A pop-up success

Mundubbera has once again come forward as the prime destination for Christmas shopping in the North Burnett as an annual cooperative pop-up shop project completed its second stint in the town.

The Burnett Christmas pop-up shop is the brainchild of local Lynette Vicary and hosted around 60 exhibitors from across the region this year at a storefront on Lyons Street until December 12.

For a fee, locals were able to offer their

goods and have them sold by a team of eager volunteers, with the proceeds going right back to the creators.

Items sold included handcrafted fashion, art, food and jewellery and shoppers were invited to make their own items such as Christmas ornaments in a series of workshops hosted by exhibitors and local creators.

Despite only being in its second year of business, the project has already attracted attention from all around Queensland, drawing in customers from Townsville and Brisbane and even making national headlines. Volunteer and exhibitor Melinda Thorburn said that this success comes as a result of plenty of hard work.

"You can come and buy from so many exhibitors all in one location," she said.

"Everyone puts in so much attention to detail, and I think that is really what has made the pop-up shop as successful as it is," Ms Thorburn added.

This success, she said, means that the project will continue in 2021 and subsequent years - bigger and better.

For many exhibitors, the shop became a

welcome side-income in a year impacted by droughts, floods and lockdowns.

"Because it's been so tough, a lot of people have had to diversify to make a bit of money for their household budget, and this is a great way to do it," Ms Thorburn said.

"It's money at the right time of year."



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



While I have had those hobbies for a while, I have created a Kingaroy bucket list which will help me learn more about the region.



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Chip in for brave dad lost

The South Burnett community have come together to support a Kingaroy family after the tragic death of Denny Caballa, who died trying to save his son's life at a beach near Noosa.

Denny Jade Caballa from Kingaroy and Richard Catbagen from Dalby, both 37, are being remembered as heroes after dying as a result of attempting to rescue their children when they were swept up in a strong rip at Teewah, an unpatrolled stretch of beach north of Noosa on Saturday afternoon, 5 December.

The two men are being hailed as heroes after taking to the water to save the three children, two of whom were Mr Catbagan's and Mr Caballa's nine-year-old son Tyghan, who was airlifted to the Sunshine Coast University

Hospital in a serious condition and later discharged the following day.

A group of bystanders pulled the men from

the water in an attempt to save their lives but sadly neither recovered.

A friend and former colleague of Mr Caballa, Isaac Burgoyne has launched a GoFundMe page to try and help the Caballa family get back on their feet financially while they grieve the death of their beloved father.

"Denny was the kind of person who would always try to help you out, no matter what," Mr Burgoyne said.

"He was the sort of bloke who was always putting others before himself."

In the GoFundMe page Mr Burgoyne said he hoped the funds would help support the two families in the interim while they tried to plan funerals and continue to cover household bills.

"Knowing that they live very far from their family and in the current Covid circumstances,

have limited access to family support networks, it would be wonderful if we could all give a little to help support his family and give this hero the send off he deserve," he said.

Mr Burgoyne explained most of the Caballa family were still living in the Philippines and Denny's wife, Cherry Apple Caballa would now be trying to manage the family bills and responsibilities alone.

Mr Caballa and Mr Burgoyne worked together at a piggery near Kingaroy and became good friends during their time together.

"Denny was always such a lovely bloke that will surely be missed by many who knew him with in the local community of the South Burnett," he said.

TAFE a chance in the Burnett region

Following recent 2020-2021 budget announcements, the State Government has released their key investments includes an additional \$200 million over four years for skills initiatives and a further \$21 million to extend the free TAFE for year 12 graduates and free apprenticeships for under 21s programs to young Queenslanders under 25.

Minister for Training and Skills Development Di Farmer said training and skills funding was vital to the government's plan to rebuild and grow the Queensland economy.

"More young Queenslanders will be helped to update their skills and secure employment through an extension to the existing free apprenticeship for under 21s and free TAFE for Year 12 graduates initiatives to assist those aged up to 25 years," she said.

"The extended program will apply to 165 priority qualification areas, including health services, hospitality, engineering, aged and disability support and early childhood education... Young Queenslanders under the age of 25 will get access to free training in these high priority courses that we know will lead to jobs.

The Queensland Government recently announced an investment of more than \$1 billion in the 2020-21 State Budget for training and skills initiatives focussed on preparing Queenslanders for the jobs of the future.

Ms Farmer said the investment also included \$16.51 million for the establishment of Manufacturing Skills Queensland and \$100 million in TAFE facilities across the state, commencing in 2021-22 to create high quality training spaces tailored to deliver the skills local industry needs. Cherbourg's Nurunderi campus, the Kingaroy campus and the Gayndah TAFE Centre were not among the several TAFE facilities due to receive a portion of the allocated TAFE funding.

When Burnett Today requested more information on the basis behind this decision,

Ms Farmer said investment in the state's TAFE training sites is guided by a regional infrastructure planning process undertaken during 2018 and 2019.

"The planning considered current and forecast student enrolments and population growth on a region by region basis," she said.

"Many more people in the Burnett region will still be able to take advantage of the free TAFE for year 12 graduates and free apprenticeships for under 21s programs which have now been extended to young Queenslanders under 25.

"This is a great chance for young people in the Burnett to get the right skills to get right jobs and I'd encourage anyone under 25 who has thought about TAFE or getting an apprenticeship to take advantage of this opportunity."

Member MP Deb Frecklington said she was disappointed the government did not allocate any of the TAFE funding to the Burnett region.

"With the Wide Bay and Burnett regions having the highest youth unemployment rate in Queensland, it is disappointing there has been no focus on funding for the Kingaroy and Cherbourg TAFE facilities," she said.

"Labor have overlooked our region in this budget. They obviously can't see how much opportunity there is at both of these TAFE centres and the jobs that could be created in

Ms Farmer did mention over the 2018-19 and 2019-20 financial years, the Queensland Government invested nearly \$1.3 million at the Cherbourg and Kingaroy TAFE campuses with the expenditure included approximately \$359,000 in maintenance and capital enhancements at the Cherbourg TAFE campus.

'Lock up': Police warning

Burnett police are warning residents to ensure their homes are locked and secure, after an elderly couple had to confront an intruder in their Kingaroy home.

Kingaroy police officers were called to an Earl St residence at 2.20pm on Wednesday, 9 December.

Police will allege a 37-year-old Woorabinda man entered the residence through an unlocked rear door.

He was confronted by the elderly residents and claimed people were chasing him before he armed himself with a knife from the couple's kitchen.

The man was found by police at the front of the house, was arrested and transported to Kingaroy Watchhouse.

He appeared in Kingaroy Magistrates Court last Thursday and was charged with the alleged unlawful entry of the house, trespassing as well as breaching a domestic violence order on 22 September at Cherbourg.

Kingarov Police are also investigating another unlawful entry.

Entry was gained through the unlocked and open rear sliding door at a Booth St residence overnight on Thursday.

Police will allege the offenders have stolen a PS4, iWatch.

They allegedly used keys to access a vehicle before stealing a purse and contents from a vehicle parked in the driveway

Kingaroy Officer in Charge David Tierney stresses the need for residents to be vigilant as the warmer weather and Christmas holidays approaches.

"Offenders will take advantage of the warmer weather to commit offences, such as these, knowing people will leave doors and windows open and unlocked," he said.

Senior Sergeant Tierney said residents need to ensure they lock their dwelling not just when they are out, but also when they are home

He said police were actively patrolling residential areas but unfortunately could not be everywhere at one time.

"Residents need to take all precautions to ensure they don't become the victims of sneak offences including fitting secure locks to window and door screens and using these at all times," Snr Sgt Tierney said.

South Burnett Regional Council said they were "immensely appreciative" for the \$4.5 million contribution through the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund.

Age Pension Guide

An updated guide to the Wide Bay Age Pension, including payment rates, assets tests and conditions, has been released says Federal Member for Wide Bay, Llew O'Brien.

The guide contains a series of commonly asked questions as well as information about the guidelines, payments and eligibility tests that relate to the age pension and useful contact telephone numbers.

A range of factors can affect the age pension payments, including the income and asset tests, deeming rates and other provisions. The updated edition includes information relevant to Covid-19 payments and advice on flu vaccinations for seniors.

Puppy Scams

Queensland Police are reminding families to be aware of puppy scams. Christmas is a popular time to gift pets and tug at people's emotions posting fake ads of sought-after breeds. Police are warning people to not fall for cute pictures and cheap prices for what is a nonexistent puppy.

Always do independent research and cut off communication if the 'seller' requests upfront payments through unsecure methods such as wire or bank transfer. Doing a reverse image search is a good way to check if the puppy photo has been taken from elsewhere. Always get a veterinarian report on any animal before you consider buying it and see the pet in person prior to buying it.

'Buy now pay later'

Legal Aid Queensland is encouraging shoppers to think carefully before using buy now pay later schemes over a credit card this Christmas and to make sure they're aware of the pitfalls if they do. Consumer advocate and principal lawyer Paul Holmes said consumers must know their rights before entering a buy now pay later contract to reduce potential stress and financial pain later.

They have observed increased trend of Queenslanders opting to use buy now pay later arrangements over a credit card because there is no charged interest. These pay later schemes come with a potential 'sting', as any late payments mean you'll be charged a late fee. Some companies may also charge payment processing fees or monthly account fees, and if something goes wrong, people have less legal protections. Queenslanders experiencing problems with a buy now pay later contract can get help by calling Legal Aid Queensland on 1300 65 11 88.



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

Safety compliance in style

A cry from the heart: Larry releases new single

As a long-time radio announcer, country musician and rodeo entertainer, Larry Cann is no stranger to the detrimental impact mental health and suicide is having on regional communities across the nation.

His brand new single 'Country Cries' went live this month and has achieved the impossible for some - it's started a conversation.

After one of Larry's good rodeo friends from the Bundaberg region suicided four years ago, the Yarraman based musician knew he wanted to try and use his music as a way to encourage more people to open up to the idea of talking about their heaviest burdens with those they trust.

"From the outside looking in, he looked like he had it all," he said.

"He was a brilliant rodeo rider and a beloved family man... No one could have guessed he was actually battling some serious demons because he never let people see them and never spoke to his friends or family about it.'

Earlier this year a local councillor approached Larry and helped reignite his passion for writing music, giving him an idea for a new project and 'Country Cries' was born.

"Kathy Duff actually approached me at the Moffatdale Markets in July and she gave me the idea to write a song about suicide in farming communities as well as the struggles faced in regional and rural mental health," he said.

"I was originally planning to work on remaking an old classic country song and giving it a facelift, but this project has been close to my heart for a while now and I thought this was probably a good time to get to work on it."

After several months of writing, recording and editing Larry was able to officially release his new single on December 4 at the Farmer's Night Out event in Kingaroy, hosted by the South Burnett Regional Council as a thank you to the local primary producers for everything they do for the community.

"I felt like this was the ultimate time and place to debut 'Country Cries' because I think our farmers have had a really rough few years lately between the drought and with all the recent Covid setbacks, I think they are some of the most resilient members of a community.

"But unfortunately on the other hand, our region has one of the highest rates of suicide in the state and I think we all need to start getting more comfortable talking about our mental health and suicide prevention otherwise nothing is going to change."

Growing up in Chinchilla on one of the first commercial melon farms, Larry says he saw firsthand the pressure life on the land can put people under.

Larry admits after his marriage broke down several years ago he found himself in a dark place and started having suicidal thoughts for the first time but the father of three found his strength in his children and made a conscious decision to work on his mental wellbeing for their sake.

"I think you'd be flat out trying to find a person who hasn't been through a patch of depression or anxiety at some point in their life. It's only human to go through good times and bad but what we all need to do is make it more acceptable and natural to sit down and have a conversation about it.

"My advice to other blokes out there would be to just reach out to a mate and spend the afternoon together or get out of town and go fishing and just have a talk about what you're going through.

"You'll probably be surprised to hear they've been through something similar themselves.'

Our 'lack of' mental care

The Burnett region has been named as having one of the highest consistent yearly suicide rates

These statistics from the Australian Institute of Health Welfare report became a hot topic in Queensland Parliament recently.

Member for Nanango Deb Frecklington was ejected from state parliament when she questioned the health minister on 2 December about a lack of mental health services at the Kingaroy Hospital.

She queried whether the new Kingaroy Hospital would have increased mental health services such as a safe room or inpatient mental health beds.

'In relation to the results reported by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, they sadly confirm what so many in our region already know, that too many people are choosing to end their life through suicide," Ms Frecklington said.

'There is a great sense of loss and a real

sense of despair that suicide has become a constant in our community, particularly the rate of youth suicide.

"It is unacceptable that the Burnett has become Queensland's region with the highest rate of suicide and this clearly validates why we have been calling for more services in the South Burnett and Cherbourg.'

The report stated that one of the highest reportable suicide rates in Queensland for persons at SA3 level over the 5-year period from 2014 to 2018 was the Burnett and Kuranda.

The Burnett and Kuranda were also listed as the areas in Queensland that were consistently reporting the highest yearly suicide rates from 2014 to 2018.

"Given the Burnett has been listed as Oueensland's region with the highest rate of suicide, I would have thought the Labor Government would have taken my question and concerns more seriously," Ms Frecklington said.

"Instead, the Minister for Health provided no answers and had no clue about whether these services would be included in the Kingaroy Hospital. My further questioning was met with arrogance and I was ejected from the House

Ms Frecklington said this was why she had also been highlighting the 'shocking' unemployment statistics for the young people in the Wide Bay Burnett and need for economic development in the regions.

Health Minister Yvette D'Ath the global Covid-19 pandemic had been taking its toll on people's mental health around the world and Oueensland was no exception.

She told the Parliament, in response to Ms Frecklington's question, that it was very sad that so many people were taking their lives.

Ms D'Ath said the new Kingaroy hospital would expand the regional footprint for health services

"We are expanding both our physical services and our online and remote services, because we know-we have learned through Covid- that we can do so much more remotely, through e-health and other initiatives, including, as I said, with some of the new online therapy programs," she said.

Ms D'Ath pointed out the government's economic recovery strategy contained \$46.5 million for local mental health community treatment support services.

These extra community-based services would be directed to areas where the state government saw the greatest demand.

"That is, areas where local economies depend on construction, tourism and related service industries that have been most impacted and in relation to Covid," she said.

"The new services include a new online therapy program for young people and grants to 45 rural councils for local health initiatives. '

These will also include extra capacity in existing NGO alcohol and drug rehabilitation services, extra support for people in quarantine and the expansion of existing mental health services.

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Stroke highlights raw grief

Lynda Wilkins only realised the full impact of grieving the loss of a child to suicide after watching her husband Allan recover from a stroke.

This December marks nine years since her only son Jason took his own life.

"I couldn't have asked for a better kid, he loved country life and we had 29 good years," Lynda said.

Jason went to school in Wondai and Murgon, joined the scouts and karate, and loved to ride the bikes on the farm. He secured a fly-in, fly-out mining job and came home to visit his family often.

The Murgon mother is now ready to share her story in the hope she can encourage others to reach out this Christmas.

Not everyone has a happy Christmas, but by telling our story I hope we can be more at peace by helping somebody else," she said.

Allan Wilkins had a stroke on 19 January 2019

While he was in hospital recovering, he talked about his son Jason and opened up about his grief.

"People don't realise what stress and grief can do to you," Lynda said.

"At the end of the day you've got to take care of yourself."

Lynda said her husband was a healthy farmer.

"His lifestyle was simple, eat healthy, work hard and he didn't drink or smoke," she said.

He was putting weet-bix in his bowl that January morning when his arm fell down and his leg went limp.

Murgon doctors suspected a stroke and Allan was airlifted from the Murgon Hospital to the P.A. Brisbane Hospital.

Lynda was told to prepare herself for the worst.

He deteriorated rapidly, had a blood clot and brain bleed and was completely paralysed down one side.

"His speech and face improved, but not his body," she said.

By April 2019 his legs and arm movements improved and he was moved to Kingaroy Hospital in June 2019.

Today Allan is improving with a lot of hard work exercises, O.T. and physio. His group days on Wednesday in Wondai, an event he enjoys.

His goal is to walk, he will never give up. as long and hard as it is you have to believe in miracles.

Lynda said there were many reminders of her family's grief.

'Things like Dolly's Dream brings it all back to like it was yesterday," she said.

Today mental health is recognised as an illness and there are many more services available. However, it has not always been widely accepted.

Here are Lynda's reflections from her experience:

"When Allan was in hospital he talked about Jason -our son who took his life weeks before Christmas, 2011.

It was something we could never imagine would happen, the grief, loss, empty, alone feeling.

Sitting beside the black dog, feeling sick and negative. Good days, bad days, picking yourself up. You think it is too much and can't see a new direction.

Nine years ago is like it happened yesterday, it is an emotional illness but help, understanding and education is out there today.

We locked ourselves away in grief, with emotions out of control.

We understand if this story reminds you of someone. Please live for Jason, his dad and mum. Read our story and tell yours about how you beat the black dog and worked to help oth-

Families like us are left behind and suffer our loss. The last week before Jason died, he seemed happy. He wanted to have a hot chook and chocolate biscuits -his favourites. We thought we'd won the battle...

A tribute to our amazing son, we were so blessed for a short time, but he achieved a life-time of dreams.

His words: 'Dad and Mum I love you so much, thanks for everything you did for me. I love you heaps'.

To tell our story of suicide has been difficult. The grief and emotions at Christmas will always be there.

Nine years on, a lot has changed. It's an illness when you are tired, sick and unwell, the black dog takes control. If this happens get help early. Talk to family and friends, people who understand you and make you happy.

Help us live for Jason, tell your story to help others change their situation. The family left behind the grief, the guilt and no answers -your health suffers, that's our story."

Support is out there:

Lynda is thankful for the support around her, with many people in the South Burnett community reaching out to her over the years.

"I don't know how you would survive without it," she said.

"Support from different families has been unreal, even just a text or phone call helps."



Today, a few things coming into Christmas and the New Year.

Potting mix versus soil

One of the most common mistakes made by gardeners is the use of potting mix as a garden soil improver.

Don't be alarmed, potting mix is not detrimental to plant health if you apply it to your garden.

However, potting mix is certainly not necessary when planting a garden bed.

The reason potting mix is not an ideal soil improver lies in the product itself.

Put simply, the ingredients that make up potting mix are specifically selected to promote high yielding performance for plants in containers – not the garden.

The materials that make up potting mix vary depending on the manufacturer, though typically most potting mixes include ingredients such as sand, composted pine bark, and coconut fibre.

These materials are great at ensuring a healthy soil environment in containers, though their use in the garden is almost pointless.

The opposite is also important to note in that gardeners should avoid using garden soil as a potting mix.

Using soil from the garden as a potting media is a recipe for disaster.

Garden soil, which are predominately made up of a combination of silts, sands, and clays, do not interact well in containers.

Garden soils slump in containers suffocating plant roots resulting in poor root development impacting overall plant health.

Understandably, not everyone has the ability to pop down to the hardware store or garden centre to pick up a bad of potting mix.

Though if you do find yourself having to use



garden soils as a potting mix you must incorporate other additives to keep the mix airy and to improve drainage.

A good ratio for homemade potting mix includes one part garden soil: one part coconut fibre: one part course sand.

Using garden soil as a potting mix should be restricted to your garden as gifting pot plants cultivated with homemade potting mix may contain weed seeds, pests, and disease.

The last thing you want to do is potentially spread nasties throughout your gardening community.

So, the golden rule is potting mix for plants, and garden soil for gardens.

It's an easy philosophy to live by, and if you follow this rule your plants will be forever thankful.

Top tip when purchasing potting mix:

Always look for the red ticks which highlight the Australian Standard. Potting mix manufacturers that abide by this standard can ensure the product they are producing is of a highest quality due to rigorous and stringent testing. Though premium potting mixes which carry this certification are slightly more expensive, they will yield better results than potting mixes that do not adhere to the Australian standard.

Start with small easy items

This is an easy step because you do not have to return each individual item to a specific place or meticulously clean each item individually. Once you have cleared all of the rubbish, you will just be left with the belongings you will be keeping and you can concentrate all of your attention on that task.



Tofu For You

Tofu is the Japanese name for bean curd and means rotten beans. This description is certainly not an appetising term for what is an economical, healthy and incredibly versatile ingredient. I once made tofu from scratch, starting with the dried soybean – although it was a fun project, I concluded it is much easier to buy the readymade product. Tofu is a white smooth, cheese-like substance made by pressing fresh bean curd. Although this nutritious and easily digested food is fairly bland in taste, it readily absorbs the flavour of other ingredients. Fresh tofu can be purchased as soft (Silken) or semi-firm or firm pressed, in brine, vacuum packed or in plastic containers. It can also be bought marinated, fermented, deep-fried or as thin 'yuba' wrappers. Vegetarians and vegans consider tofu one of the greatest meat substitutes and it is becoming a popular ingredient on many Australian dinner tables.



Scrambled Tofu

- 30mL extra virgin olive oil (or vegetable stock)

- Some extra virgin bilve on (or vegetable stock)
 Sog spring onion, white bottoms (finely sliced)
 30g garlic, crushed
 30g turmeric, finely grated (or dried powder)
 300g silken tofu (blended smooth)
- 450g firm tofu (crumbled)
- 30g nutritional yeast flakes
- 30g coconut yoghurt Pinch seasalt flakes (to taste)

Pinch ground white pepper (to taste)

In a heavy non-stick frying pan heat oil to a medium heat.
 Add spring onions and cook gently until tender.
 Add garlic and continue cooking for an additional minute.
 Add turmeric and cook for an additional minute.

 Add smooth silken tofu, stirring until combined and begins to gently simmer
 Add crumbled firm tofu and stir until combined and remove from heat. 7. Add yeast flakes, yoghurt and seasoning until combined and seasoned to your liking. Serve on toasted sour dough with grilled tomato for a delicious plant-based breakfast.





Are you ready for a break?

It's the summer for road trips, but new research from NRMA Insurance is warning of a lot more traffic on the roads this year, with an expected 20 per cent increase in the number of Australians planning a driving holiday this year.

As interstate travel restrictions gradually ease across the country, the NRMA Insurance poll shows 90 per cent of Aussies who are going on a driving holiday are planning on travelling for more than two hours, with nearly one in ten planning a trip of more than 15 hours to reach their destination.

The school holidays will see the busiest traffic conditions, with nearly three-quarters going away in December and Januarv.

But while Aussies may be eager to hit the road, many haven't factored in proper break times for their trip. Only half intend to take a break from driving the recommended frequency of every two hours, with over a quarter (26 per cent) stating they'll only take a break from continuous driving every 3 to 4 hours.

NRMA Insurance Executive General Manager Claims Luke Gallagher said planning properly for a long road-trip helps make the journey safer for everyone.

"It's encouraging to see that many drivers are planning to stop every two hours or less on their road trips this summer but preparing for a long journey should start before the day you set off. As well as taking regular breaks to stretch your legs and reset your mind, we also recommend getting a good night's sleep before setting off and doing some general maintenance on your car."

The NRMA Insurance Summer Road Trip research shows around half of drivers, 47 per

cent on average, carry out any recommended maintenance on their vehicles before setting off on a road trip, while almost one in five admit they don't do any maintenance on their vehicle, or even plan their route, before setting off.

Only around 16 per cent of those going on a road trip prepare in advance by checking apps for up-to-date information on traffic, the status of any bushfires along the route, or weather forecasts. However, more worryingly, nearly one in five admit they don't do any maintenance on their vehicle, or even plan their route, before setting off.

How Aussies prepare for an upcoming road trip:

- 43 per cent get their car professionally serviced
- 43 per cent check tyre pressure
- 55 per cent check water levels
- 25 per cent change windscreen wipers
- 50 per cent check oil levels

- 46 per cent map the route
- 21 per cent check where service stations / driver reviver stops are on the chosen route
- 20 per cent check for any planned roadworks or weather alerts before setting off
- 16 per cent download apps to get real-time alerts (e.g. LiveTraffic, NSW RFS Fires Near Me)
- 18 per cent do 'none of the above'

Mr Gallagher added: "Make sure your car or caravan is kept in good working order at any time, but particularly before you head off on a long road trip.

Get your car serviced if it's overdue, check your tyre pressure, top up your engine oil and coolants and check all brakes and indicator lights are working properly.

"You should also check conditions before setting off and even consider delaying your trip if the forecast shows a significant weather event or bushfire.

If you do get stuck in bad conditions, ad-

just your driving to remain safe by slowing down, turning on your headlights and leaving enough room between you and other drivers. To keep safe on a long road trip this summer, NRMA Insurance advises:

- Get a good night's sleep before setting off. Getting eight hours' sleep will mean you're refreshed and in tip-top shape for a long road trip
- Make sure your vehicle is ready for the long trip ahead:
- Get the car serviced
- Check your tyres are pumped with the correct air pressure
- Refuel
- Top-up your engine oil and coolant to optimal levels
- Check all breaks and lights are working properly and the car battery's connection is secure
- Have an emergency kit handy, including a spare tyre, jack, tyre lever, pump and any other tools that will come in handy in case of a break down, including a basic first aid kit
- Pack essential supplies such as food, water, tissues and in-car chargers
- Store luggage safely
- Restrain children and pets correctly

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Kia's Stinger refreshed

Kia's performance-leading Stinger has been refreshed and revised with a raft of new and enhanced safety and convenience features as it continues to win hearts and minds in the Australian market.

Since its global launch in 2017 the Stinger has carved out a solid niche in the high-performance rear-wheel drive sedan market, a segment many believed was on its final legs.

With the inclusion of new and upgraded safety technology, including Blind Spot View Monitor as pioneered in the recently launched Sorento, and AEB Junction Assist the new model Stinger becomes an even more compelling option for anyone seeking sports performance in a family-friendly package.

In addition to its refreshed design, the enhanced Kia Stinger includes Kia's latest driver assist and safety features.

Design changes to the upgraded Stinger are best described as evolutionary rather than revolutionary with each subtle revision enhancing the Stinger's undeniable charm.

One of the most outstanding styling changes is the new rear LED combination taillight (across the range) with a distinctive light signature extending the full width of the car mimicking the subtle spoiler integrated into the boot lid.

There is also a playful touch with the turn signal now designed with 10 individual LED units on each side arranged in a grid pattern to represent the chequered flag used in motorsport.

In line with the new bi-modal exhaust and increased power output the GT and 330S models will feature noticeably larger quad exhaust tips while the 200S and GT-Line models will carry over the current designs.

From the front the most obvious change is the new multifaceted reflector LED headlights with integrated daytime running lights which will be standard on the 200S and 330S.

While appearing dark and sleek with the lights out, they spring to life with sharp slashes of light angled towards the front of the car when illuminated.

The clever Dynamic Bending LED headlights will be retained on GT and GT-Line models.

On the safety front the improvements are widespread and significant, building on the Stinger's 5-Star ANCAP safety rating awarded at launch in 2017.

In scoring the 5-Star rating the Stinger came with standard Anti-lock Braking System (ABS), Electronic Stability Control (ESC), Vehicle Stability Management (VSM), rear view camera, rear parking sensors, driver attention alert and seven airbags.

Already featuring Autonomous Emergency Braking across the range, the improved AEB will now add Cyclist Detection and Junction Assist to its already existing car and pedestrian capabilities. Junction Assist uses the front camera and radar to apply the brakes if danger is detected while turning across oncoming traffic.

The improved Lane Keeping Assistance will also feature Road Edge Detection ensuring that when the car is detected wandering from its lane or towards the road edge the steering will automatically assist in returning

the car to the lane.

To further enhance the richness of the GT-Line and GT models they will benefit from the inclusion of Rear Cross Traffic Collision-Avoidance Assist which monitors and if necessary brakes to avoid traffic from either side of the vehicle when reversing.

The top grade models will also get Blind Spot Collision-Avoidance Assist which uses the Blind Spot Detection and Electronic Stability Control to prevent collisions with cars in the adjacent lanes.

The Blind Spot View Monitor is linked to the turn signal operation and displays a camera view of the blind spots in the 7" supervision cluster.

The most notable upgrade to the interior is the inclusion of the 10.25-inch touchscreen with inbuilt navigation and smartphone connectivity.

The dash-mounted screen allows users to control and monitor a range of vehicle functions simultaneously.

As part of the technology upgrade the Stinger now features Bluetooth Multi-Connection allowing multiple smart phones to be paired at the same time for greater convenience and functionality, such as using one phone for communications and another for streaming music.

The Smart Key Remote Engine Start offers the opportunity to remotely start the car and have the climate conditions reach their optimum settings before entering the cabin.

For the 200S and 330S models the 3.5-inch mono-TFT cluster has been replaced by the more advanced 4.2-inch colour-TFT cluster with improved visual clarity and a wider range of information displayed. For GT and GT-Line models the high-resolution 7.0-inch supervision cluster is retained, albeit with the Blind

Spot View Monitor.

The interior ambience of the GT and GT-Line cars can be tuned by the choice of 64 colours in the Mood Lamp to subtly alter the character of the cabin.

The steering wheel also features a new metallic finish while the dashboard and doors are trimmed with a new stitch pattern design.

The Stinger engines have always been at the heart of the hero discussions and remain largely unchanged in the upgraded model.

The Lambda 3.3-litre twin-turbo V6 retains its awesome 510Nm of torque across a huge rev range but the inclusion of a factory-developed Bi-model exhaust system has found an additional 2kW of power, lifting the output to 274kW.

The turbocharged 2.0-litre four-cylinder Theta II engine remains unchanged with 182kW and 353Nm.

Both engines are paired with a smoothshifting eight-speed automatic transmission, matching the car's long-legged gran turismo personality.

Stinger is available in nine colours - Hichroma Red, Neon Orange, Deep Chroma Blue, Micro Blue, Snow White Pearl, Panthera Metal, Silky Silver, Panthera Metal and Ceramic Grey with an additional colour, Aurora Black Pearl, available only for GT and GT-Line.

Holden heritage on show

The Managing Director for GM Australia and New Zealand, Marc Ebolo, has announced that Holden's heritage collection of production and concept vehicles will be going on display in Australia.

The entire collection of more than 80 vehicles and 30 engines will be made available to car museums around the country for public display.

"There has been considerable speculation with regards to what was going to happen to these iconic pieces of automotive heritage, and I'm pleased to reveal we are displaying our vehicle collection in Australia. We have never thought about sending it overseas," said Mr Ebolo.

"The vehicles which make up this multimillion dollar collection have been loaned to a variety of museums and will go on display in the very near future. This will be the first time the entire collection of Holden production and concept vehicles has been released simultaneously for public viewing."

Over the past five years, Holden has been working on its substantial heritage collection of cars, engines, manufacturing items, print material, photos and memorabilia with the help of a dedicated group of Holden retirees in Victoria and South Australia.

The retiree group has spent countless hours helping Holden to preserve and catalogue the collection, which contains items nearly a century old and tells the story of Holden from its origins in 1859, through to becoming a cornerstone manufacturer of Australian industry and the heyday of when half the vehicles on Australian roads were Holdens.

"GM is sincerely grateful for the work our Holden Heritage Group of retiree volunteers has done to sort, digitise and safely store many thousands of items relating to Holden's rich manufacturing and iconic brand history," said Mr Ebolo.

"We are planning to launch a Holden Heritage Collection website next year which will provide enthusiasts with information about the collection, as well as details of where to view the vehicles."

Over the past year, Holden has also sought advice from the National Museum of Australia

(NMA), the Commonwealth Office for the Arts, the History Trust of South Australia and Museums Victoria, as well as other interest groups and museums in South Australia and Victoria, to help plan the long term preservation of the collection with a purpose to make as much of it accessible to the public as possible.

This planning process included the formation of an Advisory Committee which was announced by Federal Minister for the Arts, the Hon Paul Fletcher MP, and is chaired by the Director of the NMA, Dr Mathew Trinca, AM.

Holden has been participating with the

Committee and is very grateful for Minister Fletcher's interest in the collection and the work and advice that Dr Trinca, members of the Committee and the Commonwealth Office for the Arts have been providing throughout the year to examine long term options for the whole collection.

"We more than anybody recognise how important this collection is to Australia and particularly to the people who have worked at Holden and owned Holden cars," said Mr Ebolo.

"We greatly appreciate Minister Fletcher's interest in the Holden collection and the work and valuable advice of Dr Mathew Trinca, the National, Victorian and South Australian museums and interest groups and the Commonwealth Office for the Arts, on how to best preserve our heritage collection in Australia.

"We hope that with the opening of state borders and as Australians go on holidays, they will visit the various museums where these wonderful Holden cars will be displayed."

A special grouping of these iconic Holden cars will be exhibited from mid-December at the History Trust of SA's National Motor Museum in Birdwood, South Australia, the state in which Holden began as a saddlery in 1859.

The special exhibition includes iconic cars such as Holden No. 1 launched by Prime Minister Ben Chifley in 1948, Holden's first concept car 'Hurricane' from 1969, the '1,000,000th' EJ Holden, the '4,000,000th' VC Commodore, the 'Coupe 60' concept and former Holden Design Director Richard Ferlazzo's global masterpiece concept car, 'EFIJY.'

Burst of summer flavour

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas with a fantastic range of brightly coloured summer fruit and vegies bursting with flavour, all available at the Brisbane Produce Market this week.

Does anything say 'festive season' more than Australian grown cherries? Currently in full bloom, the cherry season in Australia lasts only 100 days from November through to February, so grab a bag, fill a bowl and enjoy the deep red, glossy and plump cherries while you can.

We have an abundance of sweet and lush stone fruit, including apricots of all sizes and both yellow and white nectarines, peaches and plums arriving from Victoria and South Australia.

The star of this summer's picnic is the sweet and ultra-juicy Aussie mango.

Choose from a selection of varieties such as the R2E2 (orange skin tinged with a red blush), the kensington pride (yellow to orange skin tinged with pink blush) and the honey gold (golden apricot-like skin with yellow to orange flesh) available at your local fruit shop.

Transport yourself to the tropics with locally grown watermelon and pineapples-store uneaten pineapple pieces in an air-tight container in the fridge to keep them nice and fresh.

Excellent value fruit includes limes, pawpaw, strawberries, cavendish bananas from Innisfail, hass avocados from Mount Tambourine and sweet eating rockmelons from Bundaberg, whereas passionfruit, pears and blueberries are in short supply. Look out for other seasonal treats including lychees, grapes, figs and pomegranates.

Most vegetables are well supplied this week including asparagus, spring onions, snow peas, cauliflower, broccoli, zucchini, eggplants and green beans.

Asian vegetables such as wombok and bok choy are plentiful too; stir-fry them with oyster sauce and garlic or ginger for enhanced flavour.

Everyone loves crunchy veggies, especially when they are packed with micronutrients. Opt for red capsicum, refreshing cucumbers, carrots and crunchy celery for an impressive grazing platter as these vegies are in good supply.

Stock up on salad items such as Iceberg lettuce, onions, radish, baby spinach, mini Roma tomatoes as we're seeing bumper supplies this week.

Are you tired of eating salads? Switch things up with a wrap. Combine salad items with your choice of protein and dressing, and you've got yourself a nutritious wrap.

Adding flavour to your dinner has never been easier. Throw in herbs such as parsley, coriander and basil — all are in excellent supply.

This week's hero is corn with great quality supplies currently arriving from Bowen. Look for corn in bright green husks with pale silks. Corn kernels should be round and plump with no sign of shrivelling. To cook, remove the husk and steam, boil, grill or barbecue. For a spicy side dish, chargrill corn and serve topped with lime juice, parsley, garlic butter and pepper.

Big ideas par for the course: Red dirt research underway

"We don't do blue sky research -we do red dirt research."

This is what CQ University's Prof Phil Brown and Associate Professor Simon White said when explaining a new project being undertaken by the university's Institute for Future Farming Systems.

The Hinkler AgTech Initiative will deliver increased productivity and profitability to the agricultural sector through greater availability and utilisation of agricultural technology.

Early technology analysis includes remote video cameras and artificial intelligence to monitor pest insects, fruit harvest bags that weigh their contents, and weather station arrays forecasting at a field-level.

"The initiative is aimed at AgTech products right at the dirty end of research," says Prof Brown.

"We will be assisting AgTech providers with trialling technology, in partnership with commercial agribusinesses, with the aim of adopting the technology on a regional scale."

As the largest and most diverse agricultural region in Australia, the Wide Bay Burnett is the perfect location for AgTech development and utilisation. This agricultural sector accounts for approximately \$1.5 billion of annual production with the most valuable commodities being beef cattle, mandarins and sugarcane. The region also leads the state in the production of tree crops such as macadamias and avocados and is home to more than 20 different fruit and vegetable crops, each with an annual farm gate value exceeding \$2 million.



The sector is also supported by an established range of large-scale food processing and value-adding facilities.

tural sector as part of the trial process.

The project team is also developing a data rich landscape, providing new data and capturing existing data, to assist AgTech companies with testing and monitoring their products in a commercial setting.

Another important part of the project is education and information delivery, aimed at enhancing the agricultural sector's knowledge and understanding of AgTech and incorporating AgTech within the secondary education curriculum.

"The program of activities being undertaken under the Initiative have been designed to position our region as a global centre for AgTech development and implementation," says A/Prof White.

"The resulting increase in agricultural C

productivity and profitability will stimulate economic development, grow regional employment opportunities and generate pride in our region's innovative agricultural sector."

The Hinkler AgTech Initiative is funded through the Hinkler Regional Deal. The Hinkler Regional Deal is a collaboration between the Australian Government, Bundaberg Regional Council and Fraser Coast Regional Council.

Lab-grown meat a reality

The label on the front of the packet of CSIROdeveloped lab-grown meat says, "cruelty free, safe, healthy, environmentally friendly." But I think it's just about the cruellest thing I've seen in a long time.

I read this in the CSIRO's magazine for kids, DoubleHelix, in an article in their December 2020 edition called: Cultured Meat, the Future of Food?

In it, it stated that "agriculture, especially the meat industry, is a key contributor to climate change

This simplistic view from Australia's leading scientific research body, in a magazine - for kids. Well, if that isn't propaganda at its finest, I don't know what it is.

It sure isn't scientific. It isn't fact-based. It is a slap in the face of agriculture and puts at risk not only an industry but the lives of families, regions, entire communities that rely on agriculture as well.

The facts are that emissions from cars clogging up city streets stay in the atmosphere far longer than those from cattle do. But imagine the outcry from the automobile industry if the CSIRO started telling children that we shouldn't be driving cars because they're destroving our planet. It wouldn't happen.

Some more facts: last year a study by Oxford Martin School in the UK looked at the longterm climate implications of cultured meat versus meat from cattle and concluded that "because the emissions from the lab are related to the production of energy which is almost entirely made up of carbon dioxide, which persists in the atmosphere for hundreds of years... over the very long term, the manufacture of lab meat can result in more warming.'

The findings went on to say that: "...previous studies had tended to look at the various emissions from cattle and converted them all to their carbon dioxide equivalent, but this doesn't give you the full picture as methane and nitrous oxide have different impacts on the climate.

"Per tonne emitted, methane has a much larger warming impact than carbon dioxide. However (and this is the important part), it only remains in the atmosphere for about 12 years, whereas carbon dioxide persists and accumulates for millennia.'

I'm no scientist, I'm a cattle producer, but the facts are out there, in research papers, not

in the opinions of blogs and social media, or the countless dotcom websites that report fiction over facts.

By all means eat lab grown food if you want to, and I'll wish you well. But please don't eat it to satisfy a guilty conscience or because you believe cows are the problem.

There is a balance to all things in nature, animal and vegetable. The obsession by some to rid the world of all grazing animals except those that inhabit the wild is a battle to feel good about themselves - to try and undo what humans have been doing for thousands of years: eat meat because we are meat eaters.

If you do your research and listen to the science, not conscience-clearing rhetoric, you'll find plenty of information out there about that too.

One in two regional Aussies not prepared for bushfire

Despite last year's unprecedented bushfire season, millions of Australians are not taking measures to protect their homes, new research by Finder, Australia's most visited comparison site reveals.

A new Finder survey shows that 51 per cent of respondents living in regional areas are not preparing their home for the bushfire season.

These areas can be vastly more prone to hazardous bushfire conditions.

According to Finder analysis of the Insurance Council of Australia's data, last year's bushfire season cost insurers \$13.5 billion in claims, making it one of the most costly fires in Australian history.

'While it's looking like the bushfire conditions won't be as bad as last year, it's risky to be complacent," personal finance expert at Finder Kate Browne said.

"If the recent warm weather is anything to go by, we're not out of the clear. If you live in regional Australia – or in an area prone to bushfires- now is time to prepare.'

On the flip side, 49 per cent of regional Australians are taking measures to protect their homes.

Of these people, over one in four are cleaning up their gardens and removing dry leaf matter.

More than one in five have created an evacuation plan and nine per cent have purchased items like fire blankets and extinguishers.

Only one in 10 respondents said they have taken out home insurance to cover themselves against bushfire related damage.

"Make your property as fire safe as possible. Small changes - such as cutting back the trees on your property - can make a big difference," Ms Browne said.

"Get your evacuation plan in order, clean up your garden and invest in fire protective gear such as longer hoses and fire blankets.

"Consider home and contents insurance. You'll typically need to wait between 48-72 hours before you can make a claim so the

sooner you compare policies and take one out, the better and make sure that the policy you pick covers you for bushfires. While most offer cover for natural disasters, this definition can differ between insurers on exactly what and how much you're covered for. It's important to check those details before choosing an insurer.'

• As of 9 March 2020, last seasons bushfires burnt an estimated 18.6 million hectares (46 million acres; 186,000 square kilometres; 72,000 square miles), destroyed over 5,900 buildings (including 2,779 homes) and killed at least 34 people.

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Pesky weeds a problem



There is no doubt in my mind getting some extra research done by the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, Queensland Mungbean research team is not only great news for me personally, but also for the pulse industry as a whole.

It has been proven that the practice of swathing or windrowing a fairly mature Mungbean crop is definitely a positive direction for the future.

There is so much worldwide attention on the incorrectly maligned herbicide Glyphosate for its use practices and pesticide residues.

After witnessing a badly lodging grain sorghum crop being swathed in the very dry and hot summer of 2019 in South Queensland, the next logical step for farmer Greg and I to take was swathing or windrowing a mungbean crop in the 2020 late summer time.

This mechanical practice of swathing or windrowing as some call it, involves cutting the mature crop, at well below the grain or pod height and layering it down in rows or windrows as we describe it.

This harvest practice for other crops like millet and canola is common place and is typically used around maturity time in very uneven crops or those which are proving very slow in dry down.

These windrows are then picked up by a special pick up reel attached to a header some days later and thrashed within normal internal workings of the header.

So obviously this totally mechanical harvest process does not involve using registered desiccant herbicides, that we have become accustomed too over many years.

One aspect of our swathing plans has me concerned though.

When using our registered conventional herbicide options to even up a staggering maturity crop and therefore producing a better grain sample, we also get a bonus of killing some late growing weeds in our crop.

If we resort to the swathing practice, then our overall weed control may decrease. Notice I said 'may' decrease.

Now there is a few things to consider here. Firstly consideration Is the weed spectrum or species present, as that will have a major bearing of whether the weed seed base will be increased, sustained or reduced by swathing.

I know that in Western Australia, research done by Dr Michael Walsh in 2012/13, was that many swathed weeds retain their seed while lying in the swath or windrow.

Especially so for the scourge of the south and west in Annual Ryegrass.

Secondly, the cutting of the crop will also cut the weeds off obviously and the parent plant will still remain alive and probably re-

shoot to produce some more weed seed. Is this a help or a hindrance?

Thirdly is the consideration of what happens to the weed seed heads in the swathed windrow.

Here are several things I can speculate on: We suspect that several weed species seed heads and plant bodies will remain intact in this cutting of the crop to the ground. So they will probably be retained on the plant, just like our Mungbean pods will be and as you can observe with some eragrostis grass heads in the above photo. So they will be processed through the pick up header as normal in a few days time. This has also been a fact for canola and barley crops in southern regions. Research has shown that the amount of weed seed shedding onto the ground in conventional harvested crops will be much more in percentage levels,

than in the earlier cut timing of our swathed crops. This maybe a very good positive fact, particularly if you then use one of the Harvest Weed Seed Control (HWSC) methods on your header or harvesting operation.

So what about weed regrowth from the cut off plants that are still alive? This could be a weak point in our case, however I do believe our green on brown optical spot spraying sensor boom sprays, will be in a prime position to use a registered herbicide in the remaining green weeds. This solution may not turn out too bad, as some weed species I believe, will regenerate fresh green leaves after swathing, to better absorb the later applied herbicide by this spot spraying operation.

This is where my current thoughts are up to now, with this mechanical operation called swathing or windrowing. Plenty of bonus

points here , with a major one being that our Mungbean crops will be totally free of desiccant herbicides like Glyphosate, Diquat and others. This will certainly help in keeping our export markets more open to our Australian Exporters. The one criteria the Australian Mungbean Association really wish for is to keep every market option open to our Aussie pulse growers, by exporting our clean green totally traceable Mungbeans to a world that wants them

The extra good news is that the one fairly large chickpea acreage swathed in October 2020 has also shown plenty of positives around it and is very encouraging in its results for the landowner and the agronomist.

More on this practice later, especially after we all receive 6 inches (150 mm) of good soaking rain at Christmas time.


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Old boys learn new tricks
