A chance to save money and move forward as a region has seen the council's Australia day ceremonies change.

The North Burnett Regional Council voted to change their Australia Day award ceremonies and events for next year.

The changes were voted on at the last council meeting held at Mt Perry on 26 October.

The resolution was carried 4/3.

Some of the changes include Council deciding to hold their regional citizenship and regional Australia Day awards at one location that will rotate throughout the region from year-to-year.

Some other changes include cutting the number of regional awards down from nine to seven awards, and the addition of the 'Local Legend' award.

The 'Local legend' award will be issued to someone from each community of Biggenden, Gayndah, Mount Perry, Mundubbera, Eidsvold and Monto.

North Burnett Regional Council Mayor Les Hotz said the awards are a time to celebrate and acknowledge those outstanding individuals and organisations that have made a significant contribution to our region.

Two social housing units will be built in Kingaroy after the successful partnership between the South Burnett Regional Council, Regional Housing Limited and the Queensland Govern-

This follows a December 2021 Council decision to supply four blocks of land to help with the housing shortage.

South Burnett Regional Councillor for division four, Kirstie Schumacher said while the region was no stranger to housing challenges, the current situation was not good.

"Never before have we seen such a dire housing shortage," Cr Kirstie Schumacher said.

"While it's wonderful to see our region experience population growth, we know that business is struggling to house their workforces and that this is having a direct impact on our community.

'Right now, in the South Burnett, we know there are more than 180 people sleeping rough, and many of us have seen the unacceptable circumstances whereby local families are forced to live in tents and cars in our public

"Now more than ever we need more bricksand-mortar outcomes and to continue working on the multi-faceted solutions needed to address the housing challenges.

"We've been working with South Burnett CTC, QShelter and Regional Housing for some time now, and share in their passion and commitment to helping to house vulnerable people in our community.

"These two social housing units are a positive step, but the work is far from done. We are committed to doing everything we can as a local government to help unlock more housing

"Our priority is to continue working together with all key stakeholders to explore possible practical solutions and ensure that every level of government is at the table.

"I'm heartened to know two more families will have somewhere safe to sleep because of the work we've been doing and thank the team for their efforts," Cr Schumacher said.

Kris Robinson, Business Development Manager of Regional Housing Limited, said it was exciting to be delivering the first new housing project in the region.

"Regional Housing Limited has been working in the South Burnett community for many years and is excited to be delivering our first new housing project in the region," he said.

"We are very thankful for the opportunity presented by this unique partnership between Queensland Government, Regional Housing Limited and South Burnett Regional Council the first of its kind for RHL.

"We know that the South Burnett community needs more housing than one development can provide and are working hard to secure more projects like this."

WATER METER READING PROGRAM

Council wishes to advise residents that South Burnett Regional Council and/or its appointed water meter reading officer will soon begin reading water meters throughout the region for the half year period ending 31 December 2022. This will apply to all premises connected to the water supply schemes in Blackbutt, Boondooma, Kingaroy, Kumbia, Murgon, Nanango, Proston, Proston Rural, Tingoora, Wondai and Wooroolin for the purpose of recording water meter readings.

The water meter reading program commenced on Tuesday 1 November 2022 and is expected to continue until Friday 30 December 2022 and will be conducted between the hours of 6.00am and 6.00pm daily.

The water meter reading program collects information for the billing of water consumption that will be included on the 6 monthly rate notices to be issued in February 2023.

Meter reading personnel may be required to enter properties to gain access to and read the water meters. It is a requirement of our water meter reading personnel that soil or other material that is removed from any meter box to record a reading is returned to the meter box. This prevents drains from being blocked or ratepayer lawns being damaged by anything removed from the meter box.

For the safety of meter reading personnel, please ensure that your animals are enclosed within your property and check that garden vegetation does not obstruct access to your water meter.

Muster glad to be back

The Murgon Music Muster celebrated its highly-anticipated return last week, bringing close to a thousand fans of country music to the South Burnett for five days of homegrown art.

Following two days of walk-up musicians and bush poets on Wednesday 2 and Thursday 3 November, the Muster's official opening ceremony on Friday, 4 November saw Murgon' PCYC hall packed to the rafters with locals and visitors alike.

After local artist Lloyd Back performed the national anthem and Wakka Wakka elder Max Conlon gave a Welcome to Country, Murgon Rotary Club president and Murgon Music Muster co-chair Heath Sander took to the stage to welcome the hundreds of guests.

"I'd like to thank each and every one of you and welcome you back after a three-year break," he said.

"What you see here today is the start of a 12-month project.

"We've already started the plan for 2023. It starts way back, and no one can understand how much goes into running this event.

"There's a coordination between seven different sports groups - soccer, football, cricket, the Show Society, South Burnett PCYC - and coordinating all those guys is a massive task,' Mr Sander added before handing the microphone over to South Burnett councillors Kathy Duff and Gavin Iones.

"It's wonderful to be here, and I'm just so proud that Murgon could put on such a wonderful show," Cr Duff said about the event, with Cr Jones estimating that, on Friday alone, close to 300 caravans and over 900 visitors from outside the region attended the Murgon Music Muster.

The 2022 Muster saw returning local artists Dean Perrett and Lloyd Back on stage, with rising singer-songwriter stars Amber Goldsmith and Paul Ricketts also giving a number of per-

Visiting musicians included Alice Benfer, Pete Smith, Brendan Radford, Clyde Cameron, Amber Lawrence, Clarrie Weller, and Australian country music legends Felicity Urquhart, Josh Cunningham and Adam Harvey.

Performer Pete Smith and his wife Sandy were thrilled to be at their very first Murgon Music Muster.

"The community spirit is amazing and the food is great," Mrs Smith said.

The couple have seen many country music festivals across Mr Smith's 30-year career.

"It's probably one of the best festivals we've seen," Mrs Smith said.

"They've done an amazing job and it's a credit to the community.

"It's very well organised."

Returning artist Alice Benfer said it was good to be back.

"There's good crowds here and a wide variety of music," she said.

The opening concluded with a few words from former Murgon Rotary Club member Rex Shelton, who returned to the South Burnett for the weekend just to attend the muster.

"When we pick up the papers and we watch TV and read the news, there's a lot of bad news in the world," he said.

A woman in her eighties has died after a two-vehicle crash on one of Biggenden's main streets on 6 November.

A Queensland Police Service spokesperson stated that officers were called to the scene of the crash on Caroline and George streets, Biggenden, at 9am last Sunday, where they found a collision between a Tovota Landcruiser and a Hyundai Grandeur.

"The 84-year-old female driver and sole occupant of the Hyundai was airlifted to the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital," the QPS spokesperson added.

Police on Monday confirmed that the 84-year-old resident of Degilbo passed away from her injuries in Brisbane following the incident.

A 66-year-old Maryborough man, the driver of the Toyota, was uninjured.

"The Forensic Crash Unit continues to investigate the crash," police stated.

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Homelessness to rise, too

The increased cash rate will only add to the cost of living and prove too much for some to afford.

The rise in cash rates announced by the Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) on Melbourne Cup Day, Tuesday 1 November will make it more expensive for many people to afford their homes.

Nina Temperton, CEO of South Burnett CTC, said that while it might be hard to quantify what effect this will have in the short term, it certainly won't be good.

"It can only go up," she said,

"I do think that it is likely to take a couple of months -probably longer before we can come up with any anecdotal data.

"We can only go by who turns up with their story."

The cash rates have been rising since May of this year, increasing to a target of 2.85 per cent.

Ms Temperton said CTC had seen the effects of this first-hand.

"We've done more emergency relief and people with more complex needs, whether it's this one [cash rate rise] or the previous and the next, they are definitely having an effect."

At the South Burnett Housing and Homelessness Forum held at the Cultural Centre in Nanango on 7 October, the peak body Q Shelter revealed data that estimated there were at least 200 identified homeless persons and another 100 on the social housing register in the South Burnett.

The data also revealed the numbers had the housing crisis.

most likely risen since their estimates.

At the same forum, the South Burnett Regional Council revealed data stating there was a 0.3 per cent rental vacancy rate.

A healthy rate is between 2.5 per cent and 3.5 per cent.

This low vacancy rate is one of the drivers of the housing crisis.

Raine and Horne Kingaroy Principal, Jackie Allery said more housing was needed.

"We need to see further land releases, and housing development to ease the squeeze on housing," Mrs Allery said.

"New homeowners are most affected by the rate rise, and cost of living rises.

"Wages have mostly remained the same,

they may not have had time to build equity in their property."

It's not just new homeowners who are feeling the pinch though, with landlords having to increase rents as well.

"Owners are looking to increase rents at lease renewals as rates, and cost of living along with interest rate rises are influencing their decisions, more owners are looking to employ agents to manage their homes."

This motif is echoed by the CTC CEO who said it was no longer the poorest needing help.

"We're seeing dual-income families that can't afford rents as an increasing number of landlords are terminating leases they normally wouldn't," Ms Temperton said.

"They terminate the lease so they can charge the next person more. If a dual income couldn't afford an increase in rent, they have to look for a different rental which isn't available so they end up homeless."

Ms Temperton said that while CTC was being run off its feet, there was something simple every day locals could do to help.

"Be kind to everyone," she said.

"Everyone is affected, even people that thought they were secured, everyone is worried."

Ms Temperton mentioned many of the root causes were out of people's hands, but their attitudes were not.

"We can't change the big things, so just be a bit more aware that neighbours, friends, and people in the street are probably struggling too," she said.

"It will lighten the load a little bit."

Explained: Cash rate rise an attempt to battle inflation

The Reserve bank is attempting to rein in inflation by cooling demand.

On Melbourne Cup Day, Tuesday 1 November, the Reserve Bank of Australia announced an increased cash rate for a consecutive seventh month in a row at a speech given in Canberra.

This comes after the Consumer Price Index rose 7.3 per cent in the September quarter according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

This was the highest movement recorded since 1990, with the exception of the implementation of the GST in 2001.

Bendigo and Adelaide Bank's Chief Economist, David Robertson released his monthly report card into the Australian economy, revealing Australian homeowners should expect two further interest rate hikes ahead of

Christmas and again in February next year.

"The logic behind the quarter per cent increase (in contrast to the US and UK hiking rates ¾ per cent this week) centred on the lag between rate hikes and seeing an impact on the real economy, the likely decline in inflation next year as supply chains gradually repair, and the fact that the RBA meets monthly, unlike most other central banks," Mr Robertson said.

"The key question ahead for 2023 is whether a neutral rate will be sufficient to tame inflation, particularly after last week's CPI figures showed a rise in core inflation to 7.3 per cent, more than double target at 6 per cent."

As inflation rises and wages do not rise with it, it makes the cost-of-living higher.

There are generally three types of inflation, demand-pull, cost-push, and built-in.

In this case, cost-push is currently the big-

gest source of inflation.

Cost-push is when prices rise due to an increase in costs along the production process.

Depending on the goods being produced,

costs can rise for many different reasons.

Consider the price of fuel. If less fuel is

Consider the price of fuel. If less fuel is produced, this means there is less supply.

With less supply of fuel but the same de-

mand, this makes the cost of fuel rise and this rise in cost adds to inflation.

This was one very real reason for the cur-

rent inflation in Australia.

The Average Crude Oil Spot Price calcu-

The Average Crude Oil Spot Price calculates an equally weighted price of the WTI Crude Oil Price, Brent Crude Oil Price, and Dubai Crude Oil Price.

For 31 October 2022, the Average Crude Oil Spot Price was US\$90.33 per barrel.

The average price from 31 October 2022 to 30 September 2018 was US\$66.58 and the average pre-covid price from 31 December

2019 to 30 September 2018 was US\$62.82.

This increased cost of oil transfers to the cost of fuel, which then increases inflation and then the cost of living.

Other reasons for the rate of inflation are global supply chain disruptions, especially in China which is still chasing the zero-co-vid dream, and increased food costs due to floods and worker shortages.

This increased inflation is what the RBA is trying to combat by increasing the cost associated with borrowing money.

The increased cash rates make it more expensive for banks to lend and borrow money and this cost is then handed down to the consumer.

By increasing the costs to consumers, the consumers have less money to spend and demand decreases.

This is how the RBA is attempting to rein in inflation, by cooling demand.

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Mini budget a 'timebomb'



The new Federal Government has delivered its first "mini" budget. The irony is that there is nothing "mini" about the economic consequences of the new Government's misconceived budget reforms.

After being handed one of the best performing economies in the world post the global pandemic – Albanese's first term will see all of that hard work be for nothing.

150,000 people are estimated to be on the breadline in the next two years. Unemployment will lift from historic lows to be around 5 per cent in Albo's first term.

The treasurer Dr Jim Chalmers has spent the last few months talking the Australian economy into the ground and claiming that inflation and cost of living pressures are "key challenges of our time".

Inflation in Australia is being driven by three key indices - food, fuel and power.

The "mini" budget does nothing to alleviate these issues - in fact it drives them even harder.

Albo is letting the RBA take all the flack for increasing interest rates while he can simply blame everyone else for rising inflation.

Despite all of the doom and gloom coming from the Treasurer, there is actually an extra \$40 billion in the budget thanks to our coal, gas and agricultural exports.

Rather than putting that money back into the things that will actually sustain our economy into the future – Anthony Albanese has decided to cut funding from industries that actually pay the bills.

The "mini" budget provides an additional \$4.7 billion for childcare on top of the \$10 billion we already pay to profit driven service providers. Albo's paid parental scheme will be increased to 26 weeks by 2026 so let's call it a \$20 billion drain. Each year, every year - plus inflation.

The PBS gets a further \$1.2 billion boost on top of the \$14 billion we already spend per year.

Medicare gets a \$2 billion boost - on top of the \$30 billion annual budget.

The Pacific Islands pick up \$1.4 billion over the next four years while our own people live in tents trying to find houses.

The NBN gets another \$2.4 billion kicker on top of the \$50 billion spent to date so people can download movies faster.

The Great Barrier Reef also gets another \$1.2 billion so we can demonise a few more farmers and shut down a bit more of our sustainable fishing industries.

The "environment" gets \$2.3 billion so we

can lock up a bit more country to be infested by pigs and cats and then burnt to the ground by bushfire

Aged care will get \$2.5 billion - on top of the \$30 billion already spent per year.

And just in time for the Victorian election, \$2.2 billion has been ear marked for Melbourne's suburban rail link which Infrastructure Australia has criticised as being unfeasible.

I guess it is only pork barrelling if you not eating the pork crackling.

Dr Jim was very restrained in not allocating any further funds to the NDIS. He also failed to mention that the cost of the NDIS is surging to a forecast \$51.8 billion by 2025-26 - and potentially over \$100 billion by 2030.

These are all wonderful initiatives and I take my hat off to Dr Jim for wanting to spend our money so "responsibly". But the hard bit is - who pays for all of this largesse once all the money is spent?

There is nothing in the budget for small

businesses other than the prospect of multiemployer bargaining agreements which will artificially increase wages but also push more vulnerable people out of work.

The extra dough certainly won't be coming out of the Murray Darling Basin - Labor have already committed to taking a further 1000 gigalitres of water out of production by 2024.

Dr Jim has also cut \$22 billion in proposed investments in regional Australia.

Hells Gate Dam is gone - just a little 2,100-gigalitre dam that could grow and develop North Queensland and the county for generations.

Urannah Dam is gone also - just an irrigation and hydro dam that will drive over \$4 billion in GDP.

\$1 billion has been cut for the Dungowan Dam, Emu Swamp Dam, Hughenden Irrigation Scheme and the Wyangala Dam Wall Raising Project. Just little bits of unnecessary investment that grow food and create jobs.

Paradise Dam looks likes its \$600 million funding commitment before the election hasn't met the chopping block. But it's funding has been "deferred" to future estimates, so I won't sleep well until the concrete is poured and the dam is full of water again.

Dr Jim's "mini" budget makes very little mention of the industries keeping this country afloat - coal, gas, iron ore and agriculture.

He also made very little comment of who will pay for all the fluffy stuff once Labor's 43 per cent emissions reductions targets get tight as we rush towards 2030.

Or about power prices escalating as we shut down reliable coal fired power stations and replace them with solar and wind that only work 30 per cent of the time.

Dr Jim's first budget paints him like a modern-day Robin Hood.

But he'll soon have to be a magician and pull a rabbit out of a hat when all the money is gone.

Burglaries, drugs and guns: An 'untidy' week of crime

Murgon and Cherbourg suffered under a wave of break-ins, property damage and theft late last month, with police called out to a number of incidents across the two towns.

A Murgon police station spokesperson said on Monday that officers were aware of and in some cases still investigating - a total of nine offences in the area between 24 and 30 October.

Police first charged a woman with possession of a dangerous drug and failing to properly dispose of needles and syringes after conducting a vehicle search in the early hours of 24 October.

Officers allegedly located a quantity of methylamphetamine, three hypodermic needles and syringes in the vehicle on Gore Street, Murgon.

A 29-year-old Kingaroy woman is due to appear at Murgon's Magistrates Court on 22 November in relation to the incident.

The following day, police attended the site of an alleged burglary on Collins Road, Cherbourg.

Officers reported that a group of unknown offenders allegedly gained entry to a property at around 8.55am that day by bypassing a series of locks at the rear of the premises.

"The offenders then entered the property through the rear door and conducted an untidy search of the lower floor,"

police reports stated.

"They [the offenders] took a sheet of the clothesline in the rear courtyard and lit a fire on the curtain hanging on the window immediately adjacent to the rear door.

"The fire caused burn damage to the curtain, the internal window framing, several glass louvres and the sheet. The suspects then exited the residence and fled," the report continued, concluding with a statement that investigations into the matter are ongoing.

Later that same day, an unknown offender allegedly attended a dwelling on Angel Avenue, Murgon, and attempted to open a vehicle parked at the premises after turning off the power to the building.

Officers reported that the alleged trespasser was unsuccessful in opening the vehicle and subsequently fled on foot, with investigations into the incident still ongoing.

At 9.17am on 27 October, a vehicle light bar, a solar panel attached to a roof rack, a Kings awning and a roof rack were stolen from a Chinchilla Wondai Road, Ballogie address.

Police stated investigations are continuing into the matter.

The following days of Friday, 28 October to Sunday, 30 October, saw a spate of breakins and disturbances across Murgon.

Between 3.30pm on 28 October and 7.30am on 31 October, unknown offenders

allegedly entered an education facility located on Angel Avenue, Murgon.

Police claim that the offenders gained entry through an unlocked door at the rear left side of the building. They opened an internal door, entered a small room at front of the building and conducted a search of the building

The offenders emptied two shopping bags containing school uniforms onto the floor in the middle of the room and caused damage by releasing fire extinguishers.

They opened all internal drawers within the building and conducted a tidy search before decamping in an unknown direction. Investigations are continuing into the matter.

Between 6.30pm on 29 October and 8am on 30 October, unknown offenders allegedly attended a Gore Street, Murgon business and gained entry to the building through a security screen and a glass window.

They conducted an untidy search of the office including accessing a safe within the office. Investigations are continuing into the matter.

During the same period, unknown offenders allegedly attended a Taylor Street, Murgon business and gained entry into the premises by smashing a window.

The offenders allegedly graffitied along a fence, the outside of the hall and along a container with white and grey paint before exiting the premises, leaving the door open.

Police stated that it is currently still unknown if any property was stolen. Investigations are continuing into the matter.

At 8pm on 29 October, police attended a Stephens Street, Murgon address in relation to a disturbance.

During the course of the investigation, it is alleged that police located a modified bolt action rifle and various rounds of ammunition.

A 62-year-old Murgon man was charged with possessing a shortened firearm, unlawful possession of weapons and lack of authority required to possess explosives.

The man is due to appear at the Murgon Magistrates Court on 8 November.

About 8.45pm on 30 October, unknown offenders allegedly attended a Macalister Street, Murgon address and smashed the rear windscreens of two vehicles.

Police stated that their investigations suggest a mallet, which was located next to the vehicles, was used to break the windows. Investigations are continuing into the matter.

Investigations into Toyah's death, including bringing the person responsible to justice, remains a priority for the Queensland Police Service with the establishment of Operation Quebec Clarify. Police are interested in information about the whereabouts of Rajwinder Singh, who was last known to live in Innisfail but is originally from Buttar Kalan, Punjab India. 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Burnett firies' charity ride

A group of Burnett firefighters has once again raised thousands of dollars for men's health by taking to the road on their postie bikes.

Members of the Kingaroy and Wondai fire brigades, as well as several visiting firefighters from as far north as Mackay, gathered at Kingaroy's fire station on 2 November for their fourth annual Movember Postie Bike Run, aiming to raise vital funds for men's physical and mental health.

Kingaroy firefighter Dan Hurt, who helped organise the ride, said the idea behind an annual 1,000 kilometre trip around Queensland came after previous smaller-scale fundraising efforts were well-received by the crew.

"For the first ten years, we'd just all grow moustaches and maybe raise a few hundred dollars, but on the tenth anniversary [of Movember at the fire brigade] we figured 'why not do something bigger?' - so we came up with the bike ride," he explained.

To this extent, over a dozen local and visiting firefighters now don their helmets and rev up their bikes every year, with the annual endeavour having already raised over \$30,000 for the Movember movement.

The riders, which included participants from Kingaroy, Wondai, Mackay, Rockhampton and Caboolture, set out from the Burnett on the morning of Wednesday, 2 November, with the first leg of their trip taking them to

Kingsthorpe via Burrandowan and Bell, before traveling to the Sunshine Coast, Kenilworth and Linville, and finally ending up at Cooyar for their return on 4 November.

Mr Hurt explained the postie bikes, which each member bought and restored over the course of the previous years, can reach top speeds of 70 to 100 kilometres an hour, with several of the participating firies pouring their heart and soul into engine upgrades and new paint jobs

"For some, it's become a little bit of an ob-

session!" he said.

In previous years, the 1,000 kilometre treks took the group through the North Burnett, Western Downs and Fraser Coast regions.

At each leg of their trip, the group booked stays at local hotels, aiming to raise further funds via raffles while also looking to give back to the communities they visit along the way.

This year, the 13 participating riders raised a collective \$5,000 of their \$12,000 goal before their trip even began.

"The most a firefighter can grow is a mo', because we have to wear masks. So, the mo' is sort of a representation of the fire brigade!" Mr Hurt said.

"This little idea we've had at the shed here has turned into a great annual ride."

Mo's on the go in month-long campaign for male health

November sees a fun charity event called Movember when men are encouraged to grow moustaches to raise awareness of men's health issues such as prostate cancer, testicular cancer and men's suicide.

While it is a fun event, it highlights that men's health is often an under-serviced area of community health and we need to raise awareness of the need for men to look after their health.

A major policy initiative is the Government's National Men's Health Strategy 2020-30, which has identified five priority health issues: mental health, chronic conditions, sexual and reproductive health and conditions where men are over-represented, injuries and risk taking, and healthy ageing.

The Strategy recognises that too often in the past, men have been reluctant to seek help with health issues - and mental health issues in particular - but that this culture is changing and men recognise that "soldiering on" does no-one any good.

Community pharmacies can play a pivotal role in this area, providing advice and confidential counselling for health issues which a man may need help with.

Men's health has often been either neglected or narrowed down to urological is-

sues but it is important to note that among the 10 most common causes of death among men are heart disease, lung disease, diabetes, cancers and mental health issues.

Mental health is an area of growing concern for many men, where community pharmacies are playing an increasing role in addressing it.

Community pharmacists are in the position to identify the first signs of mental health deteriorations and start a confidential conversation as they are one of the most trusted health professionals in the local community.

Community pharmacies are the most accessible healthcare in Australia so men feeling anxiety, depression, loneliness and other mental health issues can feel at-ease and confident in speaking to them for advice and help.

With 6000 community pharmacies across the country and many pharmacies open late and on weekends, they can be accessed whenever and wherever a man needs them.

In the past there has been a stigma associated with mental health issues but those days - thankfully - are behind us and no-one entering a pharmacy to discuss depression or other mental health issues should experience judgement.

In fact, they will meet trained and compassionate staff, many of whom have undergone $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1\right$

training in mental health first aid as part of their commitment to helping patients.

While community pharmacies help manage patients experiencing mental illness across the broad spectrum, depression is the most common presentation, affecting about one in eight men at some stage during their lives.

There is a need to recognise and help patients suffering from depression, as it is a leading cause of suicide which in Australia claims some nine lives every day.

According to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, males are three to four times more likely to take their own lives than females. Males aged 40-49 and over the age of 85 have the highest rates.

These are alarming figures and community pharmacy is determined to help lower them

The ability of pharmacies to help these patients was recognised in the House of Representatives Select Committee on Mental Health and Suicide Prevention report released late last year which noted "[t]he Committee recommends that the Australian Government evaluate the efficacy of pharmacy mental health training programs and strengthen funding to support an expansion of best practice training in mental health and suicide prevention for all pharmacists and pharmacy staff."

The report also included that "[p]harmacists are often the most accessible health professionals the public encounter and pharmacy is among the most trusted professions in Australia." "Pharmacists have earned this trust through their competence, demonstrating consistently high standards of skill and care and building strong relationships with the community."

Any person with any mental health issue, or anyone who knows of someone who may need help, is encouraged to come and have a chat with their pharmacist.

Being able to walk in off the street and speak to a health professional who listens and understands the issues and can provide counselling is very important.

In addition, pharmacists are also ideally placed to recognise potential early signs or symptoms of depression, anxiety or other mental health disorders in the community pharmacy setting.

With more than 80 per cent of people using the same pharmacy regularly, a community pharmacist may be able to more easily recognise changes in a person's behaviour and initiate a conversation.

Patients also felt more at ease talking to the pharmacists that they already knew and may have been dealing with for their health needs over a long period.



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Care expo's healthy aims

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North Burnett gets onboard

Public transport is coming to the North Bur-

The North Burnett Regional Council held a forum on the long-distance transport service on Monday 7 November, at the Mundubbera Community Hall.

The forum came after the Council secured the Translink coach contract to provide public transport to the North Burnett region.

The forum was to engage with the community about potential service enhancements and to share their likes, dislikes and ideas.

The forum was said to have had quite a turnout with over 25 people and Councillors Mesner, Giddins, Payne, Jones, and council staff coming to the event.

The forum was very productive, with many helpful ideas put forth by members of the community on how Council could improve the transport service.

Council's latest updates on the performance, customer service, communication and potential service enhancements which were shared with the audience were well received.

Discussions that emerged will provide the basis of a plan for developing the service further, in the near future.

At the South Burnett Housing and Homelessness Forum on 7 October, North Burnett Regional Councillor Melinda Jones said it was important services are used for them to be maintained.

"It's a bit of a two-fold because people jump up and down and say there's not enough transport, but when the transport is there it doesn't get utilized," Cr Jones said.

"So the transport then gets reduced because the numbers are actually showing it's not being used."

'If they were to maintain the cost it's no longer usable because it's too costly so yeah services get reduced or removed."



There was quite a turnout at the public forum.

Cr Jones also said it was the tyranny of distance that made public transport difficult in rural and remote areas like the North Burnett.

"And when you've got a large geographical area that, to get from one town to the next you're travelling like an hour or two hours to your closest medical facility such as Bundaberg or Maryborough, that's where the challenge is.'

"We don't have rail that comes through anymore, so more community solutions based transport that possibly with funding that might be available that might be the so-

The long-distance coach will service the following routes:

Bundaberg (via Eidsvold); Mundubbera-Maryborough and Monto-Ceratodus (on demand).

While servicing North Burnett locals it will also provide a public transport option for tourists and workers wishing to travel to the region for work or play.

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
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Lions give sporting chance

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Cars seized in crackdown

Police have made a hard stance against hoons impounding more than 50 vehicles across south east Queensland.

Operation Uniform Elderberry has seen more than 2000 fines issued since June as part of the major police operation.

Police Minister Mark Ryan said the Queensland Police Service targeted hooning behaviour under the operation.

"The coordinated anti-hoon operation conducted across the South-East, has resulted in police impounding 59 vehicles and issuing 2,048 infringement notices," he said.

"Hoons driving dangerously in defective vehicles is a disaster waiting to happen.

"We do not want hoons tearing up our roadways like racetracks and putting themselves and innocent road users at risk for the sake of social media notoriety."

Police Minister Mark Ryan congratulated police for their perseverance in investigating hooning activity and, when appropriate, seizing vehicles under Queensland's tough antihooning legislation.

"The idiotic behaviour police have seen throughout this operation is downright disturbing and I commend officers for removing these vehicles from our roads and taking action against those responsible," he said.

Road Policing and Regional Support Command Assistant Commissioner Ben Marcus said the operation produced significant results.

"Our traffic officers have been working closely with intelligence officers as part of Operation Uniform Elderberry in targeting high-risk areas and drivers across the South-East," he said

"Police have disrupted various hoon events, seen a vehicle catch fire as a result of hooning and uncovered dangerous modifications such as one vehicle which had its steering wheel replaced with a computer game steering wheel.



A total of 59 vehicles have been impounded during Operation Uniform Elderberry.

"Our officers have come across illegal hooning activity being shared on social media apps like TikTok and impounded vehicles of those responsible."

The police also detected 164 drink and drug drivers as part of their anti-hooning crack-down

"Our message to anyone taking part in high-risk activities on our roads is that we will continue to target you, investigate your dangerous antics and take action against you," Assistant Commissioner Marcus said.

Minister Ryan said the State Government's tough anti-hoon laws was assisting police with

apprehending and prosecuting offenders.

"Under these laws (known as owner onus or driver deeming laws) a registered owner of a car must prove they were not driving the vehicle at the time of the offence or else they will face the consequences.

"Along with some of the toughest penalties in the nation, this significant legal advantage for the Queensland Police Service sets Queensland apart from other Australian jurisdictions."

In addition to penalties for hooning-related offences of fines of up to \$5,338 and terms of imprisonment up to 6 months, hoons also face

Queensland Hydro is investigating a potential pumped hydro energy storage facility at Borumba Dam, located near Imbil, south west of Gympie.

Due to the potential generation and storage capacity of the pumped hydro facility, new transmission lines will be needed from the Borumba site to existing Powerlink substations at Tarong/Halys and Woolooga.



Take a step back in time

Relics from the not-so-distant past will be brought into the light at Wooroolin.

A time capsule buried 50 years ago will be pulled up and unveiled at Wooroolin on Saturday, 12 November.

At a function called 'Back to Wooroolin' held in 1972 a committee of locals put together a time capsule of things dear to them, to be pulled up and examined on the date 12 November, 2022.

In 1972, 'Puppy Love' by Donny Osmond spent six weeks at the top of the charts, films The Godfather and Deliverance were released, and the iconic TV show M.A.S.H. first hit peo-

It was the year of the Watergate scandal in the US, the infamous tale of the Andean flight disaster, and the year of Bangladeshi independence from Pakistan.

For Wooroolin, it was the 74th year of settlement.

Wendy Turner is the owner of the Wooroolin post office and is the secretary of the Wooroolin Community Committee.

The committee is made up of Wooroolin residents and a few extras for the time capsule opening

Wendy said the Saturday is going to be an all-around great day to be at Wooroolin.

"We've got the Wooroolin markets, they run every second Saturday of the month," she said.

"Live music, games for the kids, good parking, a sausage sizzle put on by QCWA, food stalls put on by the Lions Club and the Wooroolin school, and then at 10am we will be unveiling the time capsule."

Once the time capsule has been pulled out and unveiled, it will be displayed inside the Wooroolin Memorial Hall, where members of the public will be able to view all that was inside for a \$5 donation.

Wendy Turner said that anyone interested in what was happening 50 years ago ought to come along.

"The cars, the clothes, some really good

stuff came out of that era.

"If people have a picture of themselves from 1972, they should bring that along."

Four of the original committee members from 1972 will be the ones to pull the time capsule into the present.

In the book 'Peanuts and People: Wooroolin 1952-1963' by Raymond Champney, there is an excerpt titled "A 'Time Capsule' Reminder

This excerpt states,

"This sealed capsule was constructed and sealed underground on the 11th November, 1972, to commemorate the "back to Wooroolin" celebrations.

"As presiding chairman that year, I would like to remind people who may be here on the 11th November, 2022, that the capsule, per instructions, is to be raised and contents noted.

"I do trust they will still be in good vacuum packed condition.

"Many items etc. were placed by many peo-

"My contribution was a Wooroolin Cricket Club cap, - maybe could be auctioned, or given to my grandchildren.

"No doubt there could be fund-raising celebration as per instructions left with the Kingaroy Shire Council and Commonwealth Bank - Just another thirty-one years (half a generation)!



Brief history of Wooroolin

Wooroolin was first taken up under Agricultural Homestead selection in 1898 and 1899.

Wooroolin Provisional School was opened on 18 February 1901 and later became known as Wooroolin State School on 1 January 1909.

By August 1911 the school was overcrowded and because more accommodation was needed the Department decided to put a new building on a new site.

The new school site was opened in 1912 and celebrated its diamond jubilee in 1972.

As many of the pupils rode or drove horses to school there was a horse paddock to the rear of the school grounds.

On 19 December 1904, the section of the Nanango railway line from Wondai to Kingaroy

Wooroolin was served by this railway line with the Wooroolin railway station until 2009 when the section of railway line was closed.

During the first world war, Wooroolin had formed a volunteer Patriotic Fund Committee.

The main function of this was to suitably farewell soldiers on their departure and welcome them on their return.

After the war ended, the Committee moved to welcome the soldiers home and to form some remembrance for those fallen.

On 27 June 1919, it was decided that to honour those fallen, a memorial hall or school of arts as it was known at the time, would be erected.

It was officially opened on 22 November 1922 by Colonel Cyril Corser of Maryborough Returned Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Imperial League of Australia. In 1972, a 'Back to Wooroolin' event was

held that featured an old-time dance in the hall. It was at this 'Back to Wooroolin' event that

the time capsule was placed in cairn by Sir CF Aldermann. Sir Charles Aldermann served in the federal government from 1943 until 1972 representing

the country party. Before this, he was a peanut farmer.

He was the party's deputy leader from 1964 to 1966 and served as Minister for Primary Industry from 1958 to 1967.

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

Artists explore 'Geist Land'

Five artists have shared their take on 'Geist Land' in an astonishing and haunting exhibition at the Kingaroy Regional Art Gallery.

South Burnett artists Judy Brook, Bron Langford and Carmel Nott are joined by visiting artists Belinda Sinclair and Walter Stahl in Kingaroy's November art exhibition.

Their work was admired for the first time on Friday, 4 November at the official opening.

Artist Bron Langford was very happy with the final result of the exhibition.

"It always looks amazing when it's up on the walls," she said.

Opening night MC Danita Potter elaborated on the German word 'Geist'.

"Geist has two meanings -a spiritual ghost or two, the quality of being spirited, motivated or intelligent," she said.

"Everyone in this exhibition is showing their own spiritual faith in different ways -whether that's cosmically through nature or natural elements, people, belongings, connections or places.

'We aptly see all of the artists showing us their innermost geist," she said.

Redcliffe artist Belinda Sinclair was the centre part of the exhibition.

She had held an exhibition at the Kingaroy Regional Art Gallery in May and had been invited to return.

This time she decided to bring along some old and new friends to join her.

"I wanted to do a show with local artists,"

Belinda firstly invited the Burnett artists to join her before asking Walter, an old friend she had previously exhibited with, to come board for the Kingaroy exhibition.

The exhibition title 'Geist' was inspired by Belinda and Walter's shared German heritage.

Belinda's works feature some nearby spots including Biggenden 's utopia rock pools, Kingaroy's Carroll Park and the Somerset re-

Belinda said the exhibition showed the spirit of generosity that was shared between the artists through the collaborative approach. "By allowing the works to go together it

makes for a far richer show," she said. "It really has been a big group effort for all

of the artists.'

All of the exhibiting artists met together the Sunday before the official opening to hang their artworks and place the sculptures around the Kingaroy gallery.

"It was a lovely day," Ms Langford said.

The gallery features works from the five artists throughout its rooms focusing on which artworks worked best together rather than having a dedicated space for each individual

"The works looked good together when we placed them side by side," Ms Langford said.

Artist Bron Langford was very happy with the final result of the exhibition.

"It always looks amazing when it's up on the walls," she said.

three 'Croqland' maps of the South Burnett hang on the walls created by Saint Mary Catholic College art students in Years 5, 6, 8, 11 and 12 as well as a group of home school students.

"How incredible is that -the students are showing you what [the South Burnett] means to them," Cr Potter said.

Walter, who led the college art workshops as Dr Dr Walter, said it was a privilege to be at St Mary's. He's spent around 25 years working on his Croqland collection in Queensland.

Walter mentioned that another meaning to 'Geist' was ghost which reflects his Crogland pieces well due to their haunting nature.

He played off the ideas from creation myths about the earth being like a living being.

"New data has been collected that indicates that the story of the rainbow serpent was only half of the truth and research indicates that we all live on a really large crocodile," he said.

"I found the crocodile to be an amazing vehicle for reconsidering that old myth idea.'

The 'Geist' exhibition is extra special for artist Belinda whose mother worked in the Kingaroy silos in the 1960s.

Now the visiting artists' works hang across the road in the Kingaroy Regional Art Gallery.



MIRROR, MIRROR ON THE WALL

AS the saying goes 'life is like a mirror' and the clever use of mirrors in a home can reflect a lot about the lifestyle of the people who live there.

Mirrors come in an endless variety of shapes and sizes. They can be modern or traditional, big or small, hung or placed on a lean against walls for effect.

As a rule of thumb, rooms with high ceilings benefit from vertical mirrors, while horizontal mirrors work better in long rooms.

One of the first things to consider when deciding where to place a mirror is the reflection. Stand where you plan to hang the mirror and consider what will be reflected in it. Mirrors can accentuate works of art or special pieces of furniture that may be placed opposite.

Also, think about where light enters your room. It's best to position a mirror opposite a window, especially in north facing homes to make the most of the afternoon and evening light.

If you are going to hang a mirror, consider placing it on a slight tilt that way it will reflect more of the room.

Also consider if the mirror is going to serve a practical purpose or will it be merely decorative. If you want to be able to check your lipstick on the way out the door make sure the mirror is hung at eye level.

To securely fasten a mirror to a wall, each hook on the back needs its own hook in the wall. A cable wire hung across a single hook or nail won't do the job, especially with large, heavy mirrors.

Mirrors can be used throughout your home.

They add a welcoming feel to a foyer or entry hung above a stylish hall table.

An obvious place for a mirror in older homes is above a mantel. Experts advise positioning the mirror 10 to 15 centimetres above the mantel for maximum effect.

An instant hit of glamour can be added to a bathroom or ensuite by a gorgeous mirror. Look beyond the frameless mirror mounted above the basin and consider a frame for visual impact.

Dining rooms are the traditional place for mirrors. Think grand Victorian homes with thick gold frames. A mirror in a sleek, modern frame would work just as well strategically placed over a buffet.

Mirrors can also be arranged in groups for added visual impact and character. Take care to ensure the space between each mirror is even, making it visually pleasing to the eye. Play around with different shapes and sizes, or hang a set of mirrors for visual uniformity. Think about a group of mirrors the same way you would a collection of art work.

The style of frame will depend on your individual aesthetic. A modern home will suit sleek, unadorned frames. A colonial or country homestead style home suits a rustic wooden frame, or a period home a more traditional gilt, decorative frame.

Don't be afraid to use a large mirror in a small space. Designers often use full length mirrors leaning against a wall in apartments or smaller homes.





A SLICE OF HEAVEN

SPRING and summer are the perfect months for Mediterranean style cooking and alfresco dining, especially when you have a pizza oven in the backyard.

Pizza ovens are becoming popular additions to Australian backyards alongside the ubiquitous barbecue. Devotees of pizza ovens love the simplicity of authentic Italianstyle pizzas, which can be healthy, quick to make and delicious.

Because the high heat generated in a wood fired pizza oven, food cooks extremely quickly making them great for feeding large groups of people. And only wood fired brick ovens infuse that smokey, charcoal flavour that can't be replicated in a normal kitchen oven.

There are a number of things to consider when choosing what sort of pizza oven is right for your home.

Firstly, what material to use in constructing the oven.

Brick

Brick ovens are fuel efficient, as they retain up to 85 per cent of the heat generated by a wood fire. Bricks are also cheap making them a popular choice .

To get an authentic rustic look, the brick can be rendered in cement with the added benefit of retaining extra heat for faster cooking.

Stone

Stone has very similar heat efficiency to brick but it can be an expensive option. If you like the look of natural stone use it on the facade as decoration rather than using it for the baking chamber.

Cok

Cob is a mixture of natural building materials made from things such as clay, sand, straw, rocks and recycled materials. It is one of the oldest building methods on earth. A cob oven is cheap to construct and fuel efficient. It cooks with all three heating methods: convection, conduction and radiant heat.



Be careful to ensure the baking chamber is fired properly or it will crack. There is plenty of advice on the internet about how to construct a cob oven.

Steel

In modern homes stainless steel is a popular choice for pizza ovens. They are low maintenance and can be connected to gas as a fuel source eliminating the long heating time needed for wood fired models.

Portable oven

For those with a small backyard a portable pizza oven or even a bench top oven may be

a better option. Portable ovens can be wood fired or gas powered. They can be moved out of the way when not in use or even taken to a park, the beach or a friend's house.

The other main consideration is which fuel to use to fire your pizza oven.

Wood

For purists wood is the only way to go. Wood fired is the authentic way of cooking used by humans for thousands of years. It can take up to four hours to get a wood fired oven to the correct temperature for cooking so patience and planning is


required if you choose wood.

Charcoal/coal

Wood-fired ovens can also be fueled with either charcoal or coal for a different flavour, though these options are often considered to be less efficient, and less eco-friendly.

Gas/electric

More contemporary in style, a gas or electric pizza oven is a cleaner option, particularly for an indoor or enclosed kitchen. Gas is also faster but they do need to be connect to a mains supply or bottled gas.

Come and sample some Wagyu steak: grown in Australia, graded in Japan.

The Phat Wag butcher retail outlet will be having a soft launch at Murgon from 10am to 3pm on 12 November.

Held at 15230 Bunya Highway just outside of Murgon, the opening will have beautifully marbled Wagyu produce to sample and purchase.

The Phat Wag is the brainchild of Selwyn and Jocelyn Maller, owners of Hamilton Park Wagyu.

They have a vertically integrated business.

This means they grow all their own fodder and trace their own animals from the embryo

to the plate.

"We have the story of how they're produced," Selwyn said.

"We know the properties where they've grazed, where they've moved, all the systems in place. We can also give the date of birth of all our cattle."

The Wagyu marbling is graded in Japan via an app, taking photos of the eye muscle area, downloading them and within seconds the marble score is returned.

One of the best steaks Selwyn said he had ever eaten was a full-blood Wagyu, Tomahawk

steak.
"We will actually have some for sale at the

opening on the 12 November ."
Selwyn has been breeding Wagyu beef for 25 years now.

With those years of experience, Selwyn knows the importance of the eating quality of the animals.

"In recent years we've won awards for our meat quality, so we're confident we now have a sustainable, predictable product to market under "The Phat Wag" brand."

When the old Goomeri butcher shop closed its doors, the Mallers saw it as a great opportunity to put down roots in the town.



Construction is now complete and they are open and ready for business.

In time to come, the Phat Wag will be opening a specialty butcher in Goomeri.

The butcher will sell a variety of proteins specialising in Wagyu products within a 3-hour drive from Brisbane and the Sunshine Coast.

"Goomeri has become a tourist precinct, with the local wineries, the bakery, the pumpkin festival, and newly opening boutique stores," he said.

"We will start selling online Australia-wide and have a future vision of exporting internationally.

Inspiration from brothers

Did you know that around 2,800 pairs of Australian brothers died in World War I?

The inspiring story of a pair of Nanango brothers has inspired a war memorial in honour of these many Australian brothers who served together in the Great War.

The official inauguration of the Brothers in Arms Memorial Park was held on Sunday, 25 September at Zonnebeke in Belgium.

The team behind the project officially unveiled a bronze sculpture based on Nanango brothers John and Jim Hunter, who served with Australia's 49th Battalion.

Before the Australian-made sculpture arrived at the Belgium park, the team took a nostalgic tour of the Western Front with the soldier sculpture.

Hunter brother's story unearthed

Brothers from Nanango, S/N 3487A Private James 'Jim' Hunter and S/N 3504 Private John 'Jack' Hunter served with Australia's 49th Battalion. They were the sons of Harry and Emily Hunter of Nanango.

According to the Australian War Memorial, Pte John Hunter embarked from Sydney on HMAT Ayrshire on 24 January 1917, to serve with the Australian Imperial Force -leaving behind his job as a timber-getter at Nanango.

During September 1917, during the Battle of Polygon Wood, the elder of the two John was tragically hit by a mortar round. Despite his injuries, he managed to return to the trench where his brother and a mate stretchered him over a kilometre to the nearest dressing station.

John died on the Western Front in Belgium on 26 September 1917 and was carefully buried by his brother Jim. When he came back after the war to give his brother a proper burial, but was unable to relocate the remains.

It was not until 90 years later that his remains would be identified.

The bodies of five Australian soldiers were discovered by Belgium amateur archaeologist Johan Vandewalle in 2006 during a pipeline excavation near Westhoek, Belgium.

Two of the soldiers -Sergeant George Calder, 51st Battalion, and Private John Hunter were identified in 2007 through DNA analysis. A third soldier, Private George Richard Storey, was identified from further DNA testing in 2008.

All five of the discovered soldiers' remains were interred at Buttes New British Military Cemetery, Polygon Wood, Belgium.

The memory of finding the remains of John Hunter will always remain with Johan Vandewalle who has ever since worked tirelessly to build the 'Brothers-In-Arms Memorial near his Belgium cafe.

Mr Vandewalle told 'Sacred Grounds Tours', during a podcast interview, that John's body had not been thrown in the grave like the other four bodies discovered, rather it had been placed lovingly and carefully in the grave, unlike the other four bodies which were thrown in the grave. John had actually been wrapped

team after the tour along the western from once the number brothers statue was infally in place

in a groundsheet, his eyes weren't closed and his arms were crossed over his chest. "He was protected under the ground sheet

and he was preserved," he said.

"He had a full face under the rubber."

He worked with others from the local mu-

seum to remove the groundsheet bit by bit.

"When he saw daylight the sun was reflecting in his eyes because the sign of his eyes were still open... this was for me the most difficult

part of the evidence," Mr Vandewalle said.

"I never knew this would happen -looking in the eye of a soldier and his grief and this all happened in September 2006."

A couple of years later at the reburial of the soldiers, Mr Vandewalle met the families of the soldiers. He later decided to fly over and meet more people from the soldier's families.

It was then that he met the family members of the Nanango brothers, John and James. He found out that James had told his family about his last moment with his brother.

16 years on from the initial discovery of the Australian soldiers, Mr Vandewalle was there this year when the statues first arrived and toured the Western Front and were officially unveiled at the Brother's in Arms inauguration ceremony on 25 September, 2022.

Brothers tour the Western Front

Before the statue of Jim and Jack Hunter arrived at the Belgium memorial park, they took a tour of the Western Front.

Belgian photographer Gregory Verfaillie captured the historic moments as the team behind the monument dressed up in Great War era-appropriate uniforms and travelled in vehicles reflective of the era to nostalgically deliver the statues.

"First they went under the Menin Gate, then later they stopped at the place where they were found," he said.

The group then arrived near Polygon Wood at a pub called 'De Dreve'.

The owner of the pub, Johan Vandewalle,

was the man who had discovered the bodies of the five Australian soldiers in 2006.

"On these moments it gave me goosebumps and tears in my eyes," Mr Verfaillie recalled.

"That also counts for Johan -finally he could place the statue at the Brothers in Arms Memorial after such a long time."

A fitting memorial

Brothers in Arms Memorial Project Australia Committee member Kellie Dadds had the honour of attending the moving official inauguration ceremony on 25 September 2022.

"The ceremony was a very special occasion as it was a unique opportunity to undertake the pilgrimage of the many thousands of Australian families who lost two or more immediate family members in the war," she said.

"There was a strong international presence as well which reflected the significance of the memorial, and the occasion.

"The emotional connection between the locals who have been a part of this project and the memorial was also quite moving."

The Australian crew took the reins when it came to the sculpture with Melbourne-based sculptor Louis Laumen working on the bronze monument.

"The Australian contribution was largely centred on the Hunter Brothers bronze sculpture, so its arrival in Belgium and placement on the plinth was a beautiful conclusion of years of work," Ms Dadds said.

"There is still quite a bit of work required to fully complete the park, so I look forward to visiting it again in the future once it is completed."

The worldwide Covid-19 pandemic slowed the international effort to create the monument, delaying the Belgium park's progress as well as the sculpture's production in Melbourne.

"The complications created by Covid were the most difficult aspect to navigate through," Ms Dadds explained.

She has been inspired by the dedication,

commitment and generosity displayed by so

"Working jointly with the team in Belgium was made easier by effective communication, understanding each other's role and having a burning passion to see the project succeed."

Ms Dodds shared that the story of the Hunter Brothers has inspired herself and others to research how many Australian families lost two or more immediate relatives in World War I.

"The Hunter brother's story in terms of Jack's discovery in 2006 is quite unique, but the tragedy of his death is not," she said.

"There were so many families from Australian and other Nations who had immediate relatives serving alongside each other.

"The introduction of the policy that ceased relatives serving in the same unit was only introduced later in the war."

To capture this history the Brothers in Arms team have created a register which currently includes over 2,700 families.

"The project still has some way to go, but hopefully it will prove useful as we continue to understand the true cost of war and Australia's experience," Ms Dodds said.

The Brothers in Arms Memorial Project Australia Committee gives their sincere thanks to everyone who has contributed to the project, especially the Hunter family.

Every cent donated, every social media post shared and encouragement along the journey contributed to its success and seeing the Brothers in Arms memorial park become a reality.

"As for the brother's being home, I personally feel that Australia is and always will be their home but seeing them reunited on the battlefield where they spent their last moments together felt like a fitting tribute to the brothers as well as the other families."

TAFE Queensland automotive apprentices will soon have the opportunity to be equipped as EV experts.

This Queensland-first electric vehicle training was officially launched on 2 November with more than 100 industry representatives in attendance to learn about the future of Queensland's automotive industry training.

The initiative will allow any automotive apprentice enrolled with TAFE Queensland the opportunity to elect to include four nationally recognised EV training units in their apprenticeship training plan at no extra cost to their employer.

A panel of industry experts including representatives from TAFE Queensland, Toyota, HESS Metro vehicles, and Heavy Vehicle Industry Australia participated in a Q and A session regarding the future of Queensland's automotive training.

Each panellist brought a different perspective on the industry to the launch and were all able to have productive, robust discussions about the future of skills training in Oueensland.

They all agreed on the importance of TAFE Queensland making EV units available as part of automotive apprenticeship training plans.

Whilst other training organisations are offering the units as extra study to be completed and paid for after an apprenticeship, TAFE Queensland are the first to include them in the elective units on offer for the apprenticeship itself

The initiative forms part of TAFE Queensland's 'training lifecycle' plan for EV skills.

The plan aims to service industry workers at all points of their career lifecycle, offering the units to apprentices and in a specialised unit cluster for qualified mechanics.

TAFE Queensland – SkillsTech General Manager, John Tucker, said the plan was part of TAFE Queensland's commitment to industry.

"The training lifecycle plan caters for apprentices of the past, present, and future to upskill Queensland's automotive industry quickly in the face of the fast-changing automotive landscape."

"TAFE Queensland's ability to offer these units to apprentice all over our great state, from Coolangatta to Cairns and as far west as Mt Isa, sets us apart and enables us to service the automotive industry in all areas of Queensland."

"We are in constant contact with industry to ensure we are delivering on their needs for today and for the future," Mr Tucker continued, going on to detail the training on offer for qualified mechanics in Queensland.

The first on-campus running of the unit cluster began on 31 October, with a mixture of light and heavy automotive mechanics making up most of the sold-out class.

TAFE Queensland included two of their own teachers in the class to ensure there are an abundance of teachers ready to deliver the popular units.

A full class of 14 qualified mechanics were

undertaking the third day of the pilot on 2 November, when launch attendees visted TAFE Queensland's EV training facilities to watch the training in action.

Students epitomized the new wave of mechanics in Queensland challenging current stereotypes, which panellist David Cooper, Toyota Australia Manager of Technical Operations (Northern Region), said was key to the changing landscape of the industry.

BP Dam grant makes a splash

South Burnett Regional Council has been successful in winning a \$50,000 grant from the Queensland government's Tourism Experience Development Fund to boost visitor stays at Bjelke-Petersen Dam.

The funds will supplement Council capital expenditure of \$150,000 to improve facilities at the Dam, including nine new split air-conditioners into cabins, the upgrade of the kiosk and eatery and painting the manager's residence, nine 6mx6mx2.4m Colourbond boltdown carports, and a new shower area in the accommodation/conference facility.

Tourism Portfolio Councillor Jane Erkens described the upgrades as "important to develop a new customer experience to complement existing infrastructure and to increase the number of nights a customer stays."

"This funding together with the Council's commitment will assist in developing a niche market focused on corporate retreats in a natural location," Cr Erkens said.

"We have to use the South Burnett's own natural advantages to attract visitors to stay longer. This project will facilitate targeting corporate customers to invest in the same natural retreat that is currently enjoyed by recreational caravan, camping and fishing enthusiasts"

The project will be delivered by the Commercial Enterprise team, closely supported by Council's property team.

Work is expected to begin in March 2023 and be completed by August 2023.

Viable crop option



It's hard to imagine that three years ago we were all in the middle of a raging drought - and now here we are, wanting the rain to stop for winter harvest, hay production and summer crop plantings to proceed.

One grass crop consideration for summer is our various millet crops. These small-seeded, quick-maturing summer crops are ideal for double cropping or changeover crop options.

They don't like cold soils as in below 15 degrees Celsius too much at planting times, however our still very wet soils will certainly allow a shallower planting situation for millet seed.

Burying millet seed down to 75 millimetres in our soils is not the best idea for much emergence.

Our best grain type variety options are White French, Red Panicum, and Panorama whilst dual-purpose ones are Japanese and Shirohie, with the various pearl millets best for the grazing sense.

They can all be grazed, however the ones above are the best for the purpose.

As always with all summer crops: before you plant a seed, you need to determine what the end market is doing for your crop after you harvest it. Millet is no different - check first about the dollars per tonne you could receive after harvest or consider whether you may need to store it for some time to

achieve best returns.

A very recent quote from a local Darling Downs marketing company suggested around \$650.00 per tonne to the farmer for White French and Panorama seed - and that was export market. Also consider the local birdseed market needs to be filled; I must confess I have not observed too many millet crops around southern Queensland at this stage of the summer.

In regards to weed control, the only setback is not being able to apply an effective residual grass control herbicide like metolachlor.

Planting on narrower row spacing like 25 centimetres along with a good even strike can really put the brakes on grass weeds like Feather Top Rhodes and Barnyard grass. Yet, for broadleaf weeds, we have a few handy her-

bicides like Starane Advanced to deal with any broadleaf weeds, which depending on the millet type can then be mixed with lighter rates of atrazine.

The older 24-D herbicide can also be applied at light rates onto some species of millet crop, however please check labels or consult your agronomist before making any in-crop herbicide decisions.

Direct harvesting is still performed and of course the swathing or windrowing of uneven millet crops does occur.

Millet is not a bad crop choice at this time of the year, and of course we in the northern farming regions of Australia highly value the stubble that millets can leave on your paddocks for future fallow blocks.

Council on alert after another pest breach

Just weeks after dealing with the outbreak of an invasive plant species, the North Burnett is now on alert for yet another biosecurity breach, with the restricted chinee apple found at Philpott last week.

A total of ten shrubs of ziziphus mauritania, which is known by the names chinee apple or Indian jujubee, were spotted by North Burnett Regional Council land protection crews on the banks of the Burnett River earlier this month, according to a notice by Council sent out to landholders on 3 November.

The category 3 restricted invasive plant is native to southern Asia and eastern Africa and was first discovered in north Queensland in the 1860s, where it was found to have a significant impact on stock movement and pasture quality.

According to the Queensland Government's Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, chinee apple is usually found as a large shrub or small spreading tree, growing up to

eight metres tall.

The plant's branches are dense, zig-zag shaped, with leaves and thorns at each angle; the leaves can be easily identified by their round shape, glossy top and pale white underside

The fruits of the plant are 2.5 centimetres in diameter, green while unripe and pale yellow to orange when ripe.

"[Chinee apple] spreads along watercourses and grows into dense stands on dry exposed hillsides," a DAF infosheet states.

"Stands of chinee apple grow as open forests or form thorny thickets along waterways. Mature trees produce large quantities of fruit that are readily eaten by stock, feral pigs, wallabies and birds, which assists the spread of the seed.

"[The plant] creates impenetrable thickets that seriously hamper stock management, [reducing] pasture production and accessibility."

According to the Department, landholders must be aware of their obligation to man-

age the spread and impacts of chinee apple on their properties; this includes a ban on giving away, selling or releasing the plant into the environment.

"Chinee apple is a category 3 restricted invasive plant under the Biosecurity Act 2014," a spokesperson for the North Burnett Regional Council said in regards to the plant's discovery in the region.

"The Act requires everyone to take all reasonable and practical measures to minimise the biosecurity risks associated with invasive plants under their control, to meet their general biosecurity obligation.

"If you believe you have chinee apple or would like to confirm if a plant is chinee apple or not, please contact our friendly Land Protection staff for assistance."

The chinee apple discovery comes just weeks after the invasive plant fireweed was found on properties in both the North and South Burnett regions.

This was all thanks to an organising committee of two -Susan Robertson and Danita

"We're ecstatic -it went really well, the atmosphere was great, the people were great, they all dug deep," Ms Robertson said.

Remembering 'Mop' Conlon

When Dennis 'Mop' Conlon wrote the protest song 'Brisbane Blacks' in 1982, responding to the First Nations peoples' struggle for rights and recognition in a troubled time, he sowed the seeds that would catapult his band Mop and The Dropouts to nationwide fame.

The 'King of Murri Country' passed away in Rockhampton between 18 and 19 September 2022, aged 66, with hundreds of family members, friends, supporters and fans turning out to attend a funeral service in his honour on 7 October.

Mourners made the trip to Rockhampton's Baptist Tabernacle from Brisbane, Mount Isa, and Mop's home town of Cherbourg, with the singer's younger brother, Pastor Max Conlon, giving a speech honouring the music great's life and achievements.

"Whenever there was a funeral, Mop was always the last to come in. He liked a grand entrance, so he's still getting us even now," Pastor Conlon joked.

"Mop was a man of humour and wisdom. He loved his culture and values - he knew a lot about Country and history. He was good at anything he put his hands on.

"He was an absolute champion to many people, family, friends, and the music industry across Australia.

"He had a great heart, great abilities, and never kept them to himself - he always shared them.

"Mop used his gift of music to bring peace, unity, and hope.

"He's left big boots to fill - a big legacy for us. "Mop and [bandmate Angus] Rabbitt will be singing up a storm up there," he concluded.

To honour Mop's love for music, the congregation gathered throughout the funeral service to play and sing a number of songs including his favourite, the Christian hymn 'The Old Rugged Cross.

Family friend Steve Mitchell gave a heartfelt eulogy to Uncle Mop.

"Mop has had an extraordinary life; the effect he has had across the community nationally is almost hard to quantify," Mr Mitchell

"He galvanised the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community in a time of political change; he's touched thousands and thousands of lives.

"He was his happiest on the road, touring for crowds of adoring people. Mop toured until the last minute.

"He always did it for people to feel good, have a purpose, and feel united.

"The songs Mop and The Dropouts played unified everybody - they talk to a period of time, inspire the future and bring about social change.

"We honour him as a phenomenal musician. So many of his songs were and are anthems for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community," he added.

"Mop was also a father figure to many.

"He had a unique ability to make everybody feel like they were the most important person in the room.

"His passing left a huge hole in our hearts, but we should think ourselves lucky to have known him and can be comforted by the legacy of love, life and laughter he left behind.'

Family members put together a slideshow send-off for Mop, featuring a collection of photos taken across the decades set to Frank Sinatra's 'My Way.

At the end of the ceremony, Mop's family got together to sing his anthem 'Brisbane


For his contributions to the First Nations music scene, 'Mop' was awarded the 2022 QMusic Lifetime Achievement Award in March of this year.

One-time 'Dropout', drummer Hedley Johnson, praised the band's leader as a cultural icon.

'Mop is an icon and is loved and respected in both black and white communities in the Australian music industry," he said.

"Through his music he has become a lead er and fighter for Indigenous rights for us all; I am very proud of his many achievements and proud to be a Dropout forever.

"I loved him dearly and will miss him. Mop and The Dropouts... his music will live on for-



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Saint Mary's earns honours

The future of sport in the South Burnett is well and truly alive, with several students at Saint Mary's Catholic College in Kingaroy making names for themselves after competing in regional and state events last month.

Saint Mary's students Taine Strong, Benji Lipsett, Nicholas Howard, Joseph Carney, Jamie Searle and Riley Kerkow entered in a number of events at the Oueensland School State Championships in Brisbane, Wide Bay School Boys Cricket in Rockhampton, and Little Athletics in the Burnett in October.

At just 11 years old, Taine Strong is already taking on competitors several years his senior.

The young athlete represented the Wide Bay region at the 10-12-year-old Track and Field State Championships in Brisbane in the middle of October, being the only boy from the South Burnett at the event.

Taine was one of just two Wide Bay competitors at the 1,500-metre run event, with his 05:04.10 personal best even beating out runners a few age groups above him.

"I guess I was just determined to do well, because last year I attempted to compete for Wide Bay in cross country but sadly didn't make it," Taine explained.

'So, this year, I was really determined to prove that I could go perform at these levels. I achieved that this year and I'm really happy!'

Taine's achievements in track and field, cross country and Little Athletics events where he won a gold medal in the 1,500m run over the recent school holidays - have earned him his school's Junior Sportsman of the Year

However, the young gun is not stopping there: he has his eyes set on greater glory.

Sports fans might one day see Taine in an Australian jersey at the Olympics, with the 11-year-old hoping to qualify for the 'You for 2032' talent scout program when it returns to

"For next year, one of my goals is definitely to wear a Queensland uniform," he declared.

Taine's fellow schoolmates also have a number of impressive achievements to be proud of.

Battling a strong headwind, 12-year-old Benji Lipsett ran a personal best of 00:12.36 at the Queensland School State Championships' 100m sprint last month, also coming 17th in the 200m event.

Nicholas Howard (15) competed in the

800m run and discus throw at the Championships alongside 16-year-old Riley Kerkow, who entered in javelin and cross country.

Riley was also named Saint Mary's Sportsman of the Year for the highest number of overall "merit points" earned by competing at sporting events throughout the school year.

Joseph Carney attended the Wide Bay School Boys Cricket competition in Rockhampton in October, with Saint Mary's staff praising his "confident and competent" batting efforts.

Jamie Searle, who competes in cross country, has been instrumental in his local Little Athletics competition, where he has entered and excelled in every single discipline.

Saint Mary's Catholic College sports coordinator Susan Marnie said she was overjoyed with her students' strong results and dedication to their work.

"I'm extremely proud of all the people doing sport here at Saint Mary's, and how they represent the school," she said.

"I can see some future Olympians here!"


