doing rotations through here, and some of the locals are getting to know those police officers on first name basis. They've been very, very helpful in terms of locating some of the offenders," he added.

"So, there's the deterrence aspect. We go for

periods here in town of 14 to 20 days with no offending - zero.

"The problem we have is that someone decides they're going to go stupid or crazy tonight and bring along a few from Maroochydore or Brisbane, which takes up our time.

"And then we have what's left over, which is the stolen cars and the angst in the community.

"So in saying that, if we look at this, this is not what police are doing. This is community and community stakeholders, both government and non-government, all working together," Insp Stahlhut said.

According to a copy of the police statistics fact sheet obtained by Burnett Today, rates of reported assault offences in the community are down 32 per cent compared to the 2020/21 period, while offences such as robbery have decreased by 50 per cent.

Motor vehicle theft has also seen a sharp downturn, with 71 per cent fewer offences re-

ported in the community between 2017/18 and now.

Domestic violence applications and contravenions have similarly dropped, being down 47 and 36 per cent, respectively.

Lastly, young offenders are now far less prevalent in Cherbourg, with the 10-14, 15-19 and 20-24 age groups down 60, 67 and 44 per cent respectively - nearly 80 fewer offenders all up.

"That's because of the all of the heightened response initiatives, which have been led by the council predominantly," Insp Stahlhut explained.

"Like I said, this is having an impact here, and it's allowing us to be more proactive."

At the Thursday meeting, police were quizzed on whether they could use drones, ankle monitors or cameras in the community to further this downward trend in crime; Council staff also raised the question of a 24-hour police station in Cherbourg.

However, despite the good news presented by police, Cherbourg Mayor Elvie Sandow said there was still plenty of work to be done to keep the community safe.

"How does mandatory reporting come into that?" she asked Insp Stahlhut and Supt Shaw.

"A lot of those kids there are under child safety - where's the mandatory reporting? We're just going around in circles, and I'm not happy.

"We've been without a Police Liaison Officer for years - I think we're going to give up on PLO's. I know there were a couple of people that applied for the position, but they weren't who you guys wanted - it's just frustrating.

"And, in the meantime, while this is going on, our community misses out," she said.

Council chief executive officer Chatur Zala agreed with Mayor Sandow, urging police and the community to continue working together toward a better Cherbourg.

"All of us at the moment are looking for a solution, where we can solve the problem for the future and make this community a vibrant community," Mr Zala said.

"And we need to believe that we can do that. So it's not about blaming someone - we need to find a solution."

Council staff to receive pay rise while rates increase

Council staff in the South Burnett will this year see an increase in their wages for the first time since 2016, according to a recent council meeting - but rates in the region are also set to go up.

South Burnett Regional councillors gathered at Kingaroy's Warren Truss Chamber on 16 February to conduct their Executive and Finance & Corporate Standing Committee meeting, which, among other topics, discussed a scheduled rise to the earnings of council workers.

As seen on page 33 of the meeting's agenda, which was published on council's website, the committee discussed an item labelled "employee costs", which described a proposed pay rise to council staff.

"Salary and wages for the 2022-2023 period have been indexed by 1.25 per cent from the previous year to account for the increase

that will occur in January 2023 as part of the current [Enterprise Bargaining Agreement]," the agenda item read.

Council has listed its total staff wages in various publications over the past years, with the expenditure recorded as \$19,841,223 on page 109 of its 2020-21 Annual Report, and \$18,194,346 on page 79 of its 2021-22 Budget Report.

A 1.25 per cent increase to staff wages would, then, amount to between \$227,000 and \$248,000 annually.

A spokesperson for the South Burnett Regional Council stated that the local government organisation's leaders will, however, not have their pay increased.

"Councillors and senior staff, including [the] CEO, [are] excluded from [the] EBA payment schedule," they wrote in response to questions by Burnett Today.

"[The] Mayor and Councillors are under

the jurisdiction of the Local Government Remuneration Commission - [the] CEO is on a performance based contract," they clarified.

SBRC chief executive officer Mark Pitt, alongside three other senior managers, earns between \$200,000 to \$299,000 a year, with the Mayor, Deputy Mayor and councillors receiving \$133,196, \$83,247 and \$70,759, respectively.

This increase to council staff wages coincides with a proposed rate hike of over 3 per cent, which was discussed in the same meeting on 16 February.

"Council has increased their fees and charges from the previous year in the budget by a 3.5 per cent increment which is in line with the state CPI," the agenda item 'fees and charges' on page 34 of the report read.

"Fees and charges are currently being reviewed by the relevant manager. In preparation for 2022-2023, general rates and charges


are proposed to be modelled with 3.5 per cent indexation awaiting council direction," it continued.

This proposition could earn council an extra \$1.8 million in rates and charges over the 2021/22 amount of \$51,521,884, as outlined in the 2021-22 Budget Report.

A spokesperson for council said the proposed rate hike comes as State Government agencies continue withdrawing crucial funding from local councils - a loss which will have to be passed on to ratepayers.

"The Local Government Grants Commission has advised of [a] funding reduction of approximately \$500,000 per year, equivalent to almost 2 per cent on the general rate rise," they wrote.

"Inflation and building is now tracking at 3.5 per cent. Prior to the EBA being adopted, the overall staff body of council had not [had a] wage increase since 2016."



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Viper strikes, 15 arrested

South Burnett police's recent crack-down on property crime has seen 15 people arrested on almost 75 charges within a fortnight.

Darling Downs District Superintendent Danny Shaw said police officers hope the sting of the message of Operation Viper sticks around.

"Our message to those doing the wrong thing is – we will catch up with you and when we do, you will face the consequences of your actions," Supt Shaw said.

Police reported over the past fortnight of officers from the South Burnett Patrol Group joined forces with the Darling Downs District Tactical Crime Squad and Toowoomba Highway Patrol undertook a proactive and coordinated operation spanning from Kingaroy to Kilkivan, including Wondai, Murgon, Cherbourg and Goomeri.

Supt Shaw praised the hard work of the region's police throughout the operation which was led by Senior Sergeant Brett Everest, Officer in Charge at Murgon station.

"While this phase of the operation had come to a close, police would continue to target property crime in South Burnett and called on the community to continue to partner with police and report all theft or suspicious activity," he said.

Spate of business break-ins

Police will allege a 28-year-old Cherbourg man was a passenger in a stolen vehicle that evaded police on the Bunya Highway in Murgon on Thursday 10 February, which was later used in an attempted break-in at a Main Street Tingoora business.

Police linked the vehicle to a break in at a MacAlister St, Murgon business later that evening where a quantity of alcohol was stolen.

He was charged with one count of unlawful use of a motor vehicle, one count of attempt enter premise to commit an indictable offence, one count of enter premise to commit an indictable offence and one count of possess dangerous drugs and was refused police bail, and appeared in Murgon Magistrates' Court on Wednesday, 16 February.

A 20-year-old Cherbourg man was arrested at a Barber Street residence on Friday morning, 18 February before trying to flee police by escaping through a backyard and scaling a fence before being tackled by officers.

He was charged with the theft of the above-mentioned vehicle along with 24 other property, drugs and driving charges.

These charges include: allege vehicle thefts from Kingaroy and Goomeri residences and the burglary of a Mackenzie Street, Wondai business where a quantity of alcohol was taken, and the burglary of a Haager Drive, Moffatdale business where a cash register and lollies were stolen.

Police will allege this offender broke into a police officers wife's private vehicle on Thursday 10 February at their Tingoora home, while her detective husband was investigating linked property offences.

Officers later recovered the stolen personal property while investigating other alleged crimes the man is suspected of committing.

Threats to police

Detectives from Kingaroy CIB arrested a 51-year-old Googa Creek man following alleged threats made to harm police.

Police will allege that two pistols and multiple marijuana plants and utensils were found following the execution of a search warrant at a Googa Creek address on 9 February.

The man was charged with two counts of

unlawful possession of weapons, two counts of possess dangerous drugs, one count of produce dangerous drugs, one count of possess things used in the commission of a drug crime, one count of possess drug utensil, one count of possess explosives (ammunition) and one count of threat police.

Vehicle search

Toowoomba Highway Patrol, Blackbutt and Yarraman officers intercepted a vehicle driven by a 35-year-old Taabinga man on the D'Aguilar Highway at Gilla on 13 February following the driver being sighted allegedly using a mobile phone while behind the wheel.

Upon searching the vehicle, police will allege they recovered a cache of five knives, including two hatchets and a machete and drug utensils.

The man was denied police bail and charged with one count each of unlawful use of a motor vehicle, driving while disqualified by court order, fail to take reasonable care and precautions in respect of syringe or needle, possession of a knife in a public place and possess property suspected of having been used in connection with a crime. He was also issued with a number of traffic infringement notices.

Alleged burglary

Late Thursday night, 17 February detectives charged a 17-year-old Cherbourg boy with two counts of unlawful use of a motor vehicle, one count of burglary and one count of enter premise with intent to commit an indictable offence. He was refused police bail and was due to appear in Kingaroy Children's Court this week.

Teens charged with 29 offences after crime spree

Two teenage boys were arrested and charged with a combined 29 offences as a result of Operation Viper.

A 15-year-old Cherbourg boy was charged with 19 property related offences, including six counts of enter premise to commit an indictable offence, two counts of enter dwelling to commit an indictable offence, six counts of unlawful use of a motor vehicle, three counts of wilful damage, one count of burglary, and one count of stealing. He was denied police bail and will appear in Murgon Children's Court later this month.

In another teenage case, a region-encompassing crime spree came to an end after a 16-year-old Cherbourg boy was charged with a string of offences allegedly involving burglary, car theft, robbery using personal violence and stealing.

South Burnett police have linked the boy to an alleged six-day escapade of crime which saw extensive damage done to businesses and private persons in Kingaroy, Murgon, Goomeri, Kilkivan and Wondai between 6 and 11 February.

In a statement to the media, QPS South West Senior Constable Danielle Gordon said the boy's alleged rampage began in the late

hours of the night on Sunday 6 February.

"At about 10.30pm on 6 February, an offender is alleged to have broken into a Lister Court, Kingaroy address by cutting a front door security screen and through a glass sliding door.

Police will allege that vehicle keys were taken, along with a wallet, a quantity of jewellery, sunglasses and an iPod.

"The offender has also allegedly stolen a Mazda 3 bearing Queensland registration 626YOJ from the garage, which is still outstanding," Snr Const Gordon stated.

After two days, a string of further offences was recorded by police.

"At about 5pm on February 9, an offender is alleged to have attended a business located on Bligh Street, Kilkivan and has smashed the front glass door to gain entry," Senior Constable Gordon wrote.

"No property is alleged to have been stolen.

"At about 8.30pm that same night, an offender allegedly attended a Hodge Street, Goomeri address, where he gained entry to the residence, stealing two sets of car keys and two vehicles.

Both vehicles have since been recovered by police.

"At about 10pm, a business on the Bunya Highway, Kingaroy was broken into, where a quantity of alcohol was allegedly stolen," she stated.

"Around 10.50pm, a woman at Parkside Drive, Kingaroy was walking towards the front door of her residence when she was allegedly assaulted and her handbag taken from her.

"The offender also allegedly stole the victim's vehicle," Senior Constable Gordon wrote.

Police will allege the boy then continued his spree as part of a group.

The officers reported that on 10 February at 1.15am, the boy attended a Moffatdale Tourist Park with other alleged offenders, where they allegedly used an axe to smash the front sliding door to gain entry to the kiosk.

Police will further allege that an untidy search was conducted and a cash register, quantity of food items and confectionary were stolen.

"At about 4am, the alleged offender attended a service station on the Bunya Highway, Murgon, where he allegedly stole a

quantity of fuel.

"It is further alleged that the offender returned a short time later in a different vehicle to steal additional fuel.

"At about 5am it is alleged that the offender has attended a Mackenzie Street, Wondai business where he has gained entry to the business by breaking the rear door and entering the premises.

"It is further alleged he ransacked the premises and stole a quantity of money," the QPS media statement read.

The boy's alleged crime spree concluded there, a total of 12 hours after the first offence is thought to have been committed.

The boy is due to appear in the Murgon Children's Court later this month in relation to this incident and will face a charge of robbery using personal violence and nine other property related charges including three counts each of unlawful use of a motor vehicle and enter premise with intent, one count of attempted enter premise to commit an indictable offence and two counts of stealing.

Police investigations are continuing with respect to the apprehension of the driver and recovery of the stolen vehicle.

Battery recycling initiative powering up South Burnett

A new recycling enterprise has come to the South Burnett! B-cycle. The national government-backed scheme officially opened on Tuesday 15 February. The scheme recycles batteries.

Every year, Australians buy enough batteries to circle planet earth 2.3 times. New research reveals that there are currently more than 150 million loose or removable used batteries being stored in homes across the country, from tools to toys, wristwatches to remote controls, just waiting to be disposed of.

Most batteries have long been recyclable, but until now there were few places to take

them to be recycled.

The closest drop-off point can be easily identified by entering their postcode into the B-cycle website.

B-cycle is launching with 2351 drop-off points and the network is set to grow by an additional 1200 convenient drop-off points in the coming weeks.

There are three in Kingaroy, one at Aldi, another at Bunnings and the third at Woolworths. Drop-off points, including at Coles, will be added over the coming months as more battery collectors and recyclers become accredited.

Founded by the not-for-profit organisation,

the Battery Stewardship Council (BSC), the B-cycle Scheme is supported by the Commonwealth and all State and Territory Governments, authorised by the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC), and funded by the Federal Government and the battery industry.

The Assistant Minister for Waste Reduction and Environmental Management, Trevor Evans says batteries play a critical role in powering our everyday lives.

"The Australian Government has invested \$1 million for the Battery Stewardship Council to establish and launch B-cycle: our new national recycling scheme for batteries. All

Australians can help Australia move to a circular economy in which we routinely recycle and reuse our waste resources."

Libby Chaplin, chief executive of B-cycle said, "Our day to day lives are fast moving to a battery-powered world – yet the materials we rely on for those batteries are in limited supply. The new B-cycle Scheme brings people, businesses and communities together to make sure that no used battery goes to waste, protecting people, our planet, and future battery materials."

There are only three drop-off points in the Burnett so far, all in Kingaroy, but more are expected to be rolled out.

Grant helps keep cinema doors open for movie-goers

Kingaroy Cinema has been awarded a grant by the Federal Government to try and keep things ticking over.

The business has seen tough times since Covid-19 with the ensuing lockdowns, capacity limits and entry mandates limiting access for movie fanatics.

Maranoa MP David Littleproud said the Federal Government was keen to keep cinemas open by supporting the recovery of the arts and entertainment sector in Kingaroy with \$35,000 awarded to Kingaroy's Satellite Cinema under the Supporting Cinemas' Retention Endurance and Enhancement of Neighbourhoods (SCREEN) Fund.

"Independent cinemas are a vital component of our economic, social and cultural well-being – that's why we continue to provide one-off business continuity grants to support the cinemas' resurgence from prolonged closures and capacity restrictions," he said.

"This government has committed \$17.7

million to date from the SCREEN Fund to support 200 independent cinemas across the country to keep their doors open, continue offering employment opportunities, and carry on showcasing diverse stories to entertain their communities."

Graham Wilson, who owns and operates the Kingaroy cinema said there was a lot the

grant could be put towards.

"There's various things - retaining staff, rent on the premises, it depends where the shortfall is," he said.

Mr Wilson said because of the ongoing situation, there has been dwindling numbers.

"Our turnover has been anywhere from 70 per cent down to 40 per cent down - a sub-

stantial decline. Before it was poking along well, we were offering a good range of movies," he said.

Despite the setbacks, Mr Wilson is optimistic about the future of the cinema.

"We still believe people like to come out and watch it on the big screen with other people," he said.

"We hope they'll [audience] continue to come out when they feel it's safe to do. The cinema has been a safe environment."

The fund will be administered by Screen Australia. It is to support independent cinema operators with grants of up to \$85,000 if they have experienced significant declines in revenue due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The grant was originally announced on 26 March 2021 by the Minister for Communications, Urban Infrastructure, Cities and the Arts.

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

Politicians get behind Wondai RSL

Wondai's RSL may soon receive a much-needed and long-awaited upgrade, thanks to recent attention from State MPs, Senators and the local council.

The Wondai RSL sub-branch hosted a meet-and-greet lunch on Friday 4 February, welcoming Liberal-National MP for Callide Colin Boyce, Nanango MP Deb Frecklington and Queensland Senator Matt Canavan to the South Burnett town, where they were joined by South Burnett Mayor Brett Otto and Councillor Kathy Duff.

Mr Boyce, who took the opportunity to come to the region ahead of his fight for the Federal seat of Flynn this year, said that Wondai's RSL branch are hoping to rally politicians to get behind the construction of a new cenotaph and memorial garden.

"We spoke to the RSL guys there - they're wanting to shift the cenotaph and build another one," Mr Boyce explained.

"The cenotaph they have now was built many years ago and would likely break when moved," he added.

Nanango MP Deb Frecklington, who was also present at the lunch, said she was thrilled to get involved.

"It was terrific to go through the proposed plans for a Memorial Garden at the Wondai RSL with Sub-Branch Secretary David Scrimgeour," Mrs Frecklington said.

"The Sub-Branch have made a formal approach to Council regarding leasehold land between the RSL and the Wondai Pool, and they are currently awaiting Council approval.

"It is certainly a worthy project and on the face of it has my full support," Mrs Frecklington added.

As of writing, neither the Liberal National Party nor the South Burnett Regional Council have officially pledged funds or made commitments to the RSL's project; however, Callide MP Colin Boyce said he is aware of grant funding applications launched by the Wondai sub-branch to go toward the project.

"This is obviously a worthwhile project for the local community, so I'm hoping to get it on the wishlist for the next Federal election," he said.

Callide by-election candidates roll in

Voters in the State Electoral District of Callide have this month received their first look at some of the prospective candidates in the looming by-election, with an independent as well as a Liberal National Party member putting up their hands to replace current MP Colin Boyce.

Chinchilla local Bryson Head will enter the running for the incumbent LNP at just 26 years old, while independent Adam Burling from Biloela will contest the seat for a second time after a third-place finish in the 2020 election.

Mr Burling announced his candidacy on 16

February, describing the Callide electorate in a Facebook post as a "safe seat" which "works for the politician" - a development which he hopes to reverse, should he be elected.

Just two days prior to Mr Burling's announcement, LNP candidate Bryson Head entered the running for the Liberal-National dominated seat, with the geologist and mine worker hoping to take a country- and work-focused approach to the electorate.

The Australian Labor Party has as of writing not announced their candidate for the seat, with 2020 runner-up Gordon Earnshaw choosing to instead focus on supporting the campaign of Flynn hopeful Matt Burnett.

Mundubbera-based independent candidate Loris Doessel, who finished fourth out of five in the 2020 election, said she too will not contest the seat again this year.

The Electoral District of Callide will be forced to hold a by-election this year, after incumbent MP Colin Boyce announced his intentions to run for the Federal seat of Flynn; as per Section 44 of the Constitution of Australia, he will be forced to resign from his current position before officially declaring his candidacy for the Federal election.

The Electoral Commission of Queensland advised that this development will trigger a by-election in the coming months, but no official date has been announced as of writing.

Nominate to become Nanango Youth MP

Young people from the Nanango Electorate are encouraged to apply to become the Youth Member for Nanango at the upcoming 2022 YMCA Queensland Youth Parliament.

Member for Nanango electorate Deb Frecklington said nominations are now open for this year's youth parliament which kicks off with a forum from 8-10 April in Brisbane at Parliament House.

"More than 90 young people aged 15 to 25 will be selected to discuss the issues facing our youth and develop legislation that they will debate later in the year," said the MP.

"These young parliamentarians are selected to represent the 93 Queensland electorates based on their enthusiasm, ability to represent their communities and interest and passion for issues affecting Queensland. Four Indigenous members will also be selected to participate.

"All Youth Members are involved in committee meetings, mentoring, training and research to help produce the Bills to be debated at Parliament House during the residential week in Brisbane from 25 Sept - 1st October."

"Applications for the 2022 program close on 20th February, so I would encourage anyone interested to get in quick."

"Youth Parliament teaches young people about the government decision-making process while providing an excellent leadership

Members of BIEDO, Business Station and Business Leap will be present at the forum, holding a workshop for aspiring entrepreneurs


and small business owners titled 'How to grow your side hustle', revealing behind-the-scenes information on the assistance budding business owners can fall back on.





A treat for local readers

Avid readers flocked to Goomeri's Wimberley & Co Bookstore last Friday to receive a personal and in-depth look at 'Finding Amelia', the second novel by Sunshine Coast native James McAlloon.

The literary crowd welcomed the Gympie-born writer and tourism industry worker to Goomeri on Friday, 18 February for an evening of chats, snacks and drinks in an effort to find out more about his newest opus.

Coming as his second novel, and the first published under the pen-name James Wayne, 'Finding Amelia' incorporates the author's experiences of travelling, growing up in Australia and the Americas, and his love for literature.

"I think this is my first shot of being an author," Mr McAlloon said during an interview at the bookshop.

"[The book] included a lot of inspiration from my own life. There are parts of Chile in it, and actually people who were directly in my life. There are parts of growing up in Australia.

"The story has nothing to do with my life, but the settings and characters - those are pretty prevalent in this one," he explained.

'Finding Amelia' chronicles the efforts of the titular character, a beleaguered woman from New Plymouth on New Zealand's North Island, as she overcomes her struggles with drug abuse and mental health.

"It's a forgotten town, a very niche town on the North Island that's overshadowed by an active volcanic mountain," Mr McAlloon explained.

"It's just kind of stoic - it's been there for ages and is stagnant, kind of like an old industrial town. And it just really fit perfectly.

"I found [that] a lot of the themes are quite real, complex and sometimes dark - and, I don't know, it just seemed easier and more natural to make the character female," he said.

Following on from the success of McAl-

loon's first published novel, 2020's 'Drawn by Water', 'Finding Amelia' came about after the tourism industry worker found himself with plenty of free time as a result of the coronavirus pandemic.

Pledging to walk across Australia for charity, training sessions quickly turned into brainstorming exercises, which stoked the flames of what is now McAlloon's second novel.

"Being off work for six months was massive," he said.

"It was basically like 'Alright, well, you've got no excuse now!'

"Once I started, it just kind of flowed. So that was my day - go for a four- to five-hour walk to train for the walk I was preparing for and then come home and write everything I've thought about, and there's your eight-hour day," he added.

The Sunshine Coast-based writer cautioned potential readers that his newest book does deal with heavy themes, but that there is

a silver lining to the hardships his characters face.

"I think everybody can kind of relate to at least something that's going on in the book, which brings a connection," Mr McAlloon said.

"And it's real, because everyone goes through it in one way or another. It's not all fluffy, like on the internet.

"It's complicated, complex, realistic, but ultimately a feel-good story."

Gold horse, bronze statue

Wondai's Mate was a legend of his time.

A community group are looking to establish a tribute to his memory but need support to secure the project.

A thoroughbred-born, bred and broken in Wondai, he was a champion in the 1980s and had an amazing record of 73 wins and 34 placings in 121 race starts for \$456,536 in prize money -that's more than \$1 million in today's money.

Many of the Wondai community want to tribute a bronze statue to the winning beast. They think a life-sized statue would be not only a draw for tourists but also a point of connection for the people of Wondai with their past.

Felicity Reinke is the daughter of Daryl Reinke, the horse's driver. Reinke says the story of Wondai's mate is the "stuff of legends".

"He was one of the best horses in Australia at the time," she said.

"He was a once-in-a-lifetime type of horse.

"For people at the time it was huge, they used to take a bus down to the races, it was something for a community to get behind."

Reinke said she believes a statue of the champion would be a draw for visitors to the area.

"There's still a lot of people who travel Australia and that would be interested in coming."

Cr Scott Henschen is a major driving force behind the project.

He encouraged the community to get behind the project, but warned that it won't come cheap.

"What we are thinking of is a life-sized statue with the jig," he said.

The initial plan is to make the bronze statue with the cart so that visitors and guests can sit in the cart and take photos. The councillor notes such a large project will come with a large price tag.

"We need to do some serious fundraising," Cr Henschen said.

Cr Danita Potter is the council representative for Community, Arts, Heritage and Sport and Recreation. Cr Potter said the community will be able to have a lot of input.

"It will be in the style that the public wants... where the public wants it," she said.

To start the funding process, Cr Potter has started a GoFundMe page.

"We will need about \$300,000 for the statue," she said.

A similar form of funding successfully paid for Kingaroy's 'Big Peanut' which was erected last year. The community group raised the money from a local donations box, business donations and a GoFundMe page.

The group behind the Wondai's Mate project

ect thinks the same can be achieved for Wondai, but it will ultimately be up to the public to decide whether or not the statue is worth the price tag.

The surprise of the night was the defeat of Popular Aim, who was unable to fire in the wet conditions and finished third. Wondai's Mate now has a maximum points tally of 26 from his two heat wins and is, guaranteed a place in the March 26 final.

Record to Qld pacer

BRISBANE: One of Queensland's greatest pacers, Wondai's Mate, sets an Australian record for the mile at a pacing meeting in Maryborough yesterday.

The champion five-year old was timed at 1min 55.75cc in the one-mile mobile.

Racing from the pole line, Wondai's Mate never looked in danger under the guidance

of reinsman Daryl Reinke.

It beat the previous record of 1:55.8 set by Victorian stallion Gammalite in Perth earlier this year. Gammalite joins Wondai's Mate and another former record-holder Popular Aim in the eight-horse \$100,000 Craven Filter Sprint over one mile at Brisbane's Albion Park on October 15.

Wondai's Mate is the only Queensland pacer to earn more than \$100,000 in stakes in Queensland.

Top pacers for Qld sprint

Queensland officials announced yesterday seven of the eight pacers for the \$100,000 Craven Filter Sprint over 1600m at Brisbane's new Albion Park track on Saturday week.

As expected, Australia's current champions, Popular Aim, of Victoria, and Gammalite, of NSW, head the star-studded field.

Rising NSW star Steel Jaw, who recently smashed one of Popular Aim's Moonee Valley track records before his 14-race winning sequence was ended by Gammalite last week, has been invited.

Wondai's Mate, who broke a track record

at Maryborough last week, is Queensland's only representative.

The "Wondai Wonder" will put his Inter-dominion comeback attempt on the line against high-class New Zealander, Our Mighty Mc, who makes his Creek debut for John McMullen.

Our Mighty Me, who as Mighty Me earned more than \$100,000 in New Zealand, has been sent to McMullen to prepare for the Inter-dominion Series which begin on April 5.

But the return of Wondai's Mate to Albion Park will command the spotlight on Saturday.

"I'm really happy the way he's going," Reinke said yesterday.

"I was going to wait until next week to bring him back but his work has been so good I stepped up his program."

The humble Nanango Theatre Company's headquarters were transformed into a world-class acting school over the weekend with coach and Meisner-technique mentor, Mathew Costin leading a two-day workshop for a dozen eager participants.

Costin said he was impressed by the calibre of the local actors and actresses who poured their heart and soul into the intense experience, which explored techniques to allow participants to learn the ways of American theatre icon, Sanford Meisner who encouraged actors to focus on external factors for inspiration through several innovative techniques.

"Everyone has blown me out of the water with how fast they took to the techniques and excelled in the activities," he said.

"The goal was to help take local actors and the theatre company to new heights by arming them with the tools to create truly organic stories, relationships and characters on the stage and I think all of the participants have definitely achieved that this weekend."

There are only half a dozen people qualified to teach the Meisner technique in Australia and the South Burnett is fortunate to be home to one of them with Costin who trained at the Actors Pulse in Sydney under Billy Milionis, a personal student of Meisner himself.

"To have such a diverse and fun group of creative people in the one building was inspiring in itself," Costin said.

"The age range of the participants spanned from 17 to 83, with Nanango Theatre Company veteran Jocelyn Richardson the oldest person I've ever taught the workshop to and she was an absolute crackerjack all weekend."

The youngster of the weekend and Nanango Theatre Company newcomer, Reggie Jenner (17), said he gained plenty of valuable tips and tricks for his upcoming stage debut.

Paulini on racism, murder and 'that' famous gold dress

Paulini Curuenavuli moved to Australia from Fiji when she was just four-years-old. The next several years were tared with racism and the murder of her oldest brother. In their chat, Paulini shares with Matt her memories of that time, and how she honestly felt after the offensive comments about her famous Australian Idol gold dress.

Matt Collins: You moved to Australia from Fiji when you were four. What do you remember of that time?

Paulini Curuenavuli: I don't remember much of Fiji, all I remember is we used to have a little pond beside where we lived and there were a lot of fish in there. I remember me and my dad walking into the pond and you could hear the splashing of fish. I can't even remember getting on a plane. But I do remember going to school here.

MC: I don't like to remember much of my



schooling. It sounds to me like you had a similarly less-than-ideal time at school?

PC: One hundred per cent yes.

MC: Was that because you had come from a different country?

PC: To be honest with you I used to get a lot of racial comments from other kids. I grew up in the eastern suburbs of Sydney and it traumatised me to be honest. I think about that stuff now and I just don't want to go there. I just try to block that stuff out.

MC: It was around that time that your oldest brother was shot and killed. It must have been a hell of a lot to work through.

PC: I guess I just blocked a lot of stuff out. I have no idea how I got through all that. My family didn't really believe in going to a coun-

sellor so I never dealt with it. It was taboo to even talk about going to see a therapist - all you had to really do was to pray about it and talk to God about how you felt.

MC: Let's talk about that famous gold dress on Australian Idol. When Dicko said what he said about your dress, suggesting you should lose some weight, how did that impact you?

PC: My parents taught us kids to forgive and love. You just never forget you know.

MC: Was there a part of you that when that dress was offered to you, that you didn't feel confident?

PC: I didn't feel 100 per cent confident, I am being 100 per cent real with you right now.

MC: Did you say anything?

PC: I didn't say anything because when I was growing up I was very shy and very reserved and I just didn't have the confidence to say I didn't feel comfortable in these clothes.

A spicy story of success

When New Zealander Glen White left the banking and finance scene behind 10 years ago for a simple life in the bush, he would likely have laughed when told about his future as the South Burnett's hot sauce baron.

A decade later, and he has become just that: at the helm of his Ballogie-based business Chinchilli, Glen has carved out a niche and reputation for himself as one of Queensland's leading producers of artisan sauces and chilli products.

Now, the Chinchilli online store sells close to a dozen chilli sauces, jams and seasonings - all home-grown and produced by hand by Glen himself on a 40-acre plot and purpose-built manufactory in the Moreton Bay area.

The White family has been in possession of the Ballogie farm since the late 1990s, with Glen working for one of Australia's banks out-of-state, before ultimately retiring from his career.

"I was thinking that I wanted to do something other in life than banking and finance, because that was a stressful job," he recounted.

"One day I said to my wife 'that's it, I'm tossing this' - and then [the chillies] started!

"What actually inspired it all was when I was in Akaroa, in New Zealand.

"I saw a bottle of 'Kaitaia' - a hot sauce they have there - and bought some.

"I tried it and thought 'I can make that!' That turned out to be a bit easier said than done - it took us the better part of 10 years to get it right," he laughed.

During its infancy, the Chinchilli farm was home to nearly 50 different varieties of the spicy pepper - now, after much trial and error, the Whites have narrowed their scope down to just under half a dozen species.

"People think that since we've got this chilli

farm, it's all rolling hills of chilli bushes - but it's actually just five plots of 400 square metres each," Glen said.

"Most of the rest of the property we've left as bush for the cows to walk around in."

Alongside chillies and a vast grove of olive trees, Glen has recently started planting and

harvesting tomatillos, a close bedfellow of the standard tomato.

"The beauty with tomatillos is that you can get three harvests a year," Glen said, with the fruits of his labour now represented in Chinchilli's 'Tomatillo Sauce' - a mild sauce that is abundant in zesty flavour."

Besides the ever-popular online store, Chinchilli products are also distributed to a range of businesses in south-east Queensland, New South Wales, and even as far south as Tasmania.

"Covid did have some advantages, in a way," Glen said.

"Internet [shopping] has just caught fire, and we do free postage if you buy four bottles. We'll definitely have to expand it a bit more," he added.

One of Glen's personal favourites is his take on harissa, a chilli paste popular in North Africa.

"The main ingredients in it are cayenne pepper and smoked capsicum," he explained.

"We can't make enough of it! You can use it when you're making the sauce for lamb shanks, restaurants use it as a sauce on steaks - it's amazing."

Another Chinchilli product that has seen plenty of success is 'Pumpkin Chilli Jam' - a nod to Goomeri's annual Pumpkin Festival.

Having now celebrated 10 years of the success story that is Chinchilli, Glen White can look back on the trials and tribulations of owning and operating a small country business - one which he likely never imagined to take off the way it did.

"The idea of the business was to just be me and my wife, and for it to be a bit of an experiment," he recounted.

"We wanted to have this small business that we like doing and didn't feel like work - and it took off in only 10 years! The last 12 months or so it's gone through the roof.


Work at the farm and production at the factory is now near-constant.

"The only off-season we have is around this time, from December to January - normally it's just too hot," Glen said.

"But you don't need a lot of land to do this thing!"

We have nearly reached the end of summer, but with warm days still ahead now is a great time to enjoy the recently upgraded facilities at Gayndah's Claude Wharton Weir Recreation Park. The additions include new BBQ's, safety bollards, freshly sealed car

parks, and new turf. We are thankful to RuralAid who contributed \$47,000 towards this project.

Currently underway are the Airstrip upgrades across many North Burnett airstrips thanks to funding received from the Australian Government as part of the Regional Airports Program. The return of the Wolves

Wondai and Proston's legendary Wolves have returned back to their den thanks to the request of some of their loyal cubs.

The South Burnett Rugby League club has been reinvigorated and aims to have junior teams and a senior A-grade side ready for the 2022 season.

Wondai Proston Wolves Rugby League Club President Mick Astill is keen to see the Wondai pride return to the pack.

"We're just trying to build a culture that people in Wondai are proud of and want to come back to, that kids are proud to play in their hometown," he said.

The senior A-grade side have started pre-season training with more than 23 players regularly on the field already on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The Wolves are putting out the call for more nominations and are hoping for an increase in junior players, with plans to pull together an under-6, under-8, under-10 and under-12 sides. They are unable to field an under-14s side due to numbers.

"We really need people to come back to Wondai," Astill said.

"We want Wondai, Tingoora and surrounding areas playing at Murgon and Kingaroy - we want people to know we've got a new, friendly committee."

Astill pulled on Wondai's iconic yellow jersey in 2011 and 2012 to play for the senior A-grade team before retiring due to an injury.

In 2017, Astill's son started playing for the Wolves.

Sadly, the Wondai club numbers started to drop off and by 2019 they were unable to field a team in his son's age group.

They still had a senior A-grade team play that year, which struggled to have a healthy number of reserves each week.

"We went and started playing at Murgon in 2019 because the club didn't have enough players and I coached at Murgon," he said.

Over the last four years there had been a slow drop off in club numbers.

The Wolves hid away in 2020 as the Covid-19 pandemic set in and had no action on the field.

Astill's youngest son Noah really wanted to play for Wondai and so a group of their friends from Wondai formed an under-6s Wolves team in 2021.

The under-6s side was joined by a senior

team last year.

"My 10-year son Ryan wanted to come back to the club," he said.

"So we got together with a group of friends and decided we needed to get the club up and running and we're all from Wondai," he said.

Astill said this journey itself to bring back the Wolves will be one of his favourite all time moments.

"The way that the club has been turned around and the change in the club that we've put in the last six months is probably the best highlight for me," he said.

Astill is proud of his children's passions for the Wondai Proston Wolves and hopes that town pride continues to grow within the club.

"It's my kids that have brought us into the committee," he said.

"My children's pride in Wondai as a town, and persuading us to take on the role is one of the best things about it."

Astill is currently training with the senior team and looks forward to potential opportunities for his boys to watch him play footy.

Wondai Wolves was a family tradition for Bob, Geoff and Ken Dennien.

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

The power of the pack

Written and told by Michael Close

Michael Close played in the front row of the Wondai's All Stars Reunion team in 1991.

Michael was the big gun in almost all of the games played in the late '70s and early '80s. He was an outstanding attacking forward whose big hits and on-field organisation made closely a target for all opposition packs. A player who never took a backward step he is the player more than any other in the '80s who instilled the great Wondai pride in all his team mates. His performances during 1978 when he was almost unstoppable and his determination to win, which was never more evidently shown than in the 1982 Grand Final, makes Michael Close an all-round footballer in a class of his own.

Here's one of Michael's memories of his days as a Wondai Wolf:

I remember as a young wolf cub sitting in the dressing room preparing for our next game surrounded by legends.

Everyone had shiny freshly polished boots fitted with new white laces we looked like footballers.

That is what my mum used to say "if you want to be a footballer you have to look like a footballer" and pride, that is what we felt.

My heart would be pumping waiting for the moment Freddy Hodge would untie that jersey bag and hand out one by one those beautiful garments that we all loved and wore with so much pleasure.

Man they felt unreal, freshly washed and folded to perfection by the ladies we all loved Tess Kemp, Daph Ogden and Meg Goodhew. The ladies would have them arranged and stacked in a canvas bag numbers facing up-

ward in numerical order 1 to 17. I swear I could hear them talking to each other in that bag.

I know I could feel the power as I slid mine into position. By the look on the faces of everyone we all felt that rush and the fire was roaring.

Freddy Hodge told us he had to place a chain around the top of the bag with a heavy duty pad lock after Trunksy's had got out one day and tackled two Nanango blokes who came over one Saturday for the Wondai races.

Another night he caught two sidled up to the RSL bar telling Terry Wex how they were going to give Nanango a good flogging on Sunday.

Now one day midweek I travelled to Kingaroy to spend the night with my parents, on the previous Sunday Wondai had played the Red Ants ending in a fiery win for the mighty Wolves.

After a pleasant dinner and fine wine I rolled off to bed only to be awakened by a crazy ruckus going on in the downstairs laundry at 2.30am.

Now not realising my mum being a closet Redant supporter, she had offered to wash their jerseys and when I opened the laundry door they had one of my old Wolves jerseys I had given my dad, stored with his fishing clothes in the laundry cupboard.

In there it was cornered and it was fighting back with guts and Wondai determination, I sang out to that mighty wolf "keep going mate you'll clean 'em up before dawn".

Mum called me few days later and said I don't know what happened in the laundry the other night but it took me three days to soak the blood out of those Kingaroy jerseys I had just washed.

The Wolfpack has been led by legends

One of the Wolves' greatest claims to fame is Brisbane Broncos legend Steven 'Pearl' Renouf.

The centre was one of many top quality players bred in the South Burnett.

Newspaper reports recorded that he had played in an A-grade President's Cup on the wing and later at centre for the Wondai Wolves against old rivals Murgon in which he 'crossed for four tries'.

He attended Murgon State High School and was selected to play in the Queensland Schoolboys team against New South Wales and in the national schoolboys championships.

Renouf debuted as a 19-year-old in the

1989 Brisbane Broncos season, scoring his first try for the club in 1990.

Over a decade after leaving the Broncos he was still the club's all-time leading try scorer, having amassed a total of 142 tries.

He played 212 Broncos Games, 11 Queensland State of Origin games, 9 International Australian Rugby League Tests, and was part of 4 premierships winning teams for the Broncos.

Another 'great' Wolf was South Burnett Team of the Century player and Wondai Wolves life member Alan 'Wal' Trunks.

Trunks took to the field as a junior and senior Wolf and witnessed some of the South Burnett legends including Percy Iszlaub who

played representative football for 17 years and the Wolves for 21 years.

He played for multiple representative sides over the years and invested time into coaching teams.

One of Trunks' noticeable moments was the Wolves' victory in the 1978 grand final, when he was the captain and coach.

In recent years Trunks has been mentoring junior South Burnett players, including the under-15s and 16s South Burnett Eagles teams who took on the challenge of the Toowoomba competition in 2021.

"He's a great mentor for the squads -he's in his 70s and practically never misses a game or training," Junior Eagles Head Coach Matt Jones told Burnett Today last year.

"Without people who run the clubs there is no local sport," he said.

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





SCULPTING AN IMPACT IN A SMALL SPACE

AS backyards shrink, new ideas for gardens are on the rise. Smaller areas have necessitated a rethink in how to design outdoor spaces for maximum impact and practicality.

For a property where the back fence is just five metres from the house, this once would have been seen as a garden drawback. However, clever homeowners are beginning to turn it into a positive by creating an intimate courtyard effect.

The simplest method to achieve this effect is through strategically placed dense planting, seating, fence screens and even walls.

One of the nicest finishing touches to a leafy courtyard is a piece of garden art or an eye-catching sculpture.

The positioning of a sculptural piece is as important a consideration as its context and style.

Some points worth noting include:

- Will it get in the way of foot traffic?
- Will it move, possibly dangerously, in strong winds?
- Will it be tripped over or bumped into at night?
- Will it eat up too much of, or be a hazard to, the children's play area?
- Is the material used weather-resistant?
- Will it need special lighting to achieve maximum impact?

Getting the size right is also important. Big sculptures need to be viewed from a distance and lack contextual balance in small areas. On the other hand, small pieces need to be actually seen — and placed with



safety in mind.

Garden sculptures come in lots of different materials and, along with aesthetics, durability is key. Metal and wooden pieces can rust or rot over time, glass can be easily chipped, but stone, marble and concrete are ones to keep on keeping on. Concrete sculptures are probably the most cost-effective but check for chips, folds or cracks before taking one home.

Garden sculptures lend themselves to imaginative quirkiness, classic elegance, cheeky kitsch, spiritual statements or free-form expression. Remember, there are no rules that can't be broken so get sculpting. ●

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Running with the Wolves

1930s

Owing to the unavailability of records, the origin of the Wondai Football Club cannot be pinpointed. However, what we do know is that the Club was playing competition football at the Wondai Showgrounds up to 1932. In 1933, with the permission of the Methodist Cricket Club, who had cleared an area for play down on the Wondai Creek Flat, the Club changed its venue, and from that year all games have been played there.

Premierships won in the 1930s are not known, but banking on the memories of the older members of the club, it can be stated that Wondai won the Lower South Burnett Premiership in 1933 and 1939.

A few players of this era that come to mind are Jack Shipway, Cliff Brown, Owen Karey, Paddy Ryan, Jack Mycock, Bernie Magnussen, the unforgettable Bas O'Gorman and Mr Wondai Football Club himself, Tom Kemp.

With the advent of World War II, football lapsed in Wondai although some unofficial matches were played in the later war years. According to John Brown, in 1934 the Lower South Burnett Association was reformed, the clubs participating were Wooroolin, Wondai, Proston, Murgon and Goomeri.

1940s

Wondai Football Club had the honour in 1947 of winning the Premiership undefeated. Some players of this team were Tom Kemp, Percy Pszlaub, Jack Rutledge, Noel Rickards, Bill Hunt, George Greentree, Bob Wenck, Percy Hull, Cliff Jury, Roger and Bunny Bilsborough, Snow Huston and Bob Hetherington. Throughout the forties some outstanding administrators appeared upon the scene: George Robinson, RZ (Scotty) Forsyth, Jack (Sarge) Rutledge, George Greentree, Rex Burrows and others displayed a high example of dedication

to office which has been an inspiration to following officials.

1950s

The early fifties brought about some changes to football with the inclusion of Nanango and Kingaroy in the South Burnett Association. Wondai, whilst having some top players in the team, struggled to win games in the first half of the decade. Proston Club folded in 1950, and this saw the start of an influx of players to the Club from Proston - the first of these being Terry Madden, Eddie Douglass and Mick McDowell in 1951. This involvement of players from Proston and also Dulong and Boondooma has carried on over the years and has been a tremendous benefit to the Wondai Football Club.

We cannot let the fifties slip by without mention of G.T. (Tom) Kemp. In 1956, Tom took over the reins of the Club as President and continued for an unbroken seventeen years.

In the later fifties some exceptional young talent emerged through the junior ranks. Players like Bob Dennien, Col Elliott, Ken Taylor, John Boyle, Tony and Bill Cattanach, with the support of the older heads like Percy Iszlaub, Ron Schultz and Nev Reinke made Wondai again a force to be reckoned with.

Their efforts were rewarded in 1958 with an outstanding win in the Grand Final defeating Nanango 13-10, claiming the Ambulance Cup.

The South Burnett Times reported that Wondai held off a determined second half challenge by Nanango to narrowly win the Ambulance Cup 13-10 at the Wondai Sports-ground before a crowd that contributed a 'gate' of 72 pounds and 9 shillings, at just three shillings a head.

A player that stood out in the game was young Wondai lock forward Bob Dennien.

"With limited knowledge of positional play and the finer points of the game, Dennien has

nevertheless played good last-man-down-football this season and with coaching should show Brisbane (Western Suburbs) football to good advantage."

The Times went on to report that at the conclusion of the game the trophy was presented to the Wondai Captain on behalf of the Ambulance Committee, by committee member Mr Jim Sorrensen of Murgon who also presented the reserve grade cup.

"The game was fast, rugged and chock-full of incident and apart from the stoush stuff, provided a fitting finale to a most successful season."

1970s

In 1971 a loan of \$6000 was obtained from the Wondai Shire Council and the old Court House was moved down to the grounds - Wondai at last had a clubhouse.

Also in 1971, an international game of Rugby League was played between Great Britain and the Wide Bay, proving that in Wondai they had the playing surface and facilities equal to anywhere in Country Queensland.

In 1976 the Wondai Wolves won their first South Burnett A-Grade Premiership in 11 years when they defeated Kingaroy 10-8 in a thrilling grand final at Murgon. The South Burnett Times reported on 15 September, 1976 that: a record crowd which paid \$2968 to watch the match stayed to the end to see Wondai grab the lead six minutes from fulltime and hold it, if only by the 'skin of their teeth'.

By 1978, the Wolves handed out one of the greatest thrashings ever witnessed in an A-grade premiership final, according to the South Burnett Times. They scored 10 tries to nil, Wondai completely outplayed the previous year's premiers Nanango to win 42 nil.

1980s

In the early 80s, Coach Greg Bell led the 85

Wolves to a narrow win in a gripping Grand Final against arch rivals Murgon winning 24-22.

Winger Phillip Kinsela starred with a three try haul and together with Russell Nugent, Steve Cooper, Graeme Champney, Shane Tucker and Ken Dinnien to name just a few, Wondai on their day during 1985 were exhilarating.

1986 was also a great year for Wondai with all three teams making the Grand Final. The Under-19 team had a great win over Cherbourg 14-22, the Reserve Grade after a great year losing to Blackbutt 14-28 (their only premiership loss for the season) and under coach Wayne Dawson the 'A' Grade came out winners over Nanango in a great game 12-6. Craig Campbell shone for Wondai at five eight with an immaculate kicking game and scoring a brilliant individual try. Other great performers were Ashley Newson, Greg Bell, Willie, Frank and Darryl Harrison, David Andersen, Scott Holding and the Dennien Brothers.

Mention must be made here of the efforts of the Reserve Grade teams over the year. The last premiership win was in 1961 and since that time the boys have appeared in numerous Grand Finals without success. They have played fine football over the years and it must be frustrating to come so close and find that once again that premiership has eluded them.

On Friday, 29 April 1988, 120 guests attended the official opening of the G.T. Kemp Clubhouse. At a cost of \$87,620 the Clubhouse finally became a reality after years of discussions. The clubhouse was named in honour of former club president Mr Tom Kemp who served as the club president for 18 years.

Community at the footy

Teams wearing the Wolves' signature yellow jersey are not the only ones using the Wondai football grounds as their den this year.

Newcomers the South Burnett Eagles and returning Vikings, the South Burnett Thrashers, have both called Wondai their home ground in 2022.

Wondai Proston Wolves President Mick Astill welcomed the South Burnett Women's Rugby League team and the South Burnett Thrashers Rugby Union team.

"It's created a bit of community at the sporting grounds," said Astill.

Brittany Holding, the area coordinator for the South Burnett Women's Eagles team, said the local competition has been highly anticipated by all players.

Holding has also taken on the role as the Wondai Proston Wolves' communications and marketing coordinator, forming a strong bond between the two clubs.

They will join a new competition launched by Queensland Rugby League in 2022 which will allow female players in the Wide Bay-Burnett region to experience their fair share of games against other local teams.

The South Burnett, alongside its sister region to the north, will each field a team in the Wide Bay women's rugby league competition, where they will face their neighbours Bundaberg and Fraser Coast.

"We have pretty good numbers – all in all we're looking at about 10 to 12 girls for each age group who are keen," Holding said. "For opens, we have about 25 ladies keen, and there were even more who couldn't make it to our come-and-try day. They come from all over – from Cherbourg to Blackbutt.

"Our fixtures are going to be starting around Easter. We're hoping to play our home games out of Wondai, because it's central for everyone."

Late last year the South Burnett Thrashers announced their intentions to make a comeback in 2022.

Former player and club president Jamie Shirlaw said many people had already shown interest in the rugby union team. "It's very exciting to see rugby union in the South Burnett again," he said.

"I was a player when it folded [in 2013], I'll now be helping on the side-line, there's a few former players coming on board to help get it back again."

They are planning on forming a men's team to play in the Sunshine Coast division.

"If anyone is interested in learning about rugby, they don't have to have played rugby union in the past, we're more than happy to teach new players about the game," Shirlaw said.

Percy Iszlaub sets the play straight

Percy Iszlaub was the Wondai Wolves' front row player in the 1991 'Wondai Wolves All Stars' reunion team and became a Wondai legend.

Percy was a tough uncompromising forward of the old school, Percy had a very long and honourable career as a Wondai footballer and administrator.

Starting as a hooker he got too heavy for his props, Percy switched to the front row and played countless games for Wondai, South Burnett and the Wide Bay.

A huge runner and solid defender, he revelled in the hard going and didn't mind the odd stoush or two. Percy was a great example

of what the Wondai Football Club was all about.

This was one of the club's favourite stories about Percy:

During a local match between Blackbutt and Wondai, during the game the number 7 for Blackbutt when it came time for a scrum was feeding the ball in to his own hooker, which in those days was a big no-no.

This went on for a few scrums and Percy Iszlaub, a Wondai Legend and renowned hard man, front rower told the half back, "If you don't start feeding the ball into the middle of the scrum you are going to pay for it".

Well the next scrum the number 7 for

Blackbutt without hesitation does the same thing, he feeds the ball in to directly to his own hooker. So Percy reaches out of the scrum and proceeds to pull the halfback into the scrum and rakes him back to his second rowers and lock forward, leaving him covered in marks and worse for wear.

After the commotion and all the dust had settled, the halfback must have had a change of heart, and from that point on he fed the ball correctly.

This story is a club favourite and is told by Percy Iszlaub.

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Q&A with Marty Holding

Marty Holding can be found at the Wondai Proston Wolves Club grounds most afternoons ensuring everything is ready for the season, coaching a junior team, training with the seniors or attending committee meetings. Burnett Today caught up with Marty to find out why he has been so keen to run with the wolves in 2022:

What's been your involvement with the Wondai Wolves?

I'm part of the sponsorship committee, I'm the grounds coordinator and I'll be playing for the senior team and coaching the Junior league with the under-10s. I've been in and out of the club since 2009 -I haven't constantly been there. I played for three years from 2009, and again in 2015 and then 2017. I played in the South Burnett representative side in 2015. 2022 is my first year back since then and this time I'm really diving in deep to pick the club back up and get it back to its glory days.

What's your preferred position on the field?

Lock - I find it suits my style of the footy I play -being able to play in the middle and be able to expand to the edges in attack and defence. Lock is my preferred position.

What are you looking forward to most about the Wolves' return in 2022?

I'm really looking forward to getting life back in the club -the last few years there haven't been many junior teams. It'll be good to get the family club atmosphere back with lots of kids running around the paddock and a strong competitive senior team -which will be something for the kids to look up to. Without having those kids coming through to senior the club is not going to have a future. We can't just turn up expecting to have a good senior team. We have to start at the bottom and ground up by improving the grounds and facilities to make it appealing for families to come along -we've spent a lot of time working to improve the grounds and dressing sheds.

Your father Scott Holding is the coach of the senior team this year. What's been his involvement with the Wolves?

He was the captain and coach of the Wolves in the late 80s and 90s -when we resurrected the senior side. He was the coach and played those first few years in the club.

How has your dad inspired your Rugby League journey?

I grew up watching my father play for Wondai as a little kid -I've always been part of the Wondai club for that reason. I remember watching him and wanting to play for the same club he's played for. My dad has been the coach of the senior team, he's definitely been a big part of me wanting to play league and play for Wondai.

Wolves seniors have already started pre-season training. How are you feeling about the senior side for 2022?

I'm feeling really good, it's got a lot of potential there. We're looking at getting some pre-season games in there too. A lot of the boys who haven't played football together before, there's lots of new faces coming into the team... but there's lots of old faces coming

back that are looking forward to coming back on board. It's all about that bond and brotherhood -looking out for each other and playing for each other. If we can instil that back into the club and side we'll be looking really good going forward.

What's your favourite thing about the Wondai Proston Wolves Rugby League Club?

Back as a kid I remember it being a family outing watching dad playing football- that's a bit part of my life and now with me playing. And that brotherhood -I've played for a few other clubs but it seems the Wondai footy club has a great brotherhood amongst the boys.

If you could have anyone in the world on your RL team for a game who would it be and why?

I would have to say Cameron Smith -for me he goes down as the greatest man to play football -for what he did for Melbourne, Queensland and Australia and how long he did it for. it'd be amazing to play a game with him and see how the 'general' does it. If you put him on any side you'd bet that team would win.

As the 2022 under-10s coach, What's your best advice for any young Wolves starting their rugby league journey this year?

Make sure you're having fun with it, make sure

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
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Motoring

Let down by little things

Jolion sounds like one of those decent chaps in a Billy Bunter or Tom Brown's Schooldays caper – a young toff in a starched collar and a top hat.

It is, in fact, a compact sports utility vehicle from a Chinese company generally known for its cheap-as-chips workhorse utes.

To add to the incongruity, we are told by the maker, Haval Great Wall Motors, Jolion is Chinese for 'first love'. I suppose with a price range in the mid \$20k, what's not to love about the SUV.

STYLING

There is a touch of Hollywood about this 'first love'. The spotlight falls brightly on a grille with sparkling finish and horizontal accents to create a bold, if flashy, show.

The 'main event' is flanked by LED headlamps, foglamps and a most striking set-up of daytime running lights. The car's profile is standard SUV lines, while the back is plain, if a little hunchbacked.

INTERIOR

Soft-touch surfaces, aluminium-style accents and leather-wrapped steering wheel give a premium look to the cabin on the surface, but hard plastic butts in to cheapen the image, not to mention the rubber surround of the rear-view mirror coming adrift at a touch.

Seats, in Comfort-Tek material, are heated up front, the driver getting a six-way adjustable spot. The rear has class-leading leg and

shoulder space.

Storage is taken care of by a central bin and a pair of cupholders in two sizes in the centre console, while door pockets can fit bottles.

Boot space is not left behind, checking in at 430 litres, expanding to 1133 litres with the 60:40 second row stowed. A space-saver spare nestles under the floor.

INFOTAINMENT

Connectivity is front and centre with a 10.25-inch colour multimedia touchscreen linked to Apple CarPlay and Android Auto.

A 7-inch LCD instrument display carries a range of system info.

The position of the touch screen on the centre dash of the test car had its problems,

with air-con controls underneath easy to catch accidentally while resting the palm on working the screen.

Audio is handled by a six-speaker system, while dual-zone air-conditioning keeps occupants in relative comfort.

ENGINES/TRANSMISSIONS

Power is delivered to the front wheels by a re-engineered 1.5 litre turbo-petrol engine with 110 kW of power and 210 Nm of torque mated to a seven-speed dual-clutch transmission.

SAFETY

Safety is expansive with autonomous emergency braking, lane departure warning, lane keep assist, blind-spot monitoring, adaptive cruise control, traffic sign recognition and rear cross-traffic alert standard across the range.

DRIVING

New from the ground up like its larger sibling, the new H6, the Jolion, a replacement for the H2 is underpinned by Haval's new global light-weight modular platform to appeal to a wide range of driving needs.

The 1.5 litre petrol engine, with the turbo slow to catch on at times when setting off, delivered up to 110 kW and 210 Nm to the test car front wheels smoothly through a the seven-speed dual-clutch transmission once the vehicle was up to speed.

As far as fuel consumption is concerned the claimed combined urban / highway cycle of 8.1 litres of premium unleaded per 100 kilometres, compared with the 10 litres per 100

kilometres recorded on test in a range of driving conditions.

For those interested, four different drive modes – standard, eco, sport and snow - are available on demand. With eco snail-like and sport highlighting the small engine syndrome, standard was an acceptable all-rounder.

After a serious bout of gardening, my back was worse for wear. I don't think I could have enjoyed a long(ish) journey in the Jolion Lux. Despite looking good, the seats were hard and generally unsupportive.

The keyless entry also had a mind of its own – at times not unlocking the driver's door to the touch of the handle. The key fob button was the backup.

Don't get me on about the 'spy' camera with its constant eye on the driver from its elevated spot on the A-pillar. Whatever motivated the Chinese to come up with this Cyclops of a driver fatigue monitoring system?

This one-eyed monster supposedly checks the driver's concentration level and if it deems it to have elapsed, flashes up the message on the multimedia screen "Hey, don't stray".

Other warnings included one about the position of the vehicle ahead (which wasn't there).

It all became a niggling bore.

SUMMARY

So, what's not to love about the Jolion? Apart from the keen pricing, there is quite a bit, actually. The Chinese compact SUV could best be described as a work in progress.

Looking for collaboration

One of the best things about AgForce's School to Industry Partnership Program (SIPP) is seeing the smile on a kid's face when they hold a lamb in their arms or 'drive' a tractor for the first time.

It's something I, the SIPP team, teachers, family members, and anyone who helps deliver the numerous SIPP events, never grow tired of.

During the past five years more than 23,000 primary and secondary school students, 2200 teachers, and 450 industry partners have participated in a SIPP event – two of those years during the Covid-19 pandemic.

While it's true that COVID has shone a spotlight on the importance of our nation's food security, a 2018 National Farmers' Federation poll revealed that 52 per cent of 18 to 29-year-olds felt disconnected from farming and uninformed about the agriculture industry.

Research also estimates that to keep up with our food production demands Australia's agricultural job market requires more than 4,000 new people entering the workforce each year, but there are now only around 300 agricultural graduates produced annually, and 700 when related courses are considered.

Recent agricultural college closures have clearly only increased the intrinsic value of SIPP to society.

SIPP raises awareness about the importance of agriculture to our daily lives, promotes the diversity of interesting, rewarding careers in agriculture, and provides opportunities for children and teachers to experience agriculture and the people who work in it 'up close and personal' – helping them better understand the connections between modern life and agricultural production.

Funding from the Federal Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment and the Queensland Department of Employment, and Small Business and Training has paved the way for the growing number of requests from Queensland schools to engage with AgForce's SIPP.

Significantly, we need continued support and collaboration – especially from the government – if SIPP is to continue to thrive.

Continued and even increased support will allow AgForce's SIPP team to go on running programs and events that further highlight the importance of agriculture to current and future generations – all while putting a smile on the face of every kid (and adult) who attends them.

Weeds are the topic of conversation again this week

I had a very long tour last week of much of New South Wales' grain-growing areas. I certainly travelled a lot of roads, did a lot of talking on field days, along with several paddock inspections.

I also took some photos of which the included photo is one.


It's of a 2021 winter cereal block, that has had some 150 odd millimetres of rain on since harvest in early December.

Does anyone want to guess what the crop is there from my early morning photo? It's in the Southern NSW farming country.

This supposed "crop" is our well-known Queensland weed of Fleabane. According to locals, it's supposedly the tall fleabane species and not the easier to kill Flaxleaf fleabane that is one of 7 naturalised species in Australia.

Don't get me wrong we have plenty of our own Tall Fleabane or Conyza Sumatrensis in Queensland which is proving non-sensitive or even resistant to both Glyphosate or Paraquat herbicides.

To my knowledge it is quite easy for a single robust growing Fleabane plant to produce 100,000 seeds and sure, not all these seeds



may germinate with germination percentages ranging from 5 per cent to 40 per cent.

Still, it's an awful lot of viable seed around, isn't it?

Have another closer look at my photo of this former wheat paddock.

That is fairly solid Fleabane and, in this case, like many others down there, is definitely called a weed and not just a plant out of place.

Now there is oodles of this plant through the environment down that way in those lighter soils and roadsides and it is hard to know if it started as a roadside problem and spread through the paddock fences or the other way round.

One thing that was very obvious to me

was the huge area infested with this massive problem plant called Fleabane, with its massive taproot system.

When I talk about Area Wide Management of Weeds in our Queensland environment, this is exactly the sort of problem I am trying to avoid up here. Area Wide Management or AWM of weeds is saying to all landowners or land managers plus local government and

state main roads departments, that full cooperation is certainly the effort needed to avoid any situation like this one pictured occurring here in Queensland.

One positive bit of knowledge is that the very old and well used broadleaf herbicide of 24-D is still successfully controlling all these three known local species of Fleabane.

Nevertheless, using 24-D around sensitive crops like cotton, tomatoes, grapevines etc to name a few, can be fraught with danger from these very small, aerosol-size escaped droplets of spray solution we call drift.

Now I have no idea how on earth they will get control over this very prolific broadleaf weed in that southern zone of NSW with their crop sensitivities in that region.

Perhaps if I keep harping on about herbicide resistance, WeedSmart Big 6 tips and tactics, come-clean go-clean principles, and we all work together in this Area Wide Management process, then perhaps we may not end up with the exploded numbers of out-of-control weeds or plants out of place that my Southern landowner friends have.

That's all folks.

Two junior Nanango Scorpion players will be ones to watch in the years to come as they work their way towards playing professional cricket.

Thomas Town and Lachlan Cullen played for the Under-14s representative side Coastal Burners in the State Championships on the Sunshine Coast in mid-January.

"I hope to play professionally one day because I really enjoy my cricket," Cullen said.

Cullen is aiming high, inspired by his 'cricket hero' and fellow batting all-rounder Marnus Labuschagne who has played internationally for the Australian National Team, for Queensland and Brisbane Heat. The Coastal Burners consists of players selected from the Wide Bay

and Sunshine Coast to represent the wider region in state competitions.

"My highlight was playing with new people and making new friends," Cullen said.

Town had a similar positive experience.

"It was a surprise and a privilege to be a part of the team and the state competition," he said.

"I enjoyed the whole week at Maroochydore, it was great working with new teammates and making new friends."

The 2022 Under-14s Coastal Burners came fourth in the state competition, and they won two games out of five.

"Our last game got rained out but they had a higher run rate than us so we lost," Cullen said.

Town explained that their wins were typically in the 50 over games and the losses were in the 20/20 games.

"Playing in a higher level competition was really good," Town said.

"A personal highlight was taking 4/16 off 7 overs against Northern Flames - the team of players from Cairns, Townsville and the far north."

At a local level the pair of 14-year-old cricket players both play for their local side, Nanango Scorpions, with Town claiming three years on the field and Cullen playing for the past five years. Town is a left arm fast bowler and usually opens the bowling in his matches.

Cullen favours batting and batted as num-

ber three in the State Championship carnival for the Coastal Burners.

Taking the opportunity to play at a representative level has widened the boys' understanding of cricket and their skill set.

"I felt really excited, but then again I was nervous because I had never made it this high," Cullen said.

"I learnt that this is a stronger level of cricket and it's a fun learning experience."

Playing with the Coastal Burners helped Town realise the hard work involved in playing above a local cricket level.

"To get to the next level you have to continuously work on your skillset and improve by training and hard work," he said.

Committed to the cause

A very important round of cricket was held over the weekend, with Reconciliation round taking place over 19 and 20 February.

Cherbourg played against Murgon in the B Grade and Wooroolin played Murgon in the A Grade.

The Reconciliation round is to show support and continued commitment to reconciliation.

This was the first Reconciliation round to be held in the South Burnett.

Barry Fisher is the captain of the Cherbourg cricket team and says the round is very important as it helps bring communities together, and is instrumental in stopping racism.

"It's about racism, and coming together and trying to stop racism, so we can all work together. There's no better way to do it than on a sporting field," he said.

Fisher said that racism can and should be stood-up against in every round.

"It's just sticking up for each other and having a heart, just working together. If you see something, say something. Don't just sit back and say nothing at all, because that's just as bad."

Fisher said that another very important part of the round is the sense of community that emerges when all the towns work together for a common cause.

"All the people playing together from a local community are trying to work together to stop racism."

Chatur Zala is the Cherbourg chief executive officer and irregular player for the Cherbourg club.

Zala said the round has been a definite success and he is glad that it has gone ahead.

"The idea of reconciliation is for all the communities to come together you know. It's great to see here through the sports that we're

doing that today and I'm very happy to be a part of this round," he said.

"To me it's all about respecting each other, you know, getting all the communities together and not feel [sic] like Murgon is different to Cherbourg, Wondai is different to Murgon. Reconciliation to me is we all come, we all are human beings and we all are equal and we treat each other with respect and equality."

Zala says the Reconciliation round is terrific, but the broader work must continue.

"I hope this Reconciliation round continues from now onwards, and we need to respect the Traditional Owners of this land you know, the land belongs to the First Nations people.

"Everyone else who has come after, we should respect because they allow us to be on this land.

"I think it's time to give it back and respect their culture, and it's happening in cricket and finally, it's happening in cricket at a local level."

Joe Mitchell is a player for Murgon. He played against Cherbourg on the weekend.

Mitchell said it was great having the Reconciliation round because it helps bring people together through their shared passion for cricket.

"Honestly, I just like to play with my mates first of all, but I love hitting 4s and 6s, love having the feeling of the ball coming out the middle of my bat. I just love the culture cricket has around it. I think it's a really family-friendly orientated sport, and it's a good way to spend my Saturdays," he said.

Mitchell said his life experiences have led to his appreciation of the Reconciliation round.

"That culture's always been a big part of my life. A lot of my mates and very close friends are Aboriginal people and obviously, they're proud and I'm also very proud to be involved with them and I think it's great to represent that on a Saturday today."

Both Barry Fisher and Chatur Zala said the sport is important, not just for the wellbeing of the community, but also for the individual.

"It's always good for our physical health, (it) keeps us fit - mentally and physically," Zala said.

"Get your kids out playing sport, and if they like cricket, come along. We need more people to come through," Fisher said.

Campdraft a crowd-puller

A successful Campdraft gathered people from all over.

People from as far as Mallanganee NSW assembled to show their skills at the Burrandowan Campdraft.

The event ran over the 18, 19 and 20 February at the Burrandowan Race Track.

Speaking with John Maloney and Amy Fairbairn, the president and secretary of the Burrandowan Campdraft Association, they described the basic premise of a campdraft.

The uniquely Australian event involves 'cutting' a single beast from a mob of cattle in a small yard, and then taking it out of this yard into a larger one where a course is set up.

The beast is then driven around a course in a figure-eight pattern and through a gate.

The competitor then receives a score out of 100.

"A figure-eight and through the gate," Maloney and Fairbairn said.

This year in particular the campdraft was a big event with more than 300 competitors across the event. There were many more on

the waiting list, as well as many other people involved.

"We've got roughly 40 volunteers... 42 sponsors this year and a lot of them are on the grounds... We probably have 1500 head of cattle or something, which is worth a lot of money at the moment, \$2 to 3 million worth of cattle here to run the event," they said.

Maloney and Fairbairn explained that while the campdraft is an opportunity for a bit of fun, it's also about giving back.

"The campdraft has been going for years but we actually give money from the camp-

draft to the people that actually own the grounds, the Chapingah Reserves Association -they let us use the grounds," they said.

"We give it to the Durong State School as well, the local state school just up here.

"A heap of their families help out on the weekend and we're able to give a donation at the end of the year. It's something to do for the local community.

"We'd love to thank our sponsors, cattle donors and our truck drivers, and all the people that volunteered this weekend. We really wouldn't be able to do it without them."
