Biosecurity concerns have Council pull the plug on washdown facility

Site is a wash

Almost one year after it was first made aware of a range of issues regarding a washdown facility at Mundubbera, the North Burnett Regional Council has decided to close the amenity

down until further notice.

At a 26 April meeting, NBRC councillors debated a report on the facility on Jack Parr Street near the Mundubbera Airport, hearing that, in its current state, the washdown site posed "extensive biosecurity issues" and "environmental risks" should it continue to operate.

As a result of this discussion, the facility was closed immediately and indefinitely, with Council now investigating their next course of

However, one North Burnett councillor was not satisfied with the lengthy review process, alleging the issue was known to the NBRC for far longer.

Kerb and channelling budget still on the council table

The South Burnett council has assuaged fears it may be slashing its kerb and channelling funding allocations in the upcoming budget, assuring residents the crucial road upgrade works are still on the menu where they are needed most.

The purported lack of funds assigned to kerb and channelling works first raised eyebrows during the 'Questions on Notice' section of council's 3 May meeting, in which councillor Kirstie Schumacher inquired about the amount of money earmarked for the practice in the 23/24 budget.

Council's response - that the draft 23/24 kerb and channel renewal program currently has an allocation of \$0, down from 22/23's \$217,350 - was followed up with the explanation that funding for projects like footpaths, pavements and other infrastructure works has to get re-prioritised every budget period.

However, despite the allocation amound reading a paltry \$0 at present, a spokesperson for the South Burnett Regional Council said there may yet be some money allocated to the project stream.

"Council has not 'axed' its kerb and channelling budget and at this stage Council is still drafting its budget for the 2023/24 financial year," the SBRC spokesperson explained.

"In some years Council may allocate more funding to a particular program and less to others, where Council may have a focus on targeting assets on a strategic basis.

"[A]s is the case for 2023/24, Council has a significant program allocation for works to target its rural and urban road network in conjunction with its flood damage reconstruction, and Council has been successful in partnering its funds with the Queensland Government's State Transport Infrastructure Program to deliver over \$1.2 million in

6 safety upgrades across the regions schools.

"Requests for new kerb and channel works are considered with all upgrade requests such as sealing gravel roads and can require significant design and cost review, usually because they need pavement and stormwater works," they added.

Indeed, councillors already heard of a number of kerb and channelling projects the region's community would like to see completed in the 2023/24 budget period, with the 3 May meeting pitching locations like North Street in Kingaroy, Elk Street in Nanango, and Sutton Street in Blackbutt - projected to cost a total of \$819,000.

When asked by Burnett Today whether large-scale CBD and parks projects such as the Kingaroy Transformation Project and the recently-announced Kingaroy Memorial Park rebuild were being prioritised over kerb and channelling works, Council was adamant to the contrary.

"Council does not consider its CBD and Parks projects 'vanity' projects, and in recent years, Council has completed a number of CBD and parks projects across the region focusing on replacing its ageing infrastructure and upgrading assets to achieve key community-driven priorities (...)," a spokesperson for the SBRC stated.

"These projects have significant asset works including replacement of failing or aging infrastructure including roads, footpaths, stormwater, water mains, [and] kerbing whilst updating these assets to modern standards to enable community outcomes both now and into the future," they added.

"[T]he major parks project in Memorial Park is planned to be delivered over a long period of time as funding is achieved and Council has taken a planned and coordinated approach."

Crisis call to empty cop shop

CONTENT WARNING: This story deals with matters of suicide. Reader discretion is advised.

The Queensland Police Service have defended the absence of Kingaroy officers during a critical incident on 8 April, when a healthcare worker preparing to end his life was faced with an empty station and no one left to turn to.

On Thursday 4 May, The Kingaroy Magistrates Court heard the matter of a male in his late forties - whose identity will not be disclosed to protect his privacy - charged with a count of firing a weapon in a public place.

The court headed by magistrate Andrew Sinclair heard that, at around 10:30pm on Saturday 8 April, the man, who suffers from depression and post-traumatic stress disorder, experienced a bout of suicidal ideation which led him to prepare to take his own life.

The man, who had reportedly been a critical care nursing worker for 25 years, took his gun, a .303 calibre bolt-action rifle, to the Kingaroy Police Station in an effort to turn it in and seek help for his worsening mental state.


However, the court heard that his attempts to alert the local police force to his condition were unsuccessful, as the station was unattended at the time.

The accused then resolved to carry out his plan to die by suicide, driving up to a nearby lookout where he prepared to shoot himself.

However, after deciding against the act, and in an attempt to ensure he could not harm himself any further, the man discharged the rifle into the forested area surrounding the

He then returned to the Kingaroy Police Station, where he could at last rouse officers and access help.

The accused was detained, had his gun seized and was then placed under mental health supervision before being released the next day.

His case before the Kingaroy Magistrates Court led to a good behaviour bond set at \$500, the suspension of his gun license, and a direction to sell his rifle by 1 July lest it be forfeited to the authorities, with police prosecutor Barry Stevens calling the matter one of "tragic circumstances."

In a statement to Burnett Today, a spokesperson for the Queensland Police Service defended Kingaroy officers for their absence during the man's plea for help, claiming police always treated matters of life and death as a priority.

"Urgent and life-threatening calls for service will always be treated as a priority by Kingaroy Police," the spokesperson stated.

"As such, officers from the Kingarov Police

Station responded within ten minutes to this incident and were able to provide access to professional health care," they continued, ignoring the fact that the man's first appearance at the station was not answered whatsoever, which directly led to his suicide attempt.

"This incident clearly reflects the QPS's commitment to providing a service to the Kingaroy community and keeping the community safe," they claimed.

The QPS spokesperson stated that, due to the ongoing adoption of an "agile policing approach", the concerning absence of officers at their respective stations may continue.

"The Queensland Police Service regularly reviews a range of issues including service demand, available resources, officer safety, emerging crime trends and population growth to ensure optimum service delivery across the South Burnett region," they explained.

"The Service is continuing to adopt an agile and borderless policing approach enriched with technology where officers are no longer restricted to a static location.

"This means regardless of where a frontline officer may be based, they will spend the majority of their shift out in the community, responding to calls for service and patrolling the area."

Solar farm's timber gift

Kingarov Solar Farm owners Mytilineos are making good on their promise to support local community groups, with a half-tonne load of reclaimed timber from the building site now in the hands of a class of TAFE construction stu-

The trailer load of wood - one hundred planks all up - arrived at the Kingaroy TAFE campus on Wednesday, 3 May, where it was well-received by a group of eager builders-inthe-making.

Robert Gardiner, Mytilineos' Community Engagement and Environment Officer. organised the drop-off and personally delivered the

Mr Gardiner explained the timber is a byproduct of the solar farm's construction process, where it is used to shield large cable drums from light and damage.

Once the cable is needed on-site, the timber is stripped from the drums, where it is then of no further use to the builders; Mr Gardiner explained that, rather than discard the still useable wood, he thought it would be more sustainable to offer it to local community groups instead.

So far, Mytilineos have delivered seven loads of timber to various organisations around the region, including the Kingaroy State High School, the Kingaroy Men's Shed, and South Burnett Care.

According to figures provided by Mytilineos. the timber donations have saved the community groups an estimated \$6,000 in material costs, while also reducing the company's own waste disposal costs by approximately \$95.

"The timber is perfect for anything you want - your imagination is the limit!" Mr Gardiner said at the Kingaroy TAFE on 3 May.

At TAFE, the donated timber is used by students in the construction classes to learn the ropes of the trade; already, the influx of useable wood has resulted in a number of sturdy chairs, handcrafted by the capable buildersin-training.

"I took a couple of the kids' chairs home for them, and the parents were raving about the things their kids did [with the timber]," construction teacher Mick Scott said.

'They think it's magnificent that the kids get the opportunity to do this sort of stuff," he added.

This [donation agreement] is really going to offer us the opportunity to do more community projects - our students will be able to make picnic tables, for instance," Evalyn Thompson, TAFE Kingaroy's Business Development Officer, said of the donation.

"It'll really broaden their horizons," she

Powerlink route pushback

The landholders of over 1000 properties will be affected by the two announced Powerlink transmission line corridors

In light of the released Draft Corridor Selection Report (CSR), people gathered in the Kilkivan Town Hall to discuss the issue with a Queensland Police Service presence to keep the peace.

Katy McCallum, spokesperson of the Kilkivan Action Group stated that people at the meeting simply didn't want the powerlines.

"We don't want them, didn't ask for them, and don't see why we should carry the weight and the burden, for the fact that the city can't control their power consumption," Ms McCal-

The second issue raised was that if the organised effort to lock gates and not allow Powerlink onto private property was to continue, would Powerlink use statutory authority to force their way onto private property.

"They [Powerlink representatives] didn't answer that question.

In a previous conversation Burnett Today had with Ms McCallum, she pointed to several issues with the project including the impact on recreational use of Borumba Lake, and the threat to biosecurity for farmers.

"They've fought hard to keep the declared pests off, spent 10s of thousands of dollars... but the second they turn up [Powerlink] there'll be heaps of weeds," Ms McCallum.

In response to concerns about biosecurity, Powerlink Executive General Manager Delivery and Technical Solutions Ian Lowry said Powerlink had made commitments and protocols to land access that can be viewed on their website in a 24-page document.

The guiding principles of the Land Access Protocol are planning, investigation and acquisition (schedule 1), which moves onto construction (schedule 2), which moves onto maintenance and operation (schedule 3), and agreed property-specific information, rule and entry conditions (schedule 4) that sits outside of the other three principles.


Another issue raised was the future of recreation at Borumba Lake and the impact this might happen on the economy of Imbil- a town close to the Lake.

There were fears that an exclusion zone from the pumped hydro at the eastern side of the Lake might dampen or kill recreational use of the Lake.

In response to questions about the exclusion zone and the future recreational use of the Lake, Queensland Hydro CEO (Interim) Chris Evans said the company was very aware of the importance of Lake Borumba for recreational

"Construction associated with the pumped hydro energy storage project will be undertaken such that recreation activities can continue, as far as practicable, while maintaining the safety of users," the CEO said.

"Once the project is completed, it is likely that there will be restricted water activities close to the pumped hydro intake structures and dam wall, similar to what exists at the dam wall now."

What are the plans and why were they chosen?

The Draft Corridor Selection Report (CSR) has been released by Powerlink for where powerlines connecting the Borumba Pumped Hydro Site to the Woolooga and Halys Substations

7918 hectares and the lowest affected 4103 hectares.

- It also had the least impact on environmental criteria such as essential habitat, affecting 4264 hectares as opposed to all other options which were higher, the second lowest was 4456 hectares affected.
- This option is also claimed to have zero hectares of National Parks affected when refined to a one-kilometre corridor.
- It is also the shortest in length (97km) and has the opportunity to co-locate with other transmission lines for 15 per cent of the
- This option also has the lowest proportion of state-owned land at 15 per cent.

The corridor chosen to go between the Pumped Hydro and Woolooga is referred to as Woolooga West and was chosen for a number of reasons.

- It goes through the highest percentage of state-owned land at 27 per cent, the second closest was 10 per cent.
- This option impacts the least number of properties at 457 properties affected, the next lowest affecting 458 and the highest affecting 2635 properties.
- It affects the least number of properties smaller than five hectares at 28 properties, with the largest affecting 1207 properties.

This corridor also has the least impact on:

Teacher's Anzac adventure

Alex Cashin, assistant principal at Saint Mary's Catholic College in Kingaroy, returned from the trip of a lifetime in Europe last week.

Alex won the Premier's Anzac Prize, which is a competition for Queensland secondary students and teachers to apply to go on a tour of Europe visiting World War I sites relevant to the ANZACs.

Applying to be a chaperone, Alex had to complete a 20-page application, outlining why she would be a good candidate.

Even with years of experience teaching history, this wasn't easy, but she got it done, sent away, and was accepted.

Part of the deal with the Prize is that each student and chaperone had to do a project on two Servicepeople and deliver a eulogy either at their grave site or a memorial.

Alex chose to do her eulogies for Edith Blake- the only Australian nurse killed in the war, and her great-grandfather, Private Leslie Harold Raward.

Leslie was an orphan, who later married Ethel Raward.

Leslie Raward signed up for the Army with his best mate, Leslie James Bugg on 7 August 1915.

Together, they served in North Africa and then went to France to fight on the Western Front.

Leslie Raward sustained severe shrapnel wounds and was taken off the front line to a field hospital.

Two days before the Battle of Fromelles he succumbed to wounds.

Just 13 days before, the son of Leslie and Ethel Raward and Alex Cashin's grandfather,

He never knew his father, and his father probably never knew of his existence.

Alex was told on the trip, that her grandfather was probably lucky to have died before the battle because with his passing in the hospital, Leslie Raward received a proper burial, his death was recorded, and his family back home were notified of his passing as soon as possible.

This was a bleak luxury compared to so many who died in the Battle of Fromelles but

were considered 'missing' as their bodies were eaten by the mud and the rats in no-mansland.

Leslie Raward's best mate Leslie Bugg likely met some such a fate.

He was considered missing until the end of the war when the Australian Government declared that he had likely died sometime in the Battle

With recent excavation, a mass grave of some 250 Australian soldiers was found.

Of these 250, over 150 have since been identified, with five more being identified recently.

Alex Cashin hopes that perhaps one day, her great-grandfather's best mate Leslie Bugg will be one of those identified.

5513 of Australians died in the Battle of Fromelles.

As did thousands of British and German people.

Visiting the grave of Leslie Raward was one of the most rewarding elements of the trip for Alex, but the best part for her and Alison Marsh, the other chaperone, was watching the students they were escorting grow so much over the two weeks.

"It's exhausting but it's so rewarding," Alex said.

"Watching young people we took, them being filled with knowledge and awe, and wonder, and curiosity, and watching them grow themselves; not just as young historians, but grow as young people into almost young adults"

The eight students were a very diverse group.

Some were from the city, others from the country, there were four boys and four girls, aged 13 to 18, with different religious backgrounds with two students being Muslim, but they were all drawn together for their passion for history.

While they were in Europe they also went to London, Paris, Villers-Bretonneux, the sites of the Battles of Passchendaele and the Somme and other places of significance.

They also went to Belgium and saw the Brothers in Arms statue of the two Nanango brothers who were parted by the war.

One returned to Australia after the war, the other was buried in Belgium.

Before the group went to Europe, they met with a Brigadier in the Army who posed a question to them, 'What is worth dying for?'

Alex said going on the trip has since changed her answer.

"Before I left, I would've said that's not worth dying for, like what an outrageous loss of human life these wars have been.

"But at the end, the kids were talking about what's worth dying for- your friends, the people you love... you can see why they went and why they stood next to each other and they battled next to their friends, brothers, best friends like my great-grandfather.

"And I can see that too, you wouldn't leave your best friend to go fight by themselves, you'd stand up and go with them."

"That didn't make sense just standing here in Australia, you had to go there to see it."

This understanding and a broader understanding of the First World War is what Alex intends to bring back to her community and pass on to her students.

"I have a much better understanding [of] what happened at the Western Front now... there's a lot of gaps in that Western Front understanding [because] most people focus on Gallipoli and that campaign, so then most students would graduate with not really having a good understanding of what happened in France in World War I.

"I'm going to really try and help change that..."



Powerlink Queensland - Borumba Pumped Hydro **Project – Transmission Connections**

Queensland Hydro is investigating a potential pumped hydro energy storage facility at Borumba Dam, located near Imbil, south west of Gympie.

It is a nation-building infrastructure project of high strategic importance to Queensland and the future energy system. It will play a significant role in the State's renewable energy transformation - long duration storage is critical to ensuring Queenslanders have access to affordable, reliable and clean energy.

Powerlink has been engaged by Queensland Hydro to develop two new transmission lines to connect the pumped hydro facility to the transmission network.

Based on the projected generation of the facility, new transmission lines of up to 500kV are required from the Lake Borumba site to Woolooga in the north, and Halys in the south-west.

Washdown site plug pulled

Almost one year after it was first made aware of a range of issues regarding a washdown facility at Mundubbera, the North Burnett Regional Council has decided to pull the plug on the amenity until further notice.

At a 26 April meeting, NBRC councillors debated a report on the facility on Jack Parr Street near the Mundubbera Airport, hearing that, in its current state, the washdown site posed "extensive biosecurity issues" and "environmental risks" should it continue to operate.

As a result of this discussion, the facility was closed immediately and indefinitely, with Council now investigating their next course of action.

The closure of the facility comes as the conclusion of a near one-year review process, which began with a report released on 20 July last year.

"In July 2022 the outcomes of an audit into NBRC-operated washdown facilities were provided to Council," a spokesperson for the North Burnett Regional Council explained.

"The audit was completed due to concerns regarding potential non-compliance of NBRC washdown facilities and the environmental risk which could be created by such non-compliance, from material such as weeds, seeds and primary industry run-off," the spokesperson added.

North Burnett CEO Margot Stork expanded on the above information in a statement to Burnett Today.

"The presentation outlined Council's environmental responsibilities, the nature of issues with both internal and public-facing facilities, comparative service costs, and likelihood and possible scale of cost of establishing compliance and viability in the operations," Ms Stork said.

"The audit disclosed significant issues with the Mundubbera Washdown Facility, including

the potential to create extensive biosecurity issues through seed spread in the Burnett River during rain events," she explained.

As a result of the July presentation, Council staff launched a full-scale investigation into the facility.

"Following the workshop, staff carried out targeted consultation and developed options for rectification and operation of the public washdown facilities," Ms Stork explained.

"The results of these investigations were presented to Council at a Workshop on 18 January 2023. The matter then went to Council for consideration at a General Meeting on 26 April 2023."

However, one North Burnett councillor was not satisfied with the lengthy review process, alleging the issue was known to the NBRC for far longer. "Following a Council workshop on 28 January about the Mundubbera washdown facility and following numerous conversations with stakeholders, I requested on 9 March to review the facility again (...)," councillor Sue Payne, whose division encompasses the town of Mundubbera, stated in a post to a community Facebook group on 21 April.

"This has falled on deaf ears. Boom, it's appeared in our agenda for the meeting on 26 April.

"In 2015, an audit report by consulting engineers - no doubt at great [cost] was completed. So [for] at least eight years Council knew," Cr Payne alleged.

"Every workshop and meeting is filled with stories like these and quite frankly I'm tired of having to listen to them and make tough decisions thanks to the past. I constantly question what has been happening," she added.

According to the North Burnett's CEO, Council staff are now looking into getting the facility up and running once more.

"Council is working to explore options and find a solution which works for [the] North Burnett," Ms Stork said.

"Any solution will need to meet the State Government compliance requirements and funding options will also need to be considered.

"At this stage it is unclear how long the facility will be closed for, as remedial action and alternative options are explored," she added.

"Council will continue to provide information to the community as it comes to hand."

The North Burnett Regional Council operates three other washdown facilities in the region, with one each situated at Monto, Eidsvold and Gavndah.





Wicks' 'honest' reflection

Life has been a 'properly long way' for a Tingoora couple.

Newly published Burnett authors, Graeme and Val Wicks, recount their life's journey filled with stories of stock routes in outback Australia and life on the land in their honest autobiography 'Properly Long Way - Our Story'.

"The book is a good depiction of our character." Val said.

The Tingoora couple held a book launch on Saturday, 15 April at their property with a 'good crowd' of 40 people coming along to celebrate their debut book.

"There's been a lot of interest in the book," Graeme said.

They had friends travel over specifically for the book launch, which made it extra special.

Word has gotten around and the book has gained interest in the stock and horse communities around the world in the likes of Canada and America.

"It was written for our kids, but there's been so much interest in it that we've published it and it's going really well," Graeme said.

Val was determined to record her story for the next generation.

"I knew nothing of my parent's story, I didn't want to let my kids die wondering - I originally wrote an A4 thing and gave each of the kids that... but we got pestered to write a book," Val said.

Val's part in the book was more than two years in the making, whereas Graeme's was done 'rather hastily'.

"So there's a lot that I think now that I didn't put in," he said.

Inspired to record something for both his children and grandchildren, Graeme realised his bush adventures are becoming a thing of the past.

"Our children and grandchildren pestered,

saying Pop, Oma you've had interesting lives why don't you write something and the thing that spurred me on is that, as I'm not a writer, was that things you'll read about in there like Bronco branding and pack horse camp they are a thing of distant yesteryear now.

"It's such a totally different lifestyle and totally different outlook on life," Graeme said.

The pair are full of yarns from their days of bull catching and in the bush in the Northern Territory and the Kimberley where Graeme worked as the Head Stockman Manager.

Graeme grew up in the South Burnett region, but spent 12 years in the outback.

In the book Val recounts her upbringing in Buenos Aires, England and Rhodesia before moving to Australia in 1972 where she went to work on the stock camp property.

For Val, her highlight of the story came from when the pair first met 48 years ago.

"For me, it was arriving and looking at this

hunky head stockman and being introduced to him and he looked at me and said 'I won't have women in my stock camp'... I'd never encountered that before," she said.

The Wicks left the bush in 1981 and called the South Burnett home.

Cool mornings just a taste

Kingaroy recorded one of the coldest temperatures in all of Queensland last week, with meteorologists already calling on Burnett residents to prepare for further cold snaps.

According to the Bureau of Meteorology's Queensland branch, Kingaroy was tied with Dalby for the third-lowest recorded temperature in the state between 9am on Monday, 1 May, and Tuesday 2 May, coming in at a near-freezing 1.7 degrees Celsius measured at 5:56am.

The two towns were only eclipsed by Oakey, which measured 0.3 degrees, and Wellcamp at Toowoomba, which recorded Queensland's first sub-zero minimum temperature of 2023 at -0.4 degrees.

Harry Clark, a senior meteorologist for the Bureau of Meteorology, said the cold temperature last week would not be out of the ordinary for Kingaroy if it was recorded later in the year, but with May's average minimum temperature measured at 7.6 degrees, the day's result was certainly noteworthy.


"The coldest temperature ever recorded in Kingaroy in the month of May was -3 degrees Celsius in 2002," Mr Clark said.

"It'll certainly get colder in the next few months, but even next week the minimum [temperatures] are projected to be in the single figures.

"The coolest minimums typically occur in winter, between June and August; the month with the lowest recorded temperatures is July, with an average minimum of 3.8 degrees," he explained, adding that the coldest temperature ever recorded in July was a chilling -6 degrees Celsius.

According to the Bureau's senior weather scientist, the reason for Kingaroy's - and the South Burnett's - cold temperatures lies in the region's high elevation.

"Elevation is definitely the difference-mak-


er," Mr Clark said, saying the South Burnett's hilly geography, such as the Bunya Mountains and the Blackbutt Range, factor into the region recording cooler temperatures than more coastal locations like the Brisbane and Gympie areas.

Kingaroy's airport, where this morning's 1.7 degree temperature was recorded, sits at 434 metres above sea level - by no means a record

even within the Burnett, but enough to result in a rather chilly minimum measurement.

After last week's cold snap, the Bureau of Meteorology now warns Burnett residents to keep their warm socks and sweaters to hand, with further lows a definite possibility.

"Another cold wave may come through [soon] - it could even be a wave of frost," BoM's Harry Clark said.




Chilly temperatures over the past few mornings had South Burnett residents break out the blankets and mugs of hot beverages.

The cold made another appearance on Monday, 8 May, with a Bureau of Meteorology report stating Kingaroy recorded the fourth-coldest temperature in the state at 11:30am - a cool 14.9 degrees Celsius.



Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from the Burnett region are invited to learn about starting their own NDIS business.

There will be two one-day workshops, one in Eidsvold and another in Kingaroy, where participants will learn about how to start and grow a National Disability Insurance Scheme

Register online or simply come along on Monday, 15 May to North Burnett Community Hall or Wednesday, 17 May to the South Burnett Enterprise Centre to work with Aboriginal business expert trainer Leesa Watego from 'IM', Iscariot Media.

Both sessions will be held from 9am to 4pm with snacks and lunch provided.

Attendees will leave with an understanding about the NDIS and how to build a business to support those living with NDIS in their mob.

This is part of the Get NDIS Business Ready seminar series and offers free place-based and online sessions focused on understanding the NDIS and entering the NDIS market.

Key topics included in the First Nations Get NDIS Business Ready session will be:

- Understanding the NDIS, with a focus on First Nations perspectives and experiences
- Understanding the needs and goals of local NDIS participants
- NDIS business opportunities, market growth and how to become a registered NDIS pro-
- Understanding NDIS Worker Screening and quality and safeguards requirements.

The seminar program is supporting NDIS eligible First Nations people with disability to access more culturally safe services in their own communities to live their best lives.

More than 102,000 Queenslanders receive NDIS supports totalling more than \$7 billion per year - this includes almost 10,000 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in this

An extra 40,000 Queenslanders are expected to enter the NDIS by 2025. This will provide even more opportunities for First Nations owned businesses to grow through delivering disability supports to NDIS participants.

Community Services Industry Alliance has partnered with Iscariot Media to deliver this phase of the program. IM is an Aboriginal owned and operated agency with expertise and lived experience in training and supporting Indigenous business.

communities. There are many different ways to work in industry, including small business. We look forward to helping to increase Indigenous enterprises in this space."



The timing of the grant comes as research conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics reveals rising inflation (42 per cent) and reduced consumer spending (41 per cent) are the two biggest concerns for SMBs in Australia, with many looking to cut costs or pay themselves less to negate this.

It also revealed SMBs, which account for 97.5 per cent of all businesses in Australia, have reported a lack of understanding about the benefits of new technology (42 per cent) and identified the needs for internal skills and training (39 per cent) as the greatest barrier to upgrading their technology and finding new efficiencies.

'Men, book a check-up'

South Burnett's 2023 Face of Relay is urging men to get regular health check-ups.

Dennis Cotter was announced as the relay ambassador at the Kingaroy Chamber of Commerce and Industry's Relay For Life breakfast on Thursday, 4 May, which marked the official launch of the 2023 Relay for Life campaign.

"I strongly encourage everyone out there, at least at the age of 60, to go and get full blood tests... get your check-up," he said.

"This is the problem: we don't listen to our bodies, it will tell us when something is wrong, so please go and get your check-up if you're early, you'll beat it."

The prostate cancer survivor is thankful he had been cautious and had biennial checkups once he turned 50 and annual tests after he turned 60.

When he was 67, his concerned GP referred him to a specialist. They did a biopsy and two out of eight were cancerous.

The following year, the biopsy returned eight cancerous samples out of 14.

"We've got to do something... but we got you very early.. there's other options," the specialist told Dennis.

In February 2021, Dennis went and saw oncology and underwent 20 doses of radiation. During his latest check-up, in March 2023,

Dennis' tests came back negative.

"It looks like we've beaten it, no cancer cells showing, there's nothing in the blood," he said.

At the breakfast, melanoma survivor and Australian cricketer Greg Rowell shared his story as the morning's guest speaker and echoed Dennis' call for others, especially men, to get regular health check-ups.

Relay a huge success

2023 marks 18 years of Relay for Life in Kingaroy and the South Burnett.

Since it started in 2006, the Burnett campaign has raised more than \$1.8 million for Cancer Council.

Cancer Council's Jessica Hughes shared some cancer statistics at the Relay Breakfast and thanked the South Burnett crew for their dedication.

"This event in particular has been a huge success for so many years now so we want to thank you so much for your dedication," she said.

The money raised goes towards Cancer Council's 13 11 20 support line for those impacted by cancer diagnosis, accommodation lodges for patients undergoing treatment, counselling, financial support and of course, cancer research.

Cancer Council has been able to invest \$250 million into Australian cancer research in the past five years alone. This critical research has helped increase cancer survival rates in Aus-

tralia from 49 per cent in the 1980s to 69 per cent today.

Carl Rackemann, who has been a driving force behind Relay for Life, was announced as the Relay's ongoing Patron.

Before the official relay event, Carl will head up the long-awaited Dinner with the Captains, which is set for Saturday 29 July (more details on page 62).

At the breakfast Carl announced the 2023 Australian captains will be: rugby league star Allan Langer AM, beach volleyballer Natalie Cook OAM and Australian women's cricket captain Jodie Purves.

Another major fundraiser is the Ride 4 Relay, which will also take place from 29 August

to 2 September. Participants are sponsored to take on the challenge of cycling more than 400 kilometres in four and a half days.







Vacancies, listings to rent

Potential renters in the Wide Bay-Burnett can breathe a little easier this month, following a 'sizeable' uptick in rental listings across the region - but industry experts warn the country-wide housing crisis is still far from over.

Real estate appraisal service PropTrack delivered its March 2023 rental report on 27 April, with figures indicating that pressures on current and potential renters in regional Oueensland have eased to an extent.

The report, which assessed property market enquiries by over 12 million Australians, outlined that, in regional Queensland, the overall number of new rental listings had increased by 17 per cent from last year, bringing with it a 39.4 per cent decrease in applications per listing.

Across regional Queensland, the rental vacancy rate was listed as 1.62 per cent - a 16 per cent increase over last year's 1.36 per cent.

In the Wide Bay-Burnett region in particular, the number of rental listings had gone up by 11.6 per cent in the month of March, con-

tributing to a 47.5 per cent increase over 2022.

However, PropTrack's Director of Economic Research, Cameron Kusher, warns that the total number of rental listings compared to pre-pandemic levels - together with a still-low vacancy rate - mean renters are not out of the woods just yet.

"While this [rental listing increase] is a sizeable jump, total rental listings are still 33.8 per cent lower than they were at the start of the pandemic, so supply remains much tighter than it was," Mr Kusher explained.

"This is also reflected in the very tight rental vacancy rate which is 1.3 per cent, albeit it has increased from 1 per cent a year ago."

"Absent a return of investors to the market or a big increase in first home buyer numbers, it seems unlikely that the strong demand and insufficient rental supply will be rectified any time soon," he warned.

"This means the cost of renting is expected to continue rising – particularly in capital cities"

THE INTEREST RATES HIKE

INTEREST rate hike whiplash for mortgage holders, says REIQ

The REIQ says last month's pause in interest rate hikes has proven to be a short-lived relief for mortgage holders, as the RBA has hiked the cash rate by 25 basis points to 3.85 percent – the highest level since April 2012.

REIQ chief operating officer Dean Milton said the RBA's decision to forge ahead with its aggressive tightening cycle would weigh heavily on homeowners and investors.

"We have seen regulatory chaos from State and Federal Governments, and whiplashing back to another interest rate rise only adds to this pain," Mr Milton said.

"There's barely been time for the market to absorb the lagged impact of the previous 10 consecutive rises and reassess the approach based on this.

"Equally, it's difficult to see how wouldbe buyers can catch a break when their borrowing capacity has been on such unsteady footing."

Mr Milton said economic conditions were already stifling future supply and pushing the dream of home ownership further out of reach for many.

"Building approvals for houses are down which will have impacts on short-to-medium term supply, and lending statistics are also showing buyer activity is continuing on a downward trend," he said.

"Inflation in Queensland is being driven by inelastic goods and services such as electricity up 32.5 percent and health up six percent for the quarter, which interest rates do nothing to quell.

"It's time for state, federal and local

governments to do their part in fighting inflation.

"Fiscal policy needs to match monetary policy, and what we need now is action to remove impediments to new housing supply, investment in social housing, and a focus on overall spending to ensure it does not lead to further increases in inflation."

On another note, he said the recent recommendations from the RBA review were welcomed by the REIO.

"We welcome the refresh of the RBA which brings it in to line with other major central banks around the world - more transparency is always welcome," he said.

The respite from rising borrowing costs

will be a short one, with the Reserve Bank surprising most economists by lifting its key interest rate again and warning of more hikes might be needed.

Writing in The Guardian, Peter Hannam said the move defied investors who had bet the central bank would extend its pause for a second month.

The dollar soared and shares sank on the surprise.

The move comes on top of 10 consecutive rises since last May and brings the cumulative increase to 3.75 percentage points.

"Inflation in Australia has passed its peak, but at seven percent is still too high

and it will be some time yet before it is back in the target range," RBA governor Philip Lowe said in a statement.

"Given the importance of returning inflation to target within a reasonable timeframe, the board judged that a further increase in interest rates was warranted."

The rates decision came despite last week's release of weaker-than-expected inflation, particularly for the underlying price pressures the RBA follows closely. Instead, the board weighed other factors, such as a jobless rate at near half-century lows, the nation's population expected to swell 700,000 this year and next and a rebound in property prices.

Eggplant... The blank Canvas

It has been said that an eggplant can become anything it wants to be. It's like a blank canvas waiting to be painted with other flavours. Aubergine, also known as eggplant, is a fruit rather than a vegetable and is botanically classified as a berry. It is closely related to tomatoes and potatoes, and surprisingly, the tobacco plant. Originating in South East Asia, aubergine is commonly used in Italian, Mediterranean, French, and Middle Eastern cuisines. Aubergines come in many varieties, ranging from small pea-shaped to large pumpkin-like shapes and sizes, and come in various colors including green, cream, dark purple, and yellow. They can be prepared in many ways, such as hot or cold, braised, baked, battered and rilled pan-fried ba blended, and pureed. Famous dishes made from aubergine include ratatouille, moussaka, baba ghanoush, and imam bayildi. While aubergines can be a bit bitter in their raw form, they do not contain enough nicotine to be addictive.



In fact, you would need to eat around 10kg of raw eggplant to consume the equivalent amount of nicotine found in one cigarette. However, if an aubergine is particularly bitter, it may need to be degorged to remove its moisture and bitterness. Personally, I enjoy grilled aubergine slices. In my next column, I'll share with you my favourite grilled Aubergine antipasto recipe.

CELEBRATING NATIONAL BBQ DAY - 16TH MAY

Our best barbecue tips

The Bundaberg and Hervey Bay Barbeques Galore franchises have both won the prestigious National Franchisee of the Year Award and the staff know a lot about selecting the right barbecue and cooking on it!

When choosing a portable barbecue, here are their top tips:

- Gas is probably the easiest fuel source to manage, but electric and charcoal models are available
- Consider size and where it is being stored, especially if you want to take it camping etc.

if it is being fitted into a caravan, it must be compliant with current flame failure standards.

- 1, 2 and 3 burner models are available and can generally be purchased with or without
- Grill plates are best for searing meat, but you may want a flat plate on which to cook eggs, fry onions etc.

Also remember:

- Use a good quality high temp oil (eg canola)
- on barbecue plates. Low temp oils like olive oil can be used on the meat etc. but not directly on the plates as it will burn on, making cleaning very difficult.
- Bringing food to room temperature prior to barbecuing allows for more even cooking as it is less shocked by the intense heat that a barbecue instantly applies.
- When roasting, place meat on a raised trivet in baking dish. If there are 2 or 3 grills heat all burners initially, then you can usually turn the plate directly under the roast off.
- Don't pick, poke or squash your food on the barbecue as this removes moisture from the food, ultimately destroying the look and
- Always allow meat to rest after cooking to allow the texture to relax and the juices to be absorbed back in.
- After cooking, while plates are still warm, use a sturdy grill brush and water to remove any food residues and apply a light coating of high temp oil.

Barbecued chicken roulades are sure to impress

Want to impress family/friends at your next barbecue? These roulades can be prepared beforehand and be in the refrigerator ready to pop onto the barbecue for cooking.

BARBECUED CHICKEN ROULADES

SERVES: 6 roulades

Ingredients:

- 6 trimmed chicken breasts (tenderloins removed)
- 12 pieces thinly sliced (2mm) streaky bacon
- chicken rub/seasoning of choice
- 2 cups cooked, mashed sweet potato
- ¼ cup roughly chopped macadamias
- ½ cup golden syrup (and 1 tablespoon rum if desired)

Method:

- 1. Combine sweet potato and macadamias, mix well and put aside.
- Flatten each chicken breast to 5-7mm
- For each roulade lay 2 pieces of bacon on piece of baking paper on a clean board.
- 4. Lay flattened chicken breast on top of bacon, trimming if necessary.
- 5. Sprinkle with rub.
- Place approximately 1 tablespoon of sweet potato/macadamia mix on chicken breast and spread evenly, leaving about 2cms at far end.
- 7. With assistance of baking paper, firmly roll the bacon, chicken etc to form a log.
- 8. Twist the baking paper on both ends to form a bonbon and refrigerate the roulades to set (at least 30 minutes).
- 9. Place roulades (still in baking paper) on rack in barbecue on medium heat for approximately 5 minutes, with the lid down.
- 10. Carefully unwrap roulades and place back on open barbecue for another 10 minutes, or until cooked through (turn during cooking)
- 11. Warm syrup (and rum if used) over low heat, stirring continually.
- 12. Slice each roulade into 4-5 pieces and drizzle with sauce before serving.

Isuzu Genie does his job

It seems that like the Genie of the Lamp a customer's wish is Isuzu Ute's command, for a new model has elbowed its way into the top echelons of its rugged pick-up truck ranks.

The Japanese manufacturer has slotted the D-Max LS-U+ in between the well-presented LS-U double cab lifestyle ute and flagship of the updated third generation for those who want a touch of luxury without the 'shouty' styling of the X-Terrain.

The new D-Max LS-U+ Crew Cab 4x4 Ute features similar equipment to the MY22 LS-U variant, but with the addition of premium black leather-accented upholstery and inte-

Convenience is also enhanced by the addition of a Smart Key, providing keyless entry, push button start, welcome light, and walk away door lock. Similar to the system in the X-Terrain, the welcome light illuminates the cabin when it detects the key is within 2 metres of the vehicle and the latter automatically locks the vehicle when the smart key is detected more than 3m away.

Also available is a genuine canopy, which adds a combination of convenient lockable pop-out or sliding windows, making the LS-U+ a versatile load carrier.

Pricing reflects the added creature comforts and convenience, with the LS-U+ priced at \$61,900 plus on-road costs, \$2500 more than the regular LS-U, but considerably \$4000 cheaper than the range-topping X-Terrain.

Warranty is six years or 150,000 kilometres; seven years roadside assistance, provided servicing is with an Isuzu Ute dealer, and seven years capped price servicing.

STYLING

The LS-U+ comes exclusively with a double cab and style-side high tensile steel body on a ladder-frame chassis.

The front is lifted from X-Terrain extremes with a dark coloured grille broken up by dual chrome cross pieces, the latter considered a badge of premium quality, especially in Eu-

Flanking this are automatic bi-LED headlights, incorporating LED daytime running lights, with auto-levelling and automatic high beam control. Below are LED fog lights.

LEDs sign off the rear with combination taillights. On a sad note, large heated door mirrors are poorly positioned up front to produce a niggling blind spot.

A versatile factory-fitted tub liner is installed inside the 1570 mm long, 1530 mm wide, 490 mm deep tray. A selection of tonneaus and canopies is available from the Isuzu Ute Genuine Accessories catalogue. The test

vehicle was fitted with a manually operated lockable roller tonneau cover.

The D-Max LS-U+ rolls on 18 inch machined-face alloy wheels with 265/60R18 Bridgestone 684II HT tyres. There's a full-size

INTERIOR

The cabin is modern and comfortable, with black leather-accented upholstery, eight-way power assisted driver's seat with power lumbar support and a premium-leather bound steering wheel with reach and rake adjustment.

Dual zone air-conditioning allows driver and front passenger singly to control the temperature. Rear passengers also benefit from rear air vents.

INFOTAINMENT

High on the central dash is a 9-inch high-definition infotainment system, featuring voice recognition, in-built satellite navigation, DAB+ radio, and the latest in smartphone mirroring, with Android Auto and wireless Apple CarPlay. Occupants can take advantage of a premium eight-speaker surround sound system

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The LS-U+ is powered by Isuzu's 3.0-litre, turbo-diesel engine, developing 140 kW of power and 450 Nm of torque, mated with a six-speed automatic transmission.

SAFETY

In line with all MY22 D-Max models, the LS-U+

takes up a five-star ANCAP safety rating and comes standard with Isuzu's Intelligent Driver Assistance System, a suite of advanced driver safety and assistance technologies, including a state-of-the-art 3-D stereo camera that detects other motorists, pedestrians and cyclists. .

Standard with IDAS are autonomous emergency braking with turn assist, adaptive cruise control, traffic sign recognition, blind spot monitoring, rear cross-traffic alert, lane keep assist, plus eight airbags including a knee and centre-airbag.

DRIVING

Sharing its engine and chassis with the Mazda BT-50, there is considerable clatter from under the D-Max LSU+ bonnet. There's little excuse these days for this amount of diesel rattle and here the motor shows its age.

The six-speed transmission handles most situations but can be a tad tardy in dropping down a cog under hard acceleration.

Isuzu claims a combined urban/ highway fuel consumption of 8.0 litres per 100 kilometres. The test LS-U+ used as much as 10 litres per 100 kilometres of diesel in city working and 6.6 litres per 100 kilometres on motorway cruising, so there's little to complain about

I am not alone in having a love-hate relationship with vehicle lane intervention. As part of the IDAS suite, the LS-U+ features the new Lane Support System switch, located on the steering wheel, allowing the driver to toggle all Lane Support Systems on or off, by a

single push of the button for two seconds. Going off road? Switch to Isuzu's Terrain Command 4x4 with 2-High, 4-High and 4-Low drive modes, an electromagnetic rear differential lock and ground clearance of 240 mm.


Measuring up among the best in the range, approach, departure and ramp-over angles weigh in at 30.5 deg, 19.0 deg and 23.8 deg, respectively. A water wading depth of up to 800 mm is also up there with the best in class.

With customer surveys detailing that close to half of all Isuzu owners tow with their vehicle, the D-Max LS-U+ has a 3.5 tonne braked towing capacity and is equipped with a factory-fitted tow bar receiver as standard.

Customers can thus tailor their vehicle to specific towing needs, with an optional seven or 12 pin plug, electronic brake controller, tow tongue insert with 50 mm ball and a weight distribution hitch. All are available through Isuzu Ute's Genuine Accessories catalogue.

SUMMARY

Isuzu's third-generation D-Max range has successfully muscled in on the highly competitive pick-up truck range in Australia with close to 22,000 examples sold in 2021. Proving popular among families, however, it's worth remembering tub capacity and versatility are seriously limited by the solid roller cover - a bit like comparing a briefcase to a travel trunk.

"Verdelho continues to flourish and the Semillon was exceptional. Saperavi and Shiraz will produce amazing wines deep in colour and plentiful flavours.

"It was a season where both red and whites enjoyed ideal conditions.

South Burnett Wine Industry Association President, Simon Berry was also very upbeat in his assessment of Vintage '23 and thought it would have positive long-term implications for the region.

"Not only was fruit quality spot on, yields also increased," Simon said.

"We will now have top-quality wine in larger quantities. We have an excellent product with vibrant cellar doors.

"We need to keep reminding the wider public what a great area we have to visit, drop back a gear or two and totally relax and enjoy our food, wine and serenity.

As for the grand champions of the show, Clint Whitaker with his stud, 'Mr Cruiser' won the 'Overall Outdoor Grand Champion'.



Argent's success at Kingaroy over the weekend comes just weeks after he won the 325 millimetre standing block Queensland title in his native Blackbutt.

All up, the South Burnett sensation has placed in over 80 Queensland titles, 15 Australian titles, and 8 international titles in his career, including a back-to-back-to-back win in the 15-inch standing block at the Sydney Royal Easter Show and a third-place finish at the 2018 Champion's Trophy in Marseille, France.

South Burnett councillor and avid woodchop enthusiast Gavin 'Spud' Jones interviewed Argent after his win at Kingaroy, praising the young gun for his national and international success.

"To win [the Australian title] once is one thing, but to win it three times in a row - there's only very few in the history of the sport who have ever managed that," Jones said of Argent.
